






Population Trend




Single Race or Hispanic Origin

Total Population and Under 18




Race Alone or in Combination


Total Population



Population by Age by Sex






Black Ancestry

Who is Hispanic?

According to the US Census

The current definition of "Hispanic or Latino" was developed by the US Office of Management and Budget in 1997, following public consultation:

"A person of Cuban, Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, South or Central American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race."

All federal agencies use this definition and it is generally accepted by other governments and private organizations.

Who is <u>not</u> defined as Hispanic or Latino? Brazilians and other people with an origin in the Americas from a culture speaking a language other than Spanish, such as people from Guyana, Belize, and non-Spanish speaking Caribbean nations.





A Linguistically Isolated person is one who speaks English less than "very well".


A Linguistically Isolated Household is one where no one 14 or older speaks English very well.







Computer and Internet Access: Race/Ethnicity, Education & Unemployed












Children by Age




Youths by Census Tract





Income Distribution





Educational Attainment





Persons in poverty live in a household earning less than the following amount during the year:



Race and Ethnicity Family Poverty Rates






Families under Poverty Level




Citywide Share of Families in Poverty





Persons Lacking Health Insurance







