March 17, 2015

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ELLEN WATSON: Good evening. We are in the meeting of the Cambridge License Commission. Today is Tuesday, March 17, 2015. It is 6:03 p.m.

We are in the Basement Conference Room of the Michael J. Lombardi Building, 831

Massachusetts Avenue, Cambridge, Mass.

Meeting tonight, License Commission Chair Andrea Jackson, Police Commissioner Robert Haas, and Fire Chief Gerald Reardon.

This meeting is being audio taped and videotaped.

I want to let you know that one item has been removed from the agenda, it has been continued, and that is the application of Sunnywoods, Inc., doing business as Cilantro.

The first item -- if you have your cell phone or any electronic devices, please silence them and make sure the back door remains open.

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APPLICATION: SHANTI BOSTON, LLC

D/B/A SHANTI

ELLEN WATSON: The first application is

Shanti, Boston, LLC, doing business as Shanti,

Solmon Chowdhury, manager, has applied for a new

wine and malt beverages restaurant license at 250

Kendall Square with proposed hours of 11 a.m. to

11 p.m. seven days per week and a seating

capacity of 50 inside and 24 seasonal patio seats

on private property.

ATTY SEAN HOPE: Good evening, Ma'am

Chair and Members of the Commission. For the

record, Attorney Sean Hope, Hope Legal Law

Offices in Cambridge and I'm here tonight with

Solmon Chowdhury, C-H-O-W-D-H-U-R-Y.

He's the manager of Shanti Boston, LLC, one of the managers, and the d/b/a is Shanti.

This is an application requesting a common victualer license as well as a beer and wine license to operate a 50-seat restaurant located in Kendall Square at 250 Kendall Street.

That's the address of the building. There's actually a cluster of restaurants that are located on the Broad Canal at the intersection of new Kendall Broad Canal.

This is an area that's gonna be ground-floor retail space. Currently it's vacant space with no utilities, no venting, so it's really lost space.

Part of the agreement with the landlord is that the landlord was going to contribute substantial funds to be able to build this restaurant out.

Just to remind the Commission, this is an

area that was built out under a PUD.

This was lots of vacant parking lots

before the rezoning three or four years ago and

it turned a lot of this empty area into office

and lab, and part of the focus for the community

was to have ground-floor retail and so they

changed the zoning to allow for this ground-floor

retail. The License Commission has seen

restaurants such as Za, Tatte and some -- I think

Evoo is also in that same cluster that's come

before the Commission.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Now, is this -I'm sorry, counsel, I don't mean to cut you off.

Is this going to be located in that same area, in that same space where those are at or --

ATTY SEAN HOPE: Adjacent to that.

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: It's a space, 2,100 square foot right next to Evoo.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Okay.

ATTY SEAN HOPE: That cluster.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Okay, thank you.

I'm sorry, I didn't mean to cut you off.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: And this,

Counselor, has been space that hasn't been used

yet, it has been vacant since construction?

ATTY SEAN HOPE: Yeah, exactly. From

2013 I know that it's been vacant. They may have

used it as some staging or something, but it

hasn't been a restaurant or any other retail use.

So the thing is, the PUD created and allowed for this use.

The restaurant is going to be called

Shanti and we brought out some of the flyers.

This is also in the folder, but it talks a little about the restaurant concept.

It is north Indian cuisine. There's a range of different Indian cuisine.

Although this is Mr. Chowdhury's first

restaurant-only in Cambridge, Shanti has been around for over a decade, it goes back to 1999, there was a location in Dorchester, which was the original location, and they opened one up recently in Roslindale.

This would be the third location owned and operated by the same limited liability company in Cambridge.

They have a following for the food. I hear the goat is what Solmon's telling me it's one of their specialty dishes. But they've had a lot of awards with the food. All the same -- restaurants are the same where it's food first and is not entertainment.

These are local neighborhood restaurants, and they have done well and so this would be the first one in Cambridge, and Kendall Square would be the location we're proposing.

The management, and Mr. Chowdhury can

tell you more about it, they have a corporate executive chef and his information is in the packet. They call him Andy, Ananda Porkhel, he's the corporate executive chef.

He will be doing the initial training of the staff and getting the restaurant up and running and until they can hire a GM, or someone to take over, but Solmon's gonna be the manager under the beer and wine license.

But the corporate chef is gonna come to essentially train the cooking staff and open it.

In addition to the 50 seats, there are 25 patio seats on a private patio. Many of the streets are owned by the different real estate investments trusts in terms of the fee and then they are managed separate ways, but this will be on private property and the patio will be seasonal within the requirements of the License Commission.

And in terms of outreach, most of the neighbors and abutters are different office lab uses but we actually went -- it's east Cambridge, over Binney Street and we met with members of the East Cambridge Planning Team. We didn't meet with their organization but we met with two of their members, had coffee at the cafe and walked through the planned proposal.

We actually have a letter, I'm not sure if it made it to the file, from Barbara
Broussard, she's one of the members, and we also met with Charlie Marquardt, he's the proprietor for Cambridge Spirits, and he's gonna be a direct neighbor, and he had some questions about the restaurant and he also brought up the idea of wanting to know what entertainment was going to be there or not. So he was satisfied with the build-out. He actually was very helpful in dealing with the landlord and some of the

build-out issues. But we have neighborhood support. We also have a letter from the Kendall Square Business Association, and they wrote a letter as well supporting the active retail uses, so we are exciting to get started, if we're approved, and you know, we have a substantial build-out to complete, but I think that -- we hope you approve the applications.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: So this location has never been build-out before as we sit here, correct?

ATTY SEAN HOPE: Yes.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: This build-out, what you're gonna do, fryolators and tandoori, or a combination of each or --

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: We will have a fryolator but it will have a tandoori, but we use gas tandoori, we don't use the charcoal. We use some specialty rocks that go into the tandoori,

so there's no smoke or any of that, that I know that there's issue previously with charcoal tandooris, so we don't --

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: Well, there's actually legal issues with mixing fuels, so gas and so --

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: So we are using gas tandooris. We have two of them.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: So when they built the building out, they obviously allowed for vent space and so forth for this -- for this unit to be all designed in terms of a hood getting venting and all, or --

ATTY SEAN HOPE: Yeah, we're still having the contractor look at this, but I believe some of the first-floor tenants were venting into the garage below.

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: No. We actually already -- there's four restaurants,

they all doing the exact same thing, they are venting into the front of the building, and so we're doing the exact same thing. We already met designers and stuff and they came up with the plan and the landlord actually looked it over, but, of course, we will go through all the permitting process.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: But you've already gone through the steps of --

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: Exactly.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: -- covering with the landlord with the venting, obviously, the hardest part of any of this is --

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: Yup.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: So your own two locations seem to have pretty good accolades?

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: Yeah.

So I got into restaurant business -- actually, I was doing some real estate in

Dorchester, and there wasn't any Indian restaurant, and I just decided to open an Indian restaurant there, which was 15 years ago, and it became like a neighborhood staple, and it does really well and we were approached by also Roslindale Village to open a similar restaurant and we ended up doing that. That is also doing well.

So in Kendall Square there's no Indian restaurant and we thought that there's a huge need for it and also the landlords were actually seeking out Indian restaurant and we thought we would be the perfect fit for that neighborhood.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: So you are looking to do very similar cuisine and style as the other two restaurants?

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: Exactly. It will be the exact same set-up. We'll have about 50 seats, we'll try and keep it under 50, so it's

easier to manage, concentrate a little bit on the take-out and delivery also.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: So you've had the Dorchester location since 1999, and then Roslindale since 2013?

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: Exactly. And there will be the exact same menu. We do, like, some specials once a month and we do some spice classes and stuff in the restaurant.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: And who manges the Dorchester and Roslindale location?

restaurant for 15 years, one thing we learned is we promote from our existing business, so the manager who actually would be managing has been with us for about 12 years how, so he's our chef.

So we have a lot of people that have worked with us for a long time. So one of the manager that work for us for 12 years is going to

come in and manage the place also.

POLICE COMMISSIONER ROBERT HAAS: You're serving alcohol in the two Boston locations?

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: We have beer and wine licenses.

POLICE COMMISSIONER ROBERT HAAS: In both of them?

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: In both of them.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: And you will be listed as the manager of record on this one?

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: Yes, uh-huh.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: Is the plan to have the kitchen area towards the front of the building, off to the side, or in the rear?

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: In the rear of the building, the rear exit.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: And vent everything forward?

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: Right, exactly.

We are using some specialty hoods that has filters and stuff that basically cleans the air.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: Scrubbers.

POLICE COMMISSIONER ROBERT HAAS: Have you had issues with your exhaust system in the other two locations at all?

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: No.

POLICE COMMISSIONER ROBERT HAAS: Fires or anything?

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: No. Never.

We have been there 15 years. Never had any issue.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Who do we have letters of support from?

ELLEN WATSON: We have Barbara Broussard of the East Cambridge Neighborhood Association,
Charles Marquardt of Cambridge Spirits, and Vice Mayor Benzan.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: Lunch is more a buffet-type style?

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: Yeah, so what we found we have building the business for a long time and lunchtime we can only serve so many people so the best way to do it is buffet. Everyone has a lot of different options to choose from and they can get in and out quickly and I think in Kendall also there's a huge need for lunch and it will be very successful for the lunch buffet.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: Dinner is generally cooked to order and sit down?

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: Exactly, sit down, yes.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: All right, and you are looking for seven days a week 11 a.m. to 11 p.m.?

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: Yes. Uh-huh.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Have you been to

21 Proof training recently?

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: We just had one at $\label{eq:months} \text{Moksa maybe six months ago and I was there too.}$

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: When are you looking at, if approved? When are you looking at opening?

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: We'll probably have three months of construction time, hopefully, if everything goes as well. It might be a little longer, but we want to get it going as soon as possible.

POLICE COMMISSIONER ROBERT HAAS: So you're saying sometime in July, you think?

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: We are hoping to be open by July.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Again, no entertainment, correct?

ATTY SEAN HOPE: That's correct.

SOLMON CHOWDHURY: Just background music

like a CD player or something.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Do we have that noted in the file?

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Any questions?

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: No questions.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Any questions?

POLICE COMMISSIONER ROBERT HAAS: No other questions.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Are there any members of the public that wish to be heard in this matter?

Please come forward.

DAVID DOWNING: My name is David Downing,

D-O-W-N-I-N-G. I am here on behalf of the

landlord Principal Real Estate Investors and we

are here in support of Solmon's license

application.

We've spent the last six-plus months getting to know Solmon and visiting his restaurants understanding his concept, and we're truly excited for him to come into Kendall. don't have an Indian restaurant in Kendall Square. The closest thing is Central. You know, it's a very modest operation, but it also meets the needs of the general public in the area, so we're really excited about him to come in and enliven and activate kinda the last remaining piece of that watermark strip, which has watermark one and watermark two, so this is kinda the last piece that's right in the middle that we are excited to fill out.

That's been a vacant for over a year-and-a-half and we have been searching for a tenant, the right tenant, to fit that mix, and we've turned down a number of folks that just didn't, you know, they are white tablecloth or

they were just something that just wasn't as accessible or unique as we are looking for.

really excited about it. And also as a customer,

I actually just moved to Roslindale, I have been

visiting Solmon's spot out there and the food is

fantastic. Some of the best Indian food I have

ever had, so we are thrilled to have him coming

in and we're excited to get him open as soon as

possible.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: You are all set.

ELLEN WATSON: Application: 47 Palmer,
Inc., doing business as Passim, Dan Hogan,
manager, holder of a wine and malt beverage
restaurant license at 26 Church Street for a new
common victualer license to be exercised at said
address.

Applicant is applying for hours from 7 a.m. to 1 a.m. seven days a week with 115 seats inside and 12 seasonal seats on the private patio.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Good evening.

DAN HOGAN: Good evening.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: If you could all please state your name for the record spelling your first name and last name.

BRANDON ARMS: Brandon Arms,

B-R-A-N-D-O-N A-R-M-S.

DAN HOGAN: Dan Hogan, D-A-N H-O-G-A-N.

MATT SMITH: Matt Smith, M-A-T-T S-M-I-T-H.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Keep it nice and simple.

DAN HOGAN: So we're applying for this license. As you probably know, Veggie Plant has been our subtenant for over a dozen years and went out of business last August, and since that time we have been renovating the restaurant to establish and take over the restaurant on our own.

We have been lucky to have, Brandon Arms, as our executive chef. We've pretty much completed the renovation process. We are in the final stages of getting inspections and hope to open, if we get approved, by end of this week, if not next week.

The restaurant for us is pretty vital for fulfillment of our mission.

Our mission is to provide an exceptional musical experience for everybody to help artists in all stages of their career and to build a vibrant music community.

One of the things that's really important to us is to have the restaurant function to be so that people don't just simply come to listen to music but come ahead of time and congregate and become part of the community.

In addition, with our being able to now have full control of the space at all times of day, at lunchtime, for example, we're now going to be able to have music, un-ticketed music, where we can have artists come in, young artists, who are just starting out and give them an opportunity to play on the Passim stage, which is also nice for the patrons.

In addition, we've been on the weekends already having children's concerts in the morning, and we will be able to do that as well during the week with preschool children and the families of those children.

So it gives us a much better opportunity to really fulfill our mission and we hope the City will approve our license.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: So when you talk about renovations, are they kitchen renovations or space renovations or just cosmetic renovations?

When you are talking about the renovations, are they cosmetic, or are they --

DAN HOGAN: We completed gutted the kitchen in terms of we got rid of all the old equipment and have, you know, new grease traps, new free bays, new everything, \$2,700 worth of copper and counting, for the -- just for the

venting of the three bays, so it's not changed a lot, but it's greatly updated.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: You updated a lot of your equipment especially in the kitchen?

DAN HOGAN: Everything is new.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: Kitchen space relatively the same in terms of layout or just --

DAN HOGAN: It's relatively the same, it's expanded maybe like six inches to a foot. We moved a wall some.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: And you have -- you're changing your venting as well? Are you doing fryolators?

BRANDON ARMS: Fryolators, yeah.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: And you are venting those?

BRANDON ARMS: To the roof.

And you're also aware of the -- because of your seating over 100 the crowd manager requirement?

DAN HOGAN: Yes, we have that in place.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: Just to remind you.

DAN HOGAN: Yup.

FIRE CHIEF GERALD REARDON: When are you going to be looking for your final inspections on this?

DAN HOGAN: This week we hope. We had the fire inspection last week.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Can you tell us about a little about your experience?

BRANDON ARMS: As far as the start-up or my cooking experience?

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Cooking experience.

BRANDON ARMS: Oh, jeez.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Briefly. Real brief.

BRANDON ARMS: I was cooking when I was ten-years-old.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: We don't have that much time. You can just kinda move up a little bit.

BRANDON ARMS: So basically I cooked 11 years in Madison, Wisconsin and decided that I needed some help opening some bigger doors and I went to culinary school in Vermont at NECI, New England Culinary Institute.

After graduating there, I did -- I actually the accelerated program, which I did the whole program in a year as opposed to going on two internships, and then I ended up getting a job with head -- after leaving culinary school, I came to Boston and I got a job at Clio, worked there for like two and half years, became chef de

partie, this, that and the other thing.

I went off join Will Gilson at Garden at the Cellar for a long time and I was there and that was that, and I've moved on since.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: All right.

What is your role?

MATT SMITH: I'm the managing director of the club.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: How long have you been there?

MATT SMITH: 20 years.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Keep it nice and simple.

MATT SMITH: 20 years in August. Almost 20 years.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Who's counting.

I think what was interesting in this particular application is that you already have the wine and malt license and that you are

actually just looking for the CV piece of it.

Any questions?

POLICE COMMISSIONER ROBERT HAAS: No questions.

CHAIR ANDREA JACKSON: Any questions?
