



Engaging with the Cambridge Community

This term, my office planned events and outreach initiatives with two goals in mind: increasing accessibility and celebrating diversity.

CONSTITUENT SUPPORT

Fostering consistent and accessible dialogue has been a key focus. My Office has established approachable spaces to connect with constituents through various channels, including phone, email, social media, walkins, and office-sponsored events like Coffee Hours, community resource fairs, and Meet & Greets at Cambridge Housing Authority buildings. This term, we received nearly **5,000 inquiries**, providing direct support and connecting residents with essential services.



How constituent inquiries, received through phone, email, social media, or walk-ins, were successfully resolved. Our collaboration with city departments and agencies ensures that residents receive timely assistance, from bill payments with the Cambridge Economic Opportunity Committee to mobility needs with the Traffic, Parking, and Transportation Department. Additionally, partnerships with De Novo, Greater Boston Legal Services, the offices of Senators Warren and Markey, Congresswomen Pressley and Clark, and Representative Decker have facilitated access to representation for our community members.

COMMUNITY EVENTS

Engaging with thousands of constituents at events this term, my office continued annual favorites such as Bollywood Night and the Warm Hearts for Warm Feet Sock Drive. We also introduced new initiatives, including a Free Community Skate Day in collaboration with the Canal District Skate Rink and an annual Rindge Reunion. Other notable moments include:

- Partnering with the City's Employees' Committee on Diversity, CPS Muslim Affinity Committee, and the Islamic Society of Boston to host Cambridge's largest Community Iftar, with over 1,000 attendees.
- Continuing the annual Winter Support
 Drive that has raised a total of \$160,000

 in support of Cambridge families and
 seniors.
- Delivering remarks at over 250 community events and gatherings.

Pushing Policy Priorities Forward

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Building a Better Cambridge

This term, I have worked closely with my colleagues to get a number of important policies passed and implemented. Some of these are ongoing and will continue into next term, but I wanted to share a few that I am most excited about.

At the last City Council meeting in June, updates to the Building Energy Use **Disclosure Ordinance (BEUDO)** passed, aiming to decarbonize our buildings and meet our zero emissions goals. By 2035, large commercial buildings responsible for half of our emissions must be at zero emissions. I want to express my gratitude to the activists and building owners who have actively participated in shaping this policy.

Working with my colleagues, we established the City's first Charter Review Committee two years ago, and the members are finalizing their work. After working closely with a number of cities in the region, I signed the Commonwealth Development **Compact**, which puts Cambridge on a path to diversify the real estate development pipeline, which is currently a male dominated industry with very little diversity.

I also appointed two Working Groups: the **Climate Crisis Working Group** and the Fare-Free Working Group to engage residents and stakeholders and push forward these policy priorities. Working with Councillor Nolan, who chaired the Climate Crisis Working Group, we released a strong report and some of the key recommendations have been acted upon this term.

I must also commend the **Cambridge** Youth Council and our Student School **Committee Representatives** for their exceptional leadership in advancing our policy priorities. Their efforts to register students to vote, advocate for the wider teaching of AP African American Studies courses, and create the Youth Headspace campaign, which aims to destigmatize conversations about mental health, have been instrumental in driving positive change within our community. In collaboration with the CRLS **Title IX** Aurelia Advocates we also updated the language about sexual violence and reporting in the Title IX policy.

Other policies that I worked on and passed include the City purchasing property to utilize for affordable housing and modernizing our Parental Leave Policy to double the leave time from 8 weeks to 16 weeks and include loss of pregnancy.

Rise Up Cambridge Providing Financial Dignity and Stability

This year, Cambridge made history as the only city in the country to provide **cash** assistance to all families in poverty. Our groundbreaking initiative, Rise Up Cambridge, is an expansion of the successful pilot program, CambridgeRISE. The program delivers \$500 in direct cash assistance to lowincome Cambridge households with children aged 21 or under, earning at or below 250 percent of the Federal Poverty Level. This 18month initiative is a \$22 million commitment from my Office and the City of Cambridge managed in partnership with the Cambridge Community Foundation, using funds received by the City from the Federal American Rescue Plan Act.

Currently, **1,922 households** (6,450 residents) are benefitting from this initiative. I am so glad that we are succeeding in the program's goal of addressing the growing economic divide and racial inequities in Cambridge, while maintaining our city's diverse population and continuing to be a place where all families can thrive.

Our success led to invitations to join Dr. Bernice King and the Economic Security Project at the **Guaranteed Income Now** conference in Atlanta, Georgia. I also spoke at the **Stanford University Basic Income Lab's symposium** called 'Guaranteed Income in Martin Luther King Jr.'s Vision for Racial and Economic Justice.'

An exciting highlight throughout this process was attending the Tribeca Film Festival in New York City for the premiere of "It's **Basic,**" a documentary that explores the history of Guaranteed Basic Income in America. The film, put together by Michael Tubbs of Mayor's for Guaranteed Income and Blowback Productions, features Cambridge, our RISE pilot, and the expansion. In September, hundreds of people joined us for the Cambridge premiere of the film at the American Repertory Theater. Representing Cambridge and our ongoing efforts to address income inequality on the big screen and across the country has been awesome!







School Committee Priorities

Access to equitable education



Ensuring that education remains accessible to all, regardless of financial constraints, has been a huge undertaking. This term, we launched four initiatives aimed at alleviating the financial burdens associated with education at all levels.

Cambridge Preschool Program: In 2022, I established The Universal Pre-K Ad-Hoc Committee in collaboration with the Office of Early Childhood Education to move forward on an initiative that has been a City Council priority for decades. With the support of City Manager Huang's \$10 million Universal Pre-K Stabilization Fund, we launched the Cambridge Preschool Program. This publicly-funded initiative provides free school-day, school-year preschool to every 4-year-old and some 3-year-olds living in Cambridge. Applications are currently open, and families will be notified of their child's placement in March 2024. I am glad to have collaborated with City and community partners to provide every child with access to a high-quality preschool education.

Cambridge Promise Pilot: Since September 2022, a working group led by my office, City

staff, the Cambridge Public School District, the College Success Initiative, Cambridge School Committee Members, and the Cambridge Community Foundation, has been working to address the inequities in degree attainment and the rising cost of college. In September, we launched the Cambridge Promise Pilot, allowing up to 30 eligible students enrolled at Bunker Hill Community College to receive a "last dollar plus scholarship," which covers tuition and fees for the 2023-2024 academic year, including school-related expenses not covered by a student's Pell Grant and outside scholarships. Additionally, each student receives an extra \$250 stipend each semester and a College Success Initiative Coach. In a remarkable show of support, MIT and Harvard University each committed \$25,000 to fully fund the pilot in its first year.



Early College: In 2022, School Committee Members Ayesha Wilson and Fred Fantini and my office collaborated with the school district and Lesley University to initiate an Early College Program. We have since expanded to include the Benjamin Franklin Institute, and we are actively working on adding an education track to Lesley's course options. Early College programs like ours are proven to retain first-generation, immigrant, and students of color beyond their first year of college, allowing them to graduate college early and with less debt. In April 2022, Lesley University and CRLS received a state designation as a Massachusetts Early College Program and over 100 students have participated in this opportunity to earn college credits while fulfilling their high school graduation requirements.

MBTA cards: In collaboration with the Cambridge Youth Council, we secured funding for all Cambridge Rindge and Latin School, High School Extension Program (HSEP), home school, and charter school students who reside in the district to receive a free MBTA Charlie Card this school year.



School Visits: Along with developing those initiatives, throughout the term I have connected with 50 Cambridge Public School classrooms. Whether it's welcoming them to City Hall or visiting their schools, it has been a joy to share insights into local government, answer their questions, and hear their thoughts on how we can continue to improve as a City.



Global Citizenship

Fostering Collaboration

Cambridge remains at the forefront of progressive policies and innovation, and it's a privilege to showcase our successes both nationally and internationally. This term, I met with **foreign dignitaries** from Armenia, Canada, El Salvador, Japan, and Turkey. We exchanged ideas, collaborated on common challenges, and highlighted the exceptional work happening in our cities.

I participated in the **National League of Cities** Congressional City Conference in Washington DC with the Cambridge Youth Council where we connected with Congresswoman Ayanna Pressley and Representative Jim McGovern. In Orlando, Florida, the school committee shared our strategies for addressing educational challenges at the **National School Boards Association** CUBE Conference.


