## BACKGROUND AND SIGNIFICANCE

- WHEREAS: The Harvard Square Subway Kiosk is one of Cambridge's most beloved and iconic structures by virtue of its distinctive architectural features and its prominent location on the public plaza opposite Harvard Yard and the Coop; and
- WHEREAS: The Harvard Square Subway Kiosk has been a distinctive landmark and traditional focus of the square since it was constructed in 1928, and
- WHEREAS: The Kiosk was built to serve as the entrance to the new Harvard Square T-station, to replace the hazardous subway head house of 1912 and now sits next to the T's main entrance, where thousands of people pass daily; and
- WHEREAS: The Kiosk was designed by well-known Boston architect, Clarence H. Blackall, who also designed over 300 theatres around the country, among these the Wang, Colonial, Wilbur, and Gaiety Theatres and helped establish the Boston Architectural College (New England's largest private college of architectural design; and
- WHEREAS: Key features of the Kiosk engage elements of Blackall's earlier design, the 1893 Winthrop/Carter building (Boston's first steel skyscraper), which is currently under review for Boston Landmark status and whose roof line and masonry bear a striking resemblance to that of the Harvard Square Subway Kiosk; and
- WHEREAS: The Kiosk's design and character-defining features reflect and complement the Neo-Georgian Harvard Yard gates and brick facades that stand directly behind it; and
- WHEREAS: The site of the Kiosk was the epicenter of Harvard Square's transportation, commercial, academic, social and political activity for centuries, and more recently backdrop to demonstrations, performances, parades like the Lampoon Hasty Pudding Awards, and political events like the student strikes in the 1960s; and
- WHEREAS: The Kiosk is owned by the City of Cambridge and in 1977 the Massachusetts Historical Commission cited the Kiosk as "a single stable element in an environment of continual change"; and
- WHEREAS: The Cambridge Historical Commission (CHC) in 1978 identified the Kiosk as having extraordinary significance, as an example of mass transit architecture and as an internationally recognized symbol of Harvard Square, our city's unique, world renowned urban confluence; and
- WHEREAS: The Kiosk was dismantled during subway reconstruction in 1981, stored off-site, refurbished, and then restored with federal funds as a newsstand at its present location in 1984; and
- WHEREAS: In 1983, the Cambridge City Council enacted legislation designed to preserve and conserve buildings and sites of significance in Cambridge's history; and

## DESIGNATIONS

- WHEREAS: The Harvard Square Subway Kiosk was individually listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1978; and
- WHEREAS: The Kiosk was listed as contributing to the Harvard Square National Register District/Multiple Resources Area listing in 1982 and boundary increase listing in 1988; and
- WHEREAS: The Kiosk is situated within the boundaries of the Harvard Square Conservation District, specifically identified to be located within Subdistrict A: Harvard Square/Massachusetts Avenue, since 2000 when the Order was adopted; and
- WHEREAS: The Harvard Square National Register District abuts the Harvard Yard National Register District to the northeast, the Harvard Houses District to the south, and the Cambridge Common District to the north; and

## CURRENT THREATS

- WHEREAS: The Kiosk is now under threat from Harvard Square Infrastructure Improvements planned with \$4.6 million of City of Cambridge public money; and
- WHEREAS: Current protections under the Harvard Square Conservation District designation are not enough to save key elements of the Kiosk's historic form, architectural integrity, and cultural landscape; and
- WHEREAS: Prominent citizens have complained publicly about the Kiosk's becoming an "excuse for rampant commercialism," objectionable signs and lighting; and
- WHEREAS: In 1994, a landmark petition signed by 13 registered voters was submitted to the Cambridge Historical Commission to initiate, without delay, the process of designating the Harvard Square Subway Kiosk and its surrounding plaza as a protected landmark of the City of Cambridge, but the Cambridge Historical Commission decided that lease restrictions on the Kiosk were sufficient protection for the historic structure; and
- WHEREAS: The lease restrictions imposed by the Cambridge Historical Commission in 1994 and the design and use of the Kiosk are currently undergoing review; and
- WHEREAS: On September 12, 2016, City Council Policy Order #18: Protecting Harvard Square was approved and so ordered the City Manager to direct the Cambridge Historical Commission to produce a new status report that reviews the efficacy of the Harvard Square Conservation District since 2005; and

## BROADER SIGNIFICANCE

- WHEREAS: The Harvard Square Subway Kiosk is profoundly meaningful to Cambridge residents, business owners, visitors, educators, and students as emblematic of Harvard Square; and
- WHEREAS: As of September 27, 2016, over 600 people have signed an online petition circulated by The Our Harvard Square advocacy group, asking the City to landmark the Kiosk so that its essential architectural features are preserved during its proposed renovation and repurposing; as well as the several dozen signers of hard copy petitions; and

LANDMARK DESIGNATION

- WHEREAS: The Kiosk's design, architect, history, and setting makes it worthy of preservation as a Cambridge landmark; and
- WHEREAS: The Kiosk is one of a select number of properties that is important to Cambridge as a whole; and
- WHEREAS: Protecting the Kiosk with local landmark status will enable its unique qualities to be maintained for the benefit of all Cambridge now and in future; and
- WHEREAS: Notwithstanding the fact that the Harvard Square Subway Kiosk has been formally recognized as containing national significance, the City of Cambridge has yet to afford official local recognition and protected landmark status and all that such a designation offers; and
- WHEREAS: Official landmark designation would "foster appropriate use and wider public knowledge" of its distinctive characteristics and significance; and
- WHEREAS: Individually landmarking this emblematic structure is needed to ensure that public participation and review guidelines contribute to the historic and visual enhancement of the Harvard Square Subway Kiosk for future generations; so

THEREFORE do we, the undersigned registered voters of the City of Cambridge, pursuant to Ordinance 1002, Article III, Section 180(D) of Chapter 2.78 of the Cambridge Municipal Code, hereby respectfully pray that the Cambridge Historical Commission initiate with all possible haste the process of designating the Harvard Square Kiosk as a protected landmark of the City of Cambridge.

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# Public Squares, Private Money: Considering Harvard Square's Glittering, Empty Future

Is the entire idea of Harvard Square as we know it about to end? Or is the long, slow fade of street-level intellectual foment that once set it apart merely being accelerated?

Whether you consider the Square's heyday long past or not, news that the chopping block has been primed for two iconic institutions in the heart of the Square is still cause for alarm. Out of Town News, an incomparable international newsstand housed by the city of Cambridge next to the MBTA Red Line entrance, faces an uncertain future. So does the Curious George Store, the target of a redevelopment proposal that would oust the shop from the ground floor of one of the Square's most recognizable buildings at 1 JFK St.

Both venues are thriving cultural hubs, valued as one-of-a-kind institutions by many people who believe that they represent what Harvard Square still ought to be: a crossroads of inquiring minds and the resources it takes to sustain them.

Unfortunately, these landmarks — just a chapter book's toss from each other — do not fit the vision of a small handful of people who have grand designs but little desire to compromise. Their current vision: a Harvard Square in which ground-floor shops with open public access are replaced by empty atria.

Just seven years after negotiating to have Out of Town News operate the long-running stand in the center of the Square, the city has decided that the little cottage it occupies would be better redeveloped to resemble (in aesthetics if not scale) the soulless glass enclosure that now sits at the heart of another exclusive, blandly redeveloped regional gathering place — Boston's Kenmore Square.

Meanwhile, the firm that purchased the Curious George building has decided to match the city's plan by replacing the delightful children's bookstore and other tenants, including the Harvard Square Business Association and the offices of *Car Talk's* Dewey, Cheatham & Howe, with a glass entryway to an elevator that will lead to a rooftop pavilion. Owners of the Curious George Store have taken to Twitter in the hope that a groundswell of public support might spare them.

All places are subject to change, of course, and Harvard Square has never been an exception. At one time, local landlords managed local tenants. But with rising wealth, changing tastes and global forces, a new class of landlords and investment groups has changed the flavor and feel of the Square.

First came the quasi-chain stores, though they still had enough



character to pass muster for most locals. Not yet a national behemoth, Au Bon Pain moved into the Square in 1984. (It moved out earlier this year, after Harvard University announced plans for major changes to its location at the newly renamed Smith Campus Center.) In 1995, Barnes & Noble bought The COOP, but the bookstore remained semi-autonomous. Inevitably, chains like CVS and Starbucks followed, steadily working their way into the center of the Square. In 1997, Abercrombie & Fitch displaced The Tasty, the storied burger joint, sounding a death knell for the old Harvard Square. A branch of Citizens Bank now occupies the corner where, for 81 years beginning in 1916, Harvard students and Cambridge regulars took in the sandwich shop's fluorescent-lit, late night sustenance. This is just one example of a business, wholly unique to Harvard Square, vanishing behind another cookie cutter façade.

But at least the newcomers were points of commerce. That would not be the case with these new proposals, which are designed to remake a public square into a largely private one, in which the well-to-do and no one else have access to the upper floors of a once public building. The rest of us will be fast-tracked through a corridor of high-end eateries, clothing shops and locked front doors before being spat out at the other end. Everything about these non-spaces is designed to move us or block us, but nothing about them says what Harvard Square used to say to any visitor — something all squares should say -- *Stay awhile*.

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## Balancing Tradition and Development

*The city must not monkey around with the institutions that define the Square*

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The past year has witnessed tremendous and rapid changes to Harvard Square, with the beginning of the renovation of the Smith Campus Center and the closures of various restaurants and businesses along Mass. Ave. The new academic year has seemingly failed to halt the momentum of these alterations, with proposals floated in recent weeks by both the city of Cambridge and landlords to renovate various buildings in the Square. Both of these plans, however, have been met with vocal opposition by members of the wide Cambridge community, who seek to protect the historic nature of the Out of Town News k and the Curious George store that fronts the intersection of JFK Street and Brattle St. Partly in response to the aforementioned closures and also in response to the plans proposed by Equity One—the real estate investment firm that owns the building—to turn the Curious George store into an atrium and add two further stories, the Cambridge City Council is considering changes to zoning regulations to provide the city with more oversight to new developments in the Square.

It is undoubtedly true that change is vital to urban centers as a vehicle for regeneration, progress, and innovation. Though blockading change solely for sentimental purposes is misguided and shirks the need for progress, it is equally important to maintain the singular identity of Harvard Square and its surrounding area. Furthermore, given that the Square is

the venue for the day-to-day lives of many Cantabrigians, respectful and democratic debate over proposed changes is essential.

Much of the value and charm of the Square derives from the nature of the businesses and restaurants that currently populate it, and from its accessibility to Cantabrigians, Bostonians, and other locals, as well as to tourists from around the world. The Curious George store—as just one example—is a cherished landmark of the Square, as are the various other small restaurants and local shops. New developments and renovations to the infrastructure in the Square run the risk of raising rents beyond what is affordable to these businesses. Sacrificing local institutions in favor of big, outside corporations runs counter to the Square's distinct character, which, in conjunction with the University itself, makes the Harvard area such an important landmark.

At the same time, preserving the quirky flavor of the Square and its institutions should not impede progress and improvement. For instance, Equity One has prioritized accessibility by including an elevator in its plans for the lobby that would replace the Curious George store—similar to accessibility improvements made to the Harvard Square T stop four years ago.

Though accessibility may be an area in which the Square gains from modifications to its buildings and businesses, we are still concerned about the extent to which the Square has become unfriendly to the small, iconic businesses that have populated the area for decades. Ideally, these institutions would make strides toward greater accessibility as we work to preserve the traditions, institutions, and unique character that define Harvard Square.

WHEREAS: On December 18, 2000, following a period of intense public concern about the redevelopment of the Read Block in Harvard Square and the displacement of longtime retail and commercial tenants like The Tasty, the City Council unanimously approved the creation of the Harvard Square Neighborhood Conservation District; and

WHEREAS: The order required the Cambridge Historical Commission to submit a status report and hold a public hearing after the first five years on the effectiveness of the District in meeting its overarching goal of balancing the rights of property owners, retailers' needs for flexibility, and the community's interest in preserving the character and livability of Harvard Square; and

WHEREAS: The Historical Commission issued a District Five-Year Status Report on December 12, 2005, which concluded that the District guidelines had been an effective regulatory tool, and further recommended that all neighborhood conservation districts be studied for their activity and effectiveness every five years; and

WHEREAS: No status report on the Harvard Square Neighborhood Conservation District has been issued since the initial report in 2005; and

WHEREAS: Now, eleven years later, Harvard Square is again facing intense development pressure as sharply rising rents and property values continue to displace commercial tenants, erode the vitality and diversity of the neighborhood's retail activity, and threaten its historic character and unique sense of place; and

WHEREAS: While much of the city's planning energy has been focused on Kendall Square, Central Square and Alewife, Harvard Square has not undergone a recent planning study to address some of the challenges that are beyond the authority of a neighborhood conservation district, such as preserving neighborhood-serving retail, small storefronts, and independent businesses that are essential to maintaining the unique sense of place that makes Harvard Square attractive and valuable beyond its historic bricks and mortar; and

WHEREAS: Envision Cambridge is a three-year citywide planning process that began earlier this year and a citywide action plan is not expected to be released until the end of 2018; and

WHEREAS: Immediate action is needed to meet the pressing challenges of preserving the economic vitality and viability of historic Harvard Square; now therefore be it

ORDERED: That the City Manager be and hereby is requested to direct the Historical Commission to produce a new status report that reviews the Harvard Square Conservation District's effectiveness since 2005, and that considers whether new zoning regulations may be necessary to fulfill the community's goals; and be it further

ORDERED: That the City Manager be and hereby is requested to confer with the Historical Commission, the Community Development Department, Envision Cambridge, and report back as soon as possible with recommendations for producing an expedited action plan to preserve and restore Harvard Square's economic diversity, livability and vitality.

## Preserving the Harvard Square Kiosk

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To the editor:

What makes a building an icon? There are many factors: design, history, placement, or numerous and diverse people interacting with it on a regular basis. The Harvard Square Kiosk — home to Out-of-Town News — is one such icon. Today the Kiosk is facing a sizable threat to its distinctive historic features through renovation efforts to revitalize Harvard Square. The structure, completed in 1928, once served as Harvard Square’s main subway entrance. The Kiosk’s exuberant outward-curving wing-like copper roof evokes ideas of travel while sheltering waiting travelers. When a new subway entrance was built in the early 1980s, the Kiosk was relocated to its current site and became a highly sought-out locale for newspaper and magazine sales. Cell phones now carry much of this information and Out-of-Town News will close shortly.

What will become of the Kiosk? Hopefully we can add our voices to the decision-making process. For now, safeguarding its historic form is critical and rests largely with the preservation wording in its vendor’s lease. There is real concern that planned renovations will destroy core features, including much of the historic brickwork and iron detailing (designed to complement the nearby Harvard Gate by the famed architectural firm of McKim, Mead, and White). Also envisaged is the replacement of the current windows with LED back-lit ground-to-roof plate glass. Designed originally as a visual bridge between the

nearby historic brick campus buildings and the bustling movement of people and goods in the commercial district across the street, the Kiosk may lose much of its distinctive detail and character.

While it has been on the National Register of Historic Places since 1978, granting the Kiosk official Landmark status will protect it, so that future generations of Harvard students, Cantabrigians, and visitors can experience its iconic and historic form. Some proposed changes seem minor, but the iconic is found in the details. It may be hard to appreciate this in familiar buildings like the Kiosk, but when such details are eradicated, future generations will mourn their loss and wonder why preservation wasn't self-evident.

## City Manager Letter

August 4, 2003

To the Honorable, the City Council:

I am submitting a request that the City Council authorize me to issue a Request for Proposals ("RFP") to solicit proposals for the lease of property owned by the City in Harvard Square, known as the Harvard Square Kiosk at Zero Harvard Square (the "Kiosk"). The property is located proximate to the main Massachusetts Bay Transit Authority ("MBTA") Red Line subway entrance in a building presently entitled "Out Of Town News." The Kiosk was restored and adaptively reused as a newsstand in 1984 and has been so used since then. The Kiosk is listed on the National Register of Historic Places, and is protected by a provision in the current lease that requires that the Cambridge Historical Commission approve any exterior alteration, construction, or demolition. For many years the City Council has supported the use of the property as a newsstand. The current lease will expire on September 30, 2003. If the City Council continues to support that use at the site, then in my opinion it would make sense to diminish the process for disposition, and move directly to preparation of an RFP soliciting proposals from anyone interested in leasing the property for use as a newsstand. I have attached a draft RFP for your information. If, alternatively, the City Council does not wish to continue the newsstand use of the site, then I will begin the full process for disposition. This proposal requires action by the City Council.

First, the proposal must be considered by the Council pursuant to Chapter 2.110 of the Cambridge Municipal Code, which governs the disposition of city-owned property. I believe this disposition may properly be subject to Section 2.110.010 (G) of that ordinance. Section G provides for the disposition of city-owned property where the full process of the ordinance would be unduly burdensome. Under this section, the City Manager may request of the City Council a diminution of the process in the ordinance; approval of this request requires a two-thirds vote of the City Council. Assuming continued use of the site as a newsstand, I recommend such approval at this time.

Secondly, Section 2.110.010 also requires a two-thirds vote of the City Council to authorize the City Manager to grant the lease to the bidder whose proposal best meets the comparative evaluation criteria as set forth in the RFP. I also recommend that the City Council vote to authorize me to issue the RFP, to grant the lease to the successful bidder, and to execute and deliver a lease in such form and substance as I determine is necessary or advisable.

### Description of the Property

The Kiosk is located in Harvard Square proximate to the northerly end of the MBTA Red Line subway entrance in Harvard Square, in a building presently entitled "Out Of Town News." The property is a small one-story wood frame structure.

The Kiosk was constructed in 1928 by the Boston Elevated Railway, the predecessor of the MBTA, to replace the original subway head-house of 1912, which was considered a menace to traffic. Its original function was to shelter the stairs and escalators leading to the station platforms.

The building was designed by a member of the faculty at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology to be transparent to the vehicular traffic that then surrounded the site on all three sides. The low masonry walls used hand-made brick and limestone in a manner imitating the nearby Widener gates to Harvard Yard. The roof is supported on slender brick and limestone pillars and all the intervening spaces were glazed for visibility through the structure.

The Kiosk was restored and adaptively reused as a newsstand in 1984 after having been dismantled and stored off-site during construction of the MBTA's Red Line Extension project. The restoration was designed by Peter Hopkinson and Edward Tsoi of Skidmore, Owings & Merrill.

The Kiosk was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1978, after it was identified by the Cambridge Historical Commission as having extraordinary significance as an example of mass transit architecture and as an internationally recognized symbol of Harvard Square. The structure is and will continue to be protected by a provision of the lease requiring that any exterior alteration, construction, or demolition of the structure or its appurtenances be approved by the Cambridge Historical Commission as though the building were a designated landmark under the



provisions of Section 2.78.139A Article III of the Municipal Code or were within a Historic District established under Chapter 40C of the Massachusetts General Laws. The structure is also located in the Harvard Square Conservation District, which carries similar protection. The property is located in a Business B zoning district.

### **Description of Lease and Financial Arrangements**

The tenant space to be occupied by the lessee is in a one-story wood frame structure containing 451 square feet of rentable space and on the outside ground areas directly under the roof overhang of the structure; an additional amount of outside ground area of up to three feet beyond the perimeter of the roof overhang may be available in the City's discretion if the lessee so desires. The heating and air conditioning are electric. There are no bathroom facilities.

The City's RFP will require a minimal rental rate of \$130.00 per square foot of area. This rate is based on the history of the location with its current newsstand use, and because smaller retail spaces historically bring higher per square foot rents. The City Assessor has estimated the market rent for this property as being \$130.00 to \$150.00 per square foot.

I am recommending that the City enter into a lease for five years, with a five-year term of renewal at the City's option. The lease will provide that any additional ground area beyond the perimeter of the roof overhang that the lessee desires to occupy may be added to the lease at the City's option and in its sole discretion at any time during the term of the lease or extension thereof at the rental rate for the leased area then in effect. In addition, the lessee will be responsible for all maintenance and repairs to the building and grounds around the building and all expenses related thereto and for maintaining adequate insurance, and for payment of all taxes, water and sewer charges for the full term of the lease, and snow and ice removal, rubbish removal, all utilities, and all repairs required to maintain the building and outside ground areas leased or maintained, including a minimum of ten feet beyond the perimeter of the entire building and the provision of clear access to the building from all public ways adjacent thereto, in compliance with all applicable provisions of law, regulations, and building codes.

### **Request for Diminution of Process Stipulated in Chapter 2.110**

Chapter 2.110 of the Cambridge Municipal Code on the disposition of city-owned property allows for a diminution of the full process otherwise required by the ordinance if that process would be unduly burdensome. Assuming continued use of the site as a newsstand, I believe that subsection (G) is appropriate for review of this proposal, and I thus request that a limited review process be approved.

Limiting the scope of review for the requested disposition would be consistent with the expressed objective of the procedure required by the Chapter: to render "a fair analysis of how the greatest public benefit can be obtained from the City property in question." I believe that the information furnished in this letter is sufficient to enable the City Council to make a determination on this matter. Carrying out a more detailed review would require a significant amount of money and staff time. Since the procedure set forth in the Chapter would be costly and the use of this property is one that is consistent with City Council policy and has already been successfully in place for some time, I believe this to be the type of disposition anticipated by subsection (G) which allows for a simpler process; and I therefore request that you approve a diminution of the full disposition review process.

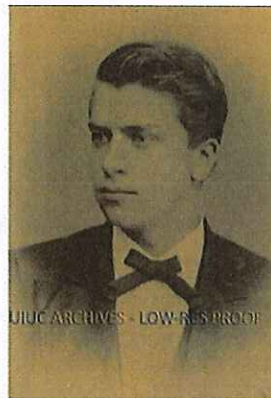
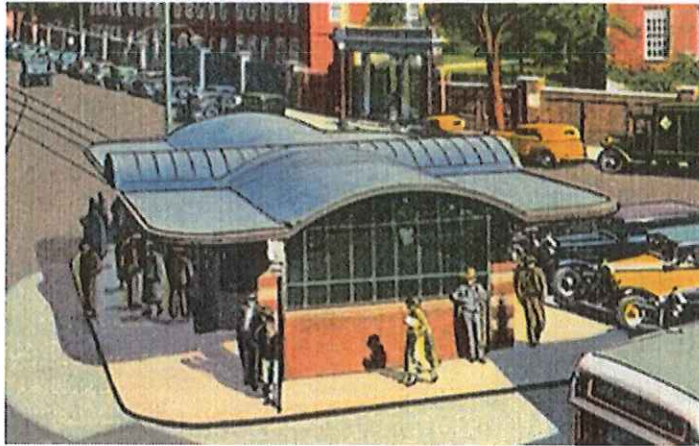

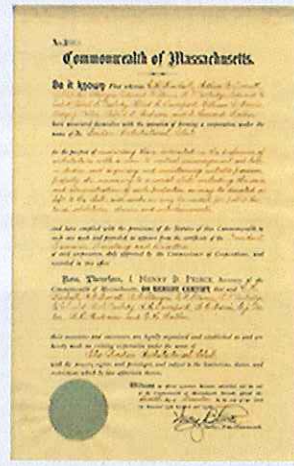

## Clarence H. Blackall: The first President of the Boston Architecture Club (now college)

The Boston Architectural College was established as The Boston Architectural Club in 1889 by a group of both young and established local architects. The BAC's founders designed hospitals, churches, libraries, schools, theatres, and many notable homes in Back Bay and Fenway; started influential companies, including Peabody & Stearns and A. H. Davenport & Company; and boasted two future AIA presidents, R. Clipston Sturgis and Robert S. Peabody. One notable founder, Edward C. Cabot, served as the president of the Boston Society of Architects for nearly 30 years and designed the Boston Athenaeum.

According to its original charter, the founders created the Club "for the purpose of associating those interested in the profession of architecture with a view to mutual encouragement and help in studies." The BAC was envisioned as a broad community not just for architects but also sculptors, painters, decorative artists, and patrons of the arts. Clarence Blackall, the Club's first president, was passionate about creating an open and inclusive society, a tenet that is an essential part of the BAC's mission today. This accessibility attracted many first- and second-generation immigrants, who often could not attend traditional colleges.



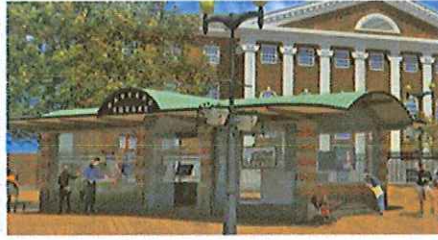

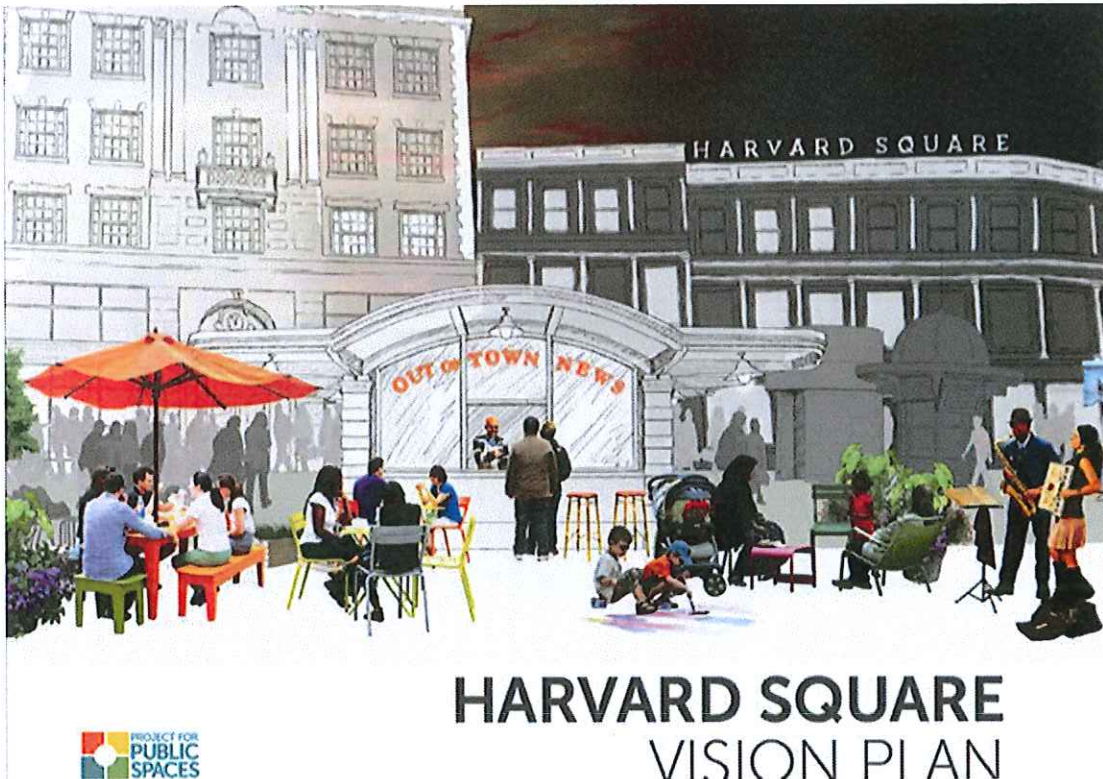

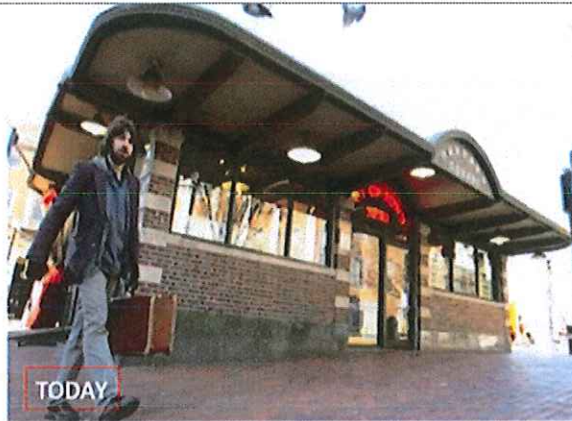

WHEREAS the Harvard Square subway kiosk has been a distinctive landmark and traditional focus of the square since it was constructed in 1928 to replace the hazardous subway head house of 1912; and

WHEREAS the kiosk was named to the National Register of Historic Places in 1978 after the Cambridge Historical Commission identified it as having extraordinary significance as an example of mass transit architecture and as an internationally recognized symbol of Harvard Square, our city's unique, world-renowned urban confluence; and

WHEREAS the Massachusetts Historical Commission in 1977 cited the kiosk as "a single stable element in an environment of continual change"; and

WHEREAS the kiosk was dismantled during subway reconstruction in 1981, stored off-site, refurbished, and then restored with federal funds as a newsstand at its present location in 1984; and

WHEREAS the current occupant of the kiosk, Out of Town News, has recently undergone a change in ownership; and
