- Checkout Bag Ordinance A proposed ordinance to ban plastic carryout bags was discussed at the December 15<sup>th</sup> City Council meeting. The City Manager <u>submitted the ordinance with amendments</u> that were developed after an April 2014 Ordinance Committee hearing. The revised proposal requires that if retail establishments provide check out bags, they must be made of recycled paper or compostable plastic, or be reusable. Establishments must charge 10-cents for check out bags. The Climate Protection Action Committee recommended previously that a fee be placed on check out bags alongside a ban on plastic bags to discourage a shift to paper, which tends to have higher greehouse gas impacts. The Council referred the matter to a public hearing before the Ordinance Committee, which will be held in February, with an expectation that the City Council will vote on the ordinance soon after.
- <u>Urban Heat Island Contest</u> The Community Development Department is conducting a contest on the MIT Climate CoLab platform to crowdsource ideas to mitigate the urban heat island in Cambridge. Learn about the City of Cambridge Climate CoLab Contest at our <u>taped Google Hangout</u>. We're seeking creative and effective ideas that relate to Cambridge specifically! Feel free to submit your own proposal, add comments to existing proposals, or simply support existing proposals. The contest runs from now through February 6<sup>th</sup>, 2015. If you submit one of the winning ideas, you'll be able to present it before government officials, business executives, NGO leaders and scientists who can help move proposals toward implementation, as well as share it at an MIT conference, where a \$10,000 Grand Prize will be awarded. # **RESOURCES & IDEAS**

- City Survey The 2014 City of Cambridge Citizen Telephone Survey results are available here. Climate change was a survey topic for the first time. In response to the question What do you think is the single most important issue facing the City of Cambridge today the one that affects you and your family the most?, 2% said climate change. The top issue was affordable housing at 18%, with education and traffic/bikes second at 10%.
- Salem Adaptation Report The City of Salem has issued a draft climate change vulnerability assessment and action plan.
- Chicago Energy Benchmarking Report The City of Chicago issued its first report under its recently approved building energy benchmarking law.
- <u>LES Ready</u> A group of community development organizations on the Lower East Side of New York City published a report, <u>Getting LES Ready: Learning from Hurricane Sandy to Create a Community-Based Disaster Planf or the Future.</u>
- Cambridge Climate Change Vulnerability Assessment The City is working on preparing a vulnerability assessment that will serve as the foundation for a climate change preparedness plan that will follow. The project webpage provides background information and documents from meetings. - Cambridge Solar Map The Cambridge Solar Tool provides a web-based interactive tool to find out the potential for installing solar photovoltaic systems on rooftops in the city. The tool also evaluates the financial feasibility of installations and makes comparisons to alternative investments. The tool is designed by Mapdwell and based on the research of the MIT Sustainable Design Lab led by Dr. Christoph Reinhart. The City's Cambridge Energy Alliance program can assist interested property owners with finding installers and understanding the financial aspects. The Mapdwell tool was upgraded in September 2015 and can now be viewed in Spanish.
- Opt Out of Unwanted Mail Do you get unwanted mail from retailers, credit card companies, or cable/phone companies? You can opt out of mailings from over 4000 companies with Catalog Choice and help reduce waste. For example, you can stop getting weekly circulars from Global Direct, they will honor opt-out requests, so add them to "your choices". Just register for FREE at <a href="https://cambridge.catalogchoice.org">https://cambridge.catalogchoice.org</a> to create an account to start cleaning out your mailbox. To date, over 3700 Cambridge residents have signed up and opted out of nearly 25,000 different unwanted mailings!
- Check Out Watt Meters at the Library Cambridge residents can borrow a "kill-a-watt" meter from the Main Public Library to measure how much electricity their home appliances and devices use. The meters come with a guide on how to use them and information on how to save energy. The meter kits and guide were developed by the Sprouts of Hope group based at the King Open School.
- MBTA Rider Tools The MBTA has a number of <u>rider tools</u> that help riders to anticipate arrival times of buses, subways, and commuter trains and to receive alerts of delays. These tools can be used on iPhones, Android phones, text messges, emails, and the Web. There is also a trip planning tool.
- <u>NSTAR Green</u> Residential and small business electric customers of NSTAR can opt to purchase renewable electricity generated by wind energy farms. To sign up for the service, visit the <u>NSTAR</u> <u>website</u>.
- Cambridge Energy Alliance The Cambridge Energy Alliance, a program of the City of Cambridge Community Development Department helps residents, businesses, and organizations to obtain energy efficiency and renewable energy services. You can sign up for energy audits and ask questions through the energy advisor service.
- <u>Sustainable Business Leader Program</u> SBLP is a comprehensive certification program that supports local businesses in improving their environmental business practices and reducing their carbon footprint.
