# Introduction

The Cambridge Police Department is proud to announce our new BridgeStat program. This program, released on the first Friday of every month, is designed to share information with the public and combat crime in the city.

BridgeStat, similar to the CitiStat program used in New York City, is a multilayered dynamic approach to crime reduction, quality of life improvement, and personnel and resource management. Police personnel meet to devise strategies and tactics to solve problems, reduce crime, and ultimately improve quality of life in their community. Similar systems are in use in other major cities including Washington, DC, Los Angeles, Philadelphia, Austin, San Francisco, and Baltimore.

Through the new BridgeStat program, the Cambridge Police Department will produce a monthly public report to the community on current police priorities in terms of crime, traffic, and disorder issues in the city.

Beginning iterations of BridgeStat include information relating to historical trends, a breakdown of crimes by type, strategies the Cambridge Police are deploying to deal with crime patterns that have been identified, and tips for how citizens can protect themselves and help reduce crime in Cambridge. This version contains more detailed information about future patterns we expect to see so that both police personnel and members of the community can be informed and prepared in order to deal with these possible scenarios.

### Crime in Cambridge: 1/1/10 to 10/23/10

- Overall, the violent and property crime index for the first forty four (44) weeks of 2010 remain relatively unchanged. However, there have been 12 fewer incidents (- 0.4%) when compared with the same time frame in 2009.
- There have been 14 additional property crimes in 2010 to record a 1% increase when compared with last year. Violent incidents are down 7% when measured against 2009 figures.
- Robbery (-23%) and Auto Theft (-17%) are all registering substantial declines from 2009 totals.
- Since the September release of BridgeStat, there were 24 fewer housebreaks than the previous 4 weeks, and burglary dropped 45%, with the majority of the decrease traced to the interdiction of two out of the three identified patterns.
- Two areas of concentrations in recent BridgeStat meetings, the target crimes of larceny from person and larceny of bicycles, continue to level off. Larceny of bicycle was down 31% compared to the previous month and Larceny from the person is now down 1% when compared with last year after recording a 17% increase for the first seven months of the year.



# Major Crime Review: 9/25/10 to 10/23/10

### **Arrest in Pearl Street Home Invasion**

- On 10/6, Marcos Colono was arrested on multiple charges in connection with the home invasion and stabbing of a father and son inside their residence on Pearl St in August.
  - On 11/4, Colono was indicted by a Middlesex Grand Jury.
- Fingerprints recovered from the crime scene matched
   Colono's prints from an arrest by Boston Police in 1998.
  - Boston Police have also tied Colono to a 2008 assault in Brighton and will be filing charges as well.
- Citizen Alerts were sent out to notify residents of the incident & the arrest.

- A neighborhood meeting was also held in Cambridgeport to address the arrest and answer citizen questions.
- This arrest may not have been possible without the information sharing, and cooperation between Cambridge Police, Boston Police, and the Massachusetts State Police.



# Major Crime Review: 9/25/10 to 10/23/10

### **Arrest in MIT Stabbing**

- On 10/22, Gonzalo Guillen was arrested for Assault to Murder at his residence in East Boston.
- Guillen is accused of stabbing a co-worker after an argument outside the MIT Student Center.
- Citizen Alerts were sent out to residents to inform them of the incident and the arrest of the suspect.

**Total Robbery** dropped from a 5 year average of 145 incidents YTD to 111 incidents YTD in 2010 to register a 23% decrease.



- **Street Robbery** has recorded a 20% decline from the 5-year average.
- Two patterns have emerged over the past ten days with suspects targeting females for purse snatches and predatory robberies around MIT and Harvard.







# LARCENY: from Person

- As was expected, with the increase in weekend festivities in Harvard Square on the first three weekends of October, there has been an increase in dipper activity in the Square.
  - 10 incidents over the past two weekends.
  - Slight uptick in thefts from unattended items in bars near closing times.

### Recent Street Robberies: MIT & Harvard Areas

- Between 10/22 and 10/26 there were possibly four (4) related incidents
  - 2 incidents in Area 4, 1 in Cambridgeport and another in Mid-Cambridge.
- All robberies occurred between 7:45PM and 10:15PM with 15-30 minutes lapse between each incident.
- 3 of the 5 victims were white males between the ages of 25-30 who were walking alone. In one of the robberies there were two white male victims between 25-30 years of age.
  - All victims were affiliated with Harvard or MIT.
- In 3 of the 4 incidents, victims were approached from behind by 2 black males who immediately brandished a knife and asked for money, electronics, etc
- Suspects are described as 2 black males in their late teens to early twenties. One is described as chubby or heavy set. The other is described as being tall with a thin build and dark skin.



### Recent Street Robberies: UPDATE

- After several additional incidents across the city, Cambridge Police convened a meeting where members of the department met with representatives from Somerville, Brookline, Harvard, MIT, and Boston University police departments to discuss the recent street robberies and formulate a strategy to address these incidents.
- During the early morning hours of November 3<sup>rd</sup>, members of the Cambridge Police Department, U.S. Secret Service, Massachusetts State Police, Somerville Police, Brookline Police, Harvard University Police, MIT Police, and Boston University Police worked jointly to arrest armed robbery suspect Santony Joseph, 23, of 9 Earl Street in Malden.
  - Based on the description and his physical dimensions, Cambridge Police believe Santony Joseph to be the "heavy-set" black male described by victims of the various street robberies."
- Cambridge Police are seeking the public's help in identifying Mr.
  Joseph's accomplice(s) in these robberies, and ask anyone with
  information to please call the Cambridge Police Department at 617349-3300.



# **Recent Purse Snatching Robberies:**

- Between 10/09 to 10/25 there have been possibly five (5) related incidents along the Mass Ave corridor between Agassiz and Peabody neighborhoods.
  - 2 incidents near the Somerville border in the 300 to 400 block of Beacon St.
     where all robberies occurred between 10PM and Midnight.
- Victims are females 20 to 30 years old, walking alone in close proximity to their residence.
- Victims are approached from behind and their purses and backpacks are taken. The suspect then flees into a waiting motor vehicle with another suspect driving.
- There have been a variety of suspect descriptions, leading police to believe that the suspects may be switching from driver to snatcher.
  - Best composite is a white, possibly Hispanic, male in his early 20's approximately 5'8" to 5'10" with short brown hair.


# Purse Snatching: Incident Map

# **Street Robberies**

### What can we do?

#### Police Response

- Cambridge Police convened a
  meeting where members of the
  department met with representatives
  from Somerville, Brookline, Harvard,
  MIT, and Boston University police
  departments to discuss the recent
  street robberies and formulate a
  strategy to address these incidents.
  - This was successful in apprehending a suspect believed to be connecting to the recent string of street robberies.
- Cambridge Police are seeking the public's help in identifying Mr.
  Joseph's accomplice(s) in these robberies, and ask anyone with information to please call the Cambridge Police Department at 617-349-3300.

#### <u>Citizen Response</u>

- Cambridge Police would like to remind people that if approached and asked for your belongings, DO NOT RESIST – the robber wants your valuables, not you.
- Police also ask residents to take the following precautions when walking at night:
  - Be aware of your surroundings at all times and trust your instincts.
  - Always walk with a friend or in a group when possible.
  - Walk with confidence. Keep your head up to observe your surroundings and don't look down at the ground.
  - If you feel you are being followed, show you are suspicious – turn to look at the person. It sends a clear message that you will not be taken by surprise.
  - Do not wear ear buds, headphones, or listen to music when walking alone.
  - If someone is following you, cross the street and vary your pace.




# BURGLARY

**Waning Patterns** 

-18%

- Total Burglary, the combination of residential and commercial burglary, has decreased by 18% YTD when compared to the 5 year average.
- Housebreaks have recorded a significant decline (down 18%) on the 5-year average, and have dropped 45% when compared to the previous four weeks, with 24 fewer housebreaks. The West Cambridge and Peabody patterns that were identified at the end of August appear to have dissipated or displaced across the border to Somerville. However a weekend series along the Somerville border is being closely monitored.
- Commercial Breaks are down 21% with no discernible patterns at the present time. A regional church break pattern has observed in neighboring communities but nothing in Cambridge.

- Overall, larceny has decreased by 2%.
- The only larceny type with a dramatic increase:
  - Larceny of Bicycles +51%
- Other Larceny Crimes:
  - Larceny from MV -20%
  - Larceny / Building -2%
  - Larceny /Resid. -1%
  - Shoplifting +5%







# **Housebreak Pattern Overview:**

### Mid-Cambridge


 Pattern that was identified in early September of eight tightly clustered incidents around Antrim St. Further analysis revealed that the pattern ignited in mid-July and was balanced along the Somerville border between Inman and Porter Squares with the majority of the activity on weekend afternoons.

### Agassiz/Somerville Border

- During the weekend of 10.18.10, there were four breaks reported along the Somerville border on Magnolia Ave, Exeter Place, Newport Road and King Place. Friday and Saturday nights between 6PM and 9PM and Saturday and Sunday during the early morning hours from 1AM to 3AM are the most likely timeframe.
- Suspects entered by forcing side and rear windows, with laptops as the prime target.

# Housebreaks

### What can we do?

#### **Police Response Strategy:**

- CPD deployed Saturation patrols and dispersed activity to Somerville from the end of September to mid – October.
  - However, there were seven additional incidents between 10.13 to 10.18.
  - •Since recent arrests in Somerville, there have been no related housebreaks in Cambridge since 10.18.
    - Sporadic breaks have occurred across the border in Somerville.
- In response, CPD:
  - •Deployed patrol units, bike units, and major crime units to saturate potential target areas.
  - •Released a community update bulletin to the Mid-Cambridge neighborhood through our Citizen Observer program, our website, social media outlets (Facebook and Twitter), and to the Mid-Cambridge Neighborhood Association email listsery.
- •A meeting took place between Cambridge and Somerville PD to collaborate. The result of this meeting was a joint operation that produced three arrests.
  - •Cambridge Police and Somerville PD are exchanging information daily on housebreaks and potential suspects.

#### Citizen Response Strategy:

- Citizens are asked to take the following precautions to protect themselves, their homes, and their belongings from burglaries:
  - •Try "casing" your own home,
  - ALWAYS lock your doors and windows. Many housebreaks have occurred through open windows or unlocked doors.
  - ·Leave a light on when you leave.
  - •Install motion sensor lights.
  - •NEVER prop open the door or let someone in behind you
  - •Be vigilant. If you suspect suspicious activity, please report it to the police immediately by calling 617-349-3300.
  - •Document serial numbers of all electronics and take pictures of all valuables.
  - •Request a Residential Security Survey from the Cambridge Police Department. For more info, please call (617) 349-3236.




# LARCENY: from MV

**Emerging Pattern** 

-19%

- Larceny from MVs are down 20%.
- Only pattern at the present time involves Whole Foods parking lot on River Street where a number of incidents have occurred, mostly on Saturdays.
- **Potential 4th Quarter Hot Spots:** 
  - Parking lots on First and Second Streets along Binney in East Cambridge
  - Albany & Vassar Streets
  - Allston/Brookline Streets in Cambridgeport
  - Avon Hill in Peabody





### **Ongoing Larceny from Motor Vehicle Pattern:**

River Street, Putnam Ave, Magazine Street Parking Lots

- Since 9/20, there have been 12 larceny from motor vehicle reports in a single lot on River Street.
  - All but one of which occurred by breaking a window.
- The best time frame is from 12:30 PM 3:30 PM on Saturday and Sunday as well as 4PM to 6:30 PM Monday through Friday.
- Targeted at all locations are electronics:
  - Mainly iPods, laptops and GPS.
  - Also bags/backpacks left unattended inside vehicles.



# **Larceny from Motor Vehicle**

### What can we do?

#### Police Response

- Cambridge Police alerted the managers of the businesses at these locations about the pattern and informed them of potential crime "hot spots" in their parking lots.
  - Managers increase staff presence in parking lots to deter crime.
  - Community Relations Unit distributed information flyers to store managers for them to distribute to costumers asking them to help protect their vehicles by following several safety tips.
    - CPD also left informational flyers on car windshields in parking lots.
- CPD deployed extra patrols and plainclothes officers to these areas in an effort to deter crime.
- CPD asks anyone with information about these crimes to please report it to the police by calling 617-349-3300.

#### Citizen Response

- Roll up windows and lock all doors.
- Park in well-lit areas.
- Always be aware of the area where you park.
- Hide all valuables out of view. If you can see them from outside the vehicle, so can thieves.
- Don't leave valuables in your car. If you must, lock them out of view in your trunk.
  - As we approach the holiday shopping season, be especially careful and make sure to place all bags, valuables, etc. in the trunk and out of view of potential thieves.
- Take GPS units and clips out of the car with you.
  - If you must leave the unit in the car, be sure to hide both it and the clip or suction cup that holds it. Thieves see the clip and know there is a unit somewhere in the vehicle.
  - Frequently wipe your dash to remove tell-tale dust rings that are left by suction cup mounts.
     Replace the cover to the vehicle's power outlet when not in use.
  - Record the serial number and keep a copy in the glove compartment and with your other valuable papers at home to assist the police with recovery should your unit be stolen.




# LARCENY: of Bicycle

### **No Patterns**

 After three flat years, Larceny of Bicycles increased dramatically over the first seven months of the year.



- These increases have leveled off since the middle of July
  - Bike thefts dropped 32% when compared with the previous four weeks.
- Since early September, nearly 50% of the bike thefts in the city have clustered in Cambridgeport with the common scenario being thefts from back yards or porches.
- As bike thefts are a seasonal crime, we expect to see a decrease as we approach the colder winter months.
  - Will meet to develop strategies as spring approaches & thefts rise.
