What's New

<u>Energov online</u> – Cambridge moved to an online permitting process that integrates many of the city departments such as fire, building, electric. All companies were issued I-pads with specialized software linked making inspections and information immediate. The inspection component covers smoke detector and CO inspections, flammable permits and state mandated quarterly and annual inspections

The Enforcement mode makes specific state and department forms available to the companies in the field. It was rolled out on October 24, 2017

<u>Training Facility</u> — The city has been given the opportunity for a combination fire and police training facility at the former Foundry building at 101 Rogers Street for an extended period of time. Improvements were made by carpentry students from the Rindge School of Technical Arts (RSTA) at Cambridge Rindge and Latin School by constructing interior walls and doors for a public safety training site.

New squads and Rescue 2 - ambulance (Ford 450, AWD, Road Rescue) designated as Rescue 2, to be used for special assignments & major incidents.

<u>PPE ballistics</u> – In addition to the already equipped Rescue Task Force, all other riding positions in the department have been provided ballistics protection and training in active shooter situations. Thank you to the City for providing the funding necessary for this equipment!

EMS Bicycle Team

The department received a grant to develop, train and outfit a bicycle team to be used for EMS coverage during special events. The team will start with 24 members and the department hopes to have the team ready by Spring 2018.

All Companies Working

You may notice that the "Incidents" listed below are not as numerous as they usually are in past editions. If your group, company has an unusual incident that you think belongs here, please send a quick note to the editor at hsmith@cambridgefire.org. I can look up details in QED, but I need to know it happened. Thank you.

September 1, 2017 – Mutual Aid, Belmont, Working Fire, Choate Road – Engine 9, Engine 1, Ladder 1, Squad 4, Division 2 responded to Belmont for their working fire. Engine 1 and Squad 4 operated as the RIT Team.

September 14, 2017 – Mutual Aid, Watertown, 3rd Alarm, 27 Williams Street – Engine 9, Squad 4, Division 2 to the fire, Engine 2 covered at Waltham Engine 2 and responded to the fire on the 3rd.

September 18, 2017 – Medical – baby delivery, Upland Road & Mass Ave. – Engine 1, Engine 8 and Professional EMS delivered a baby boy in a car!

October 8, 2017 – Mutual Aid, Somerville, Box 229, 391 Washington Street – Engine 5, Squad 2 and Division 1 responded to the fire. Ladder 1 covered in Somerville.

October 14, 2017 – Mutual Aid, Brookline, Box 168, 2ND Alarm, 252 Aspinwall – Ladder 1 covered in Brookline during their fire.

October 17, 2017 – Mutual Aid, Somerville, 2nd alarm, 31 Sydney Street – Engine 5, Squad 2 and Division 1 to the fire. Engine 4 covered Engine 7 and Ladder 1 covered Teele Square.

October 19, 2017 – 1 Alarm fire, Somerville, 65 Beacon Street – A CPD officer spotted a fire in the front yard of a house on the Cambridge Somerville city line. He quickly extinguished the fire with an extinguisher. SFD took control of the scene.

October 26, 2017 – Motor Vehicle Collision, 985 Memorial Drive – R1 used hydraulic tools to remove one occupant from a MV after a multi vehicle crash

November 4, 2017 – Mutual Aid, Belmont, W/F, 176 Channing Road – Engine 1, Squad 4, Division 2 to the fire in Belmont. Engine 9 & Ladder 1 covered.

November 5, 2017 – Working Fire, 51 Market Street, Box 295– fire in ceiling around a light fixture

November 10, 2017 – Mutual Aid – Watertown Funeral Coverage – The department provided apparatus and manpower in the form of Engine 5, Ladder 1 and Division 3 so all Watertown members could attend funeral services for Chief Orangio

November 11, 2017 – Mutual Aid, Boston, Box 6163, 210 Border Street - Engine 5 and Ladder 1 covered in Boston during their 4th Alarm fire.

November 20, 2017 – Working Fire, 340 Windsor Street, Box 294 – extension cord caught fire and extended to some furniture. Resident extinguished the fire with an extinguisher.

November 20, 2017 – Working Fire, 168 Brattle Street, Box 571 – basement fire caused by a heating lamp

November 29, 2017 – Gas Leak, 125 Broadway – a 2" gas line was severed during construction. Eversource was able to quickly clamp the leak. Adjacent buildings were checked and department cleared when no readings were found.

November 29, 2017 – Explosion, 280 Pearl Street, Box 351 – A resident was trying to empty a gas cylinder in a truck he was working on. He was injured but there was no fire or damage to any structures.

November 30, 2017 – 4 Alarms, Box 391, Magazine at Auburn St – Early morning fire near the rear porches of a 4 story residential spread to a neighboring building. Crews made a quick stop preventing the fire from spreading.

December 3, 2017 – Haz-mat, Harvard Square MBTA Station – reports of a gas odor inside the station. Multiple people complained of irritation and burning eyes. Station ventilation fans were used to remove the air in the station. No source was found. No transports.

Mayor's Summer Youth Employment Program (Cambridge) 2017

The Mayors Youth Academy was another great hit this year. Thanks to Administrative/Information Jack Gelinas for the following write up:

The Cambridge Fire Department Summer Youth Academy is an intense, six (6) week program designed to promote interest in the Fire Department and Public Service. The Youth Fire Academy is sponsored by MSYEP, The Mayor's Summer Youth Employment Program, and its objective is to develop public service, sense of duty, and leadership among Cambridge high-school youths, 14 to 18 years of age. Working with MSYEP, the program strives to provide Cambridge youths with good workplace skills and motivate them to strive for excellence.

Youth recruits participate in a mixture of classroom and hands-on training sessions. They learn about the physics of fire and the products of combustion. They learn and practice firefighting

skills which include water supply, pump operation, hose-line advancement and operation, forcible entry, carrying and placement of ground ladders, operation of the aerial ladder, ventilation, search for and rescue of trapped victims, use of SCBA (self-contained breathing apparatus), tying and hauling tools and equipment, extricating entrapped victims from vehicles, and tactics and strategy. Later sessions in the program include combined fire evolutions where they put all skills together to locate, contain, and extinguish a fire and complete search and rescue of simulated victims. Some of these skills are accomplished in near zero-visibility smoke conditions using "theatrical" training smoke. Personal safety, teamwork, and accountability are emphasized continually.

One week of the training program is dedicated to EMS (Emergency Medical Service). All youths become proficient and certified in CPR (Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation) and the use of the AED (Automatic External Defibrillator) as well as other emergency, life-saving medical skills. These skills are applied hands-on in simulated emergency scenarios. One day was dedicated to demonstrating and teaching their learned CPR skills to the public as part of Bystander CPR Sessions in Kendall Square and Harvard Square.

Both mental and physical fitness were stressed. Youth academy members participated in physical training exercises with drill instructors from the Massachusetts Army National Guard. Final training sessions included directing the participants to a path to a future career in the fire service, Cambridge youths striving to become Cambridge firefighters. Formal graduation was held at the Cambridge Public Library auditorium

Thanks to **FF Timothy Norton** for his dedication as program coordinator. Thanks also to **FFs Craig Yearwood and Nicole Signoretti** for their commitment. Thank you to the members of on-duty companies who went over and above to help the youth academy members with skills development. All on-duty members really demonstrated the excellence and pride in the job. Thank you also to the Massachusetts Army National Guard, the Massachusetts Department of Fire Services/Massachusetts Fire Academy, Cambridge Firefighters Local 30, Professional Ambulance Service, the Mount Auburn Hospital, and the Cambridge Police Department for their invaluable support. Cop, paramedic rush into action, save 3 in two-alarm Quincy blaze

A cop and paramedic raced into a burning home and carried a child and elderly man to safety during a fast-moving, two-alarm fire in Quincy, officials said.

Quincy police officer Dan Parisi and Brewster Ambulance paramedic Hugh Devlin said they were in the area of Norfolk Street when the call went out about 1 pm. for a reported structure fire. Both men immediately responded to the men immediately responded to the scene and arrived simultaneously, officials said.

"We got a report of a couple peo-ple possibly trapped inside." Parisi osaid. "We went inside and pulled out a child and two adults."
Smoke was filling the lower level of the two-story house when the pair of rescuers ran inside, Parisi said. The child and two adults—on one of whom was chairbound—were on the first floor and "easy to find," said Parisi, who carried the child to safety.

"We didn't do anything anybody else wouldn't have done," Parisi said. "It was a multi-person effort."
Devlin said he and Parisi never hesitated. Devin said he and Parisi never hesitated.

"At the time, you heard someone was in the house, so you want to make sure they're OK," Devlin said, adding he was able to take the older man from a chair he was confined to and carry him out to safety. Quincy Deputy fire Chief Jack Cadegan said a second alarm was struck when firefighters received word that there were people trapped inside.

And though heavy fire could be seen coming from the roof when firefighters arrived, Cadegan said crews were able to extinguish the blaze fairly quickly.

There were no reported injuries.

The far as we know, all three residents are safe and doing pretty good," Cadegan said. "It was just of a great team effort. Police, ambullance, fire, it couldn't have gone any better."

Firefighter Devlin's actions are in the highest traditions of the fire service and the Cambridge Fire Department and he is hereby commended for his actions.


Cambridge firehouse marks 121 years in Porter Square

On Monday, the Cambridge Fire Department's Engine Company Number 4 marked its 121st year of operation at its historic brick firehouse near Porter Square at 2029 Massachusetts Ave.

"It's a proud house, it's a good house, it's a great house," Engine 4 Captain Robert Morrissey said. "I'm glad to be there, I'm proud to be there, and it's a good company."

The company first moved to its longtime home, On Massachusetts Avenue at the corner of Blake Street, on Nov. 20, 1896. The original Engine Company Number 4 consisted of two officers and a crew of around eight more, all local residents who worked nearly month-long shifts with little time off, even for meals.



"One hundred years ago, the shift schedule was one day off every 30," said John Gelinas, former Cambridge fire chief of operations and current information specialist for the department. "If there was a fire when they were off, or they were at lunch, they would respond to the fire from their house."

The firehouse is now staffed by around 30 people, including eight members of Cambridge Paramedic Squad 4, nearly tripling the firehouse's capacity since it opened. And the crews there all work more reasonable shifts than their counterparts a century ago: a full 24 hours with two days off, followed by another 24 hours and four days off.



"That's a big difference," Morrissey said. "Way back in the day you almost lived at the firehouse all the time, barely saw your family."

Inside the building, alongside a 2011 Pierce Saber engine, a paramedic van and other modern furnishings, Gelinas said the station maintains a few pieces of its history.

"It has been renovated a few times over the years, but basically it's the same building from 1896," he said. The first floor still consists of the patrol room, office, kitchen and two-bay apparatus floor — minus the horse stalls needed for original equipment — that were present when the first company moved in.

The fire pole from the upstairs "sleeping rooms" to the ground floor is also an original, along with some woodworking throughout the building and a now-defunct fireplace topped by a photograph of the firehouse from the 1800s. Photographs of the men and women who have served in the company also line the building's hallways, Gelinas's grandfather among them.

Morrissey said that while the daily duties of a Cambridge firefighter have changed through the decades, every firefighter likely starts their routine upon arriving at the firehouse the same as those 100 years ago.

"Back in the day like anything else, one thing that'll never change, you put your personal gear on the apparatus every morning and check your equipment" he said. "That's something that carries on."

In addition to daily preparation, Morrissey said a key part of working and living in an old building is keeping it in shape before a call comes in.

"You make sure you do the housework; you're dealing with old buildings so you do the best you can," he said. "We still have to make the place look good, it is your house, you're there for 24 hours. And that, again, has gone on from day one. That just carries on."

Despite the upkeep necessary to keep an older building in shape, Morrissey said he enjoys being able to step back sometimes and recognize the history of the engine company, and his place in it.

"It really doesn't hit you until sometimes you're riding down the street, you're getting back from the call, and you look at the building and say, 'It's history,'" Morrissey said.

Engine Company Number 4 now tallies more than 1,000 responses in Cambridge each year, including double-digit calls for building fires, from the same spot it has for 121 years.

"I think we have a great fire department, dedicated members," Morrissey said. "All the members of Engine 4 want to be there, it's a tradition too."

"You got your pride in your company and you go a little above and beyond," he said.

Cambridge LODD's

In Memoriam - Cambridge Line of Duty Deaths **from October-December**

<u>Please note</u>, the last issue we shared LODD's that occurred during the time period July-September through the course of the department's history. In this issue we will provide the last segment that covers October through December only. It is important to remember those that served and died with distinction before us. We hope that these names serve as reminders of the ultimate sacrifice you may be called to provide.

Captain James T. McCabe, Chemical Co. No. 1, October 7, 1921 – Died while operating at Box 348, 5 Alarm fire. Box 348 sounded at 11:20 PM, 3rd Alarm at 11:25 PM, 5th Alarm at 11:45 PM. All out sounded at 5:03 AM on October 8, 1921.

Private Thomas H. Anderson (Engine 2), killed October 17, 1935 Died in accident with Ladder 3 while responding to Box 273 for a fire at the rear of 186 Mass. Ave. Engine 2 was involved in a collision with the rear of ladder 3.

Firefighter Vincent Kelley Jr., Engine 4 – died of a brain aneurysm suddenly on October 17, 1997 in Arlington. Active duty death. Father to **FF Steve Kelley, Rescue Co. 1**

Lieutenant Barry Bennett, Engine 1, Died November 2, 2003 of job related illness on October 15, 1987. Posthumously promoted to Captain. Father to **FF Zach Bennett; Engine 2**

Frank D. Olmstead (Steamer #1) and William S. Frasier (Ladder 1), two volunteer firefighters were killed in the Great Boston Fire, November 9 & 10, 1872. Private Frasier's body was never found and death certificate never filed.

November 9, 1872. Four Cambridge engine companies and the hook and ladder helped to subdue the Great Boston Fire in 1872, where two volunteer firefighters from this city lost their lives. Firefighter Frank Olmstead, age 17 of Steamer 1 and firefighter William Frasier were killed while operating at Box 52 (Cambridge Box 13). According to the Boston Evening Transcript:

"Frank Olmstead, a fireman of Steamer 1 of Cambridge....was injured by a wall falling from the adjoining building striking him on the head. He was taken to...Massachusetts General Hospital on a stretcher where he died." William S. Frasier of Ladder 1 was also killed. His body was never recovered and death certificate never filed.

James F. Dalton, Call Lieutenant (Ladder 2), November 10, 1898 – Thrown from a ladder after opening a door with a fire behind it. Fell to pavement and died 15 minutes after. Box 114, the J.P. Squire Company at 169 Gore Street, unused icehouse.

Matthew L. Fairbairn, Callman - Private (Ladder 2) November 21, 1898 - Just 11 days after Firefighter Dalton was killed, another fire occurred at the J.P. Squire Company that this time took the life of Firefighter Matthew L. Fairbairn also of Ladder 2. The second fire occurred on

November 21 and Firefighter Fairbairn died two days later on November 23, 1898 from injuries received at the fire.

Private William J. Coyne, (Engine 4), died November 9, 1935 at Engine 4's quarters.

Firefighter George J. Cotter, November 27, – (August 1980) passed away several days after 2nd alarm triple fatal fire on Lancaster St. (or Humboldt Street) Box 691, He had chest pain at fire, died at home several days later.

Firefighter John "Chris" Cronshaw, Engine 4, deceased December 2, 1998, job related lung cancer that metastasized to brain. Active duty, assigned to Engine 4 his whole career. US Army Veteran

Firefighter John E. Cullinane, Ladder 2, December 24, 1975, Collapsed on apparatus floor in cardiac arrest, unable to be revived, pronounced dead at Cambridge Hospital. No entry in Ladder 2 logbook in regards to this incident. FF Cullinane logged in on watch at 1230 hours on Wed, December 24, 1975. Dates possibly messed up as times after his watch run through evening roll call for December 24th. Next page starts 0800 morning roll call again for December 24th (which should be Dec 25!) Only pertinent entry is December 26, 1975 Special Signal, Notice # 51 on Death of FF John E. Cullinane.






