City Updates

- Reduce/Reuse webpage is nearly complete. When it is complete the RAC Google Map will be live!
- UTEC tour recap:
- Many programs (woodworking, mattress recycling) social component (reducing violence, supporting young adults who have been incarcerated)
 - 20% of their mattresses come from Cambridge
- Casella grand reopening update from Mike: the new facility has all new equipment with more robotics and more optical sorters. One new process is that they can now recycle the glass for construction fill more directly (they've cut out the middle-person)
 - Will there be a virtual tour? hopefully one is coming but the facility looks similar to before
 - Is there now a heat/air-controlled room for workers? Yes!
- Zero Waste Master Plan update—refreshing the Plan starting in late-summer
 - DPW is exploring putting out an RFP for consultants
 - Previous consultant was HDR (Canadian)
 - Question asked about what the internal priorities are for the plan
- Mike's would be mandatory composting, but there are different priorities for different stakeholders.
 - City council would have to approve regulatory changes
 - Other places that have it: West Coast, Colorado, NYC, Hamilton MA and Vermont!

- South Korea 97% composting
- Question about enforcement: enforcement = encouragement (not punitive)
- Many new trash carts already have rodent holes
- Deb -200 13+ buildings now with composting; 420 units is largest building; pausing rollout during the summer.
 - At tabling events, we're frequently approached by residents in large buildings
 - Possibility of adding drop-off bins to area where residents are asking?
 - Sharing compost bins is encouraged fewer need to be emptied
 - Having it in building is better than drop-offs for longevity
- RAC is one of the groups that will be engaged in the process. The vendor will have a meeting with RAC and with public
 - Current plan is online
- RAC Google webpage sneak peak
- Google site coming, to keep calendar, minutes, mission statement/charter, etc. in one place
- It will also be a place to share interesting articles/information, but we will keep policy decisions/conversations out of it
 - A few options to manage adding events to calendar TBD

Next steps:

- BYOB survey over summer
- Hit the ground running on curbside compost in Sept

- Focus on textiles/move-out during Winter
- BYOB research
 - surveying grocery store exits to count how many people use reusable or disposable bags or nothing (an update to when it was last done before and when the ordinance first took effect)
 - each type of bag is counted; not tallied for each person leaving but as a whole
 - Good to do in pairs/groups
 - Other possible ways to measure: if grocery stores are ordering fewer bags?
- Compost kitchen bin bag question (suggested by Sakiko)
- Sakiko: when we first started with anaerobic digestion, we might have moved back to traditional composting so it made sense to keep using the compostable bags. But now?
- Mike: anaerobic digestion still has its opponents despite the lack of hard research against it (and the LCA in favor of it). Nearest composting facility Cambridge could use is in Manchester, MA (not close)
 - Expense of compostable bags is a barrier
 - Move-out waste/Buy Nothing
- Potentially could do observational surveys of what people are throwing out, for moveout research
 - Buy Nothing is worth looking at to see what people are diverting
 - Tracie working on connecting Buy Nothing users/groups
- Possibility of mobile recycling centers for electronics, textiles, metal, etc. (not furniture BN is best for that)
