2. City Updates

- Want to join the Fix-It Clinic Planning team? It's pretty straightforward, email Mike if interested
- Community-wide webinar on how waste processing works on to be held Jan. 18 good number signed up already, probably info people on the RAC know, but we might want to listen in- if so, register
- ZWMP consultant has been publicly announced:
 - Resource Recycling Systems (RRS) have good experience in bigger cities such as Nashville) - main consultants will be working out of Arlington, MA. Amy Perlmutter, Cambridge resident, will be involved as a subcontractor.
 - Main goal is to have an outside person come and look with a fresh pair of eyes at what we're doing to meet our goals. They'll also be looking at our yard waste collection contract, as well as helping optimize/bring better value to our whole program.
 - How to handle issue of single use products via ordinance?
 - We'll also get community feedback they can help facilitate community dialogue.
- How the DPW handles different types of collection discussion and questions:
 - How does metal pick-up and TV collection work? People sign up for a permit, a truck goes out once a week for metal pick-up (goes to Scrap-It Everett) and once for TVs. Ewaste hauler is Good Point Recycling in Brockton - very thoughtful

- organization in terms of processing/reusing as many materials as possible (run by Robin Ingenthron, based in Middlebury, VT).
- Scrap metal separated between ferrous and non-ferrous metals (we get in the range of \$100-\$120 dollars a ton)
- Curbside Recycling and Yard Waste collection 5 trucks for recycling, 1 for yard waste each day, one smaller truck for smaller streets, missed collections, etc.
- Public Area waste collection trash currently collected by street cleaning division at DPW – go to all the major squares every day, parks every 2 or 3 days; public recycling collected by Save That Stuff
- If public bins are overflowing, is there a way to report that? Yes Cambridge MA DPW 311. Or SeeClickFix. It's not on the bin, you have to know it. Could there be a QR code on the bins?
- Pushing to get more Big Bellies since they have sensors and report, but technology isn't perfect – want to move aware from open-top trash bins
- Retrofitting bins with sensors is tough In the summer you can empty a bin in
 the morning and it's full again by 3pm and the shift just ended. There are also
 other shifts, like the overnight business compost shift. Not a huge part of our
 tonnage, but a big part of operations. Trying to figure out whether to go all Big
 Belly, but it's part of a larger city piece. RAC members could write a letter to the
 commissioner if they wanted, talking about public bins, concerns about rats and
 other issues and the need to address the problem.
- Is there data available about public area pick-ups? Don't really have good data there are more than 700 bins in the city. Weather, foot traffic affect rate of trash. Big Belly sensors don't give reliable data about fullness they do a good job on containment.
- What about Big Bellies for recycling (ones at Harvard are very contaminated, lots of liquids)? Save That Stuff picks them up along with the business recycling, so when mixed together overall contamination is lower. People sometimes put trash in recycling when trash is full or jam big items into the containers.
- Can we do a better job communicating with the neighborhoods about the way trash and recycling are put out? There are lots of overflowing bins, loose items. How does that impact street cleaning and stuff going into the rivers?
- How to engage all the people in the community?
- Interest in metal/electronics recycling tours
- Is there any thought to putting compost bins in places like public parks and high-volume areas? Current issue is contamination, since recycling bins are so contaminated as well as rats. Maybe community isn't quite ready yet.

3. Discussion of Move-Out and Textiles waste

- Is there some way of listing what people have? General query notes, available to everyone (unlike Buy Nothing), rather than putting it on the curb
- How would we actually do this? No staff on the weekend, where can stuff go, who would pick it up? It would have to be in one week, out the next.

- Comments about starting small. For example, focus on a pilot with particular kinds of things lamps, fans, small appliances, utensils, then expand to larger stuff if it works. What about several small collection areas on (a) certain day(s)?
- Two methods they come to us, we come to them putting out on the street is weather-dependent, people bringing stuff to us means we have to store it, takes them more effort. Are we trying to target items that need to be disposed of properly and/or getting items to people who need them?
- What are we targeting, what are the pros and cons of different models?
- If the date were August 31, people would be more able to bring stuff someplace since they need a vehicle to move anyway, makes it easier for nonprofits to just go to one place. How to keep it simple for the user while safe and good for the nonprofit
- If we choose a date, would an organization(s) drive around in a truck and pick up what they need?
- Furnishing Hope needs to hire movers and prefers weekdays might not want to drive a truck around on spec
- Need to think about a move-out day event maybe it's small or for one type of item, but we expand on that in the future; make it a destination, maybe a food truck
- Trash to Treasure at Northeastern moved everything to an area like the student center, other students could pick things up
- Maybe collection areas organized by materials
- Problem of timing and problem of transportation maybe a contracted service that goes around to pick up things like plates, utensils, things that won't be affected by weather
- Historical context (Mike) we had Mass Coalition for the Homeless in 2015-16
 who would do curbside collection. Like idea of connecting individuals with nonprofits helping people know they can save up stuff for donations on a
 particular date, not pack that up, then just drop it off or have it picked up
- Issue: Collection of good materials, storage until given to a non-profit
- Poll of people who would be interested in helping on August 1st
- Do we have a list of all the places in the community that need things? Keeps changing – would be easier to find partners who will take certain items on a more regular basis
- Household Hazardous Waste August 24 Mike will explore that as something to link to move-out waste
