What Are E-Bikes?



E-bikes are bicycles with a motor powered by a battery.

Class 1*

Motor helps when pedaling, up to 20 mph**

Class 2

Motor helps when pedaling or when using hand throttle, up to 20 mph

Class 3

Motor helps when pedaling up to 28 mph***

When To Use an E-Bike?



Going to work or school



Running errands



Hauling heavy loads and/or children



If biking takes too much energy



For longer distances

E-Bike Options

Battery type



· Removable or built-in

· Look for one that meets safety standards: UL 2849 or EN 15194

Frame style



· Step through or step over

Gears



· Talk to your bike shop about different types

Bike type



· Foldable—easier to carry and store



- · E-cargo bike carries passengers and/or cargo
- · Adaptive bike or electric handcycle

^{*}Class = category.

^{**}Speeds can go higher downhill.

^{***}State law defines Class 1 and Class 2. Class 3 is not defined in the Massachusetts law.

E-Bike Safety Tips

- Ride predictably
 - Check behind you before turning or changing lanes
 - Signal before making a turn
 - Do not weave in and out of lanes
- Wear a helmet
- Be visible (use lights and reflectors)



- Practice where there is less traffic
- Ride slowly in busy places
 - Stop for people walking
- E-bike speed can be surprising
 - Be careful and respectful around others, especially children, seniors, and people with disabilities
 - Drivers might not expect the high speed; be extra cautious, especially at intersections

Storing an E-Bike

- Secure location (garage, basement, shed)*
- Use a good lock, talk to your bike shop
- Battery: store in a clean, dry place, 32° to 68° F
- Charging: follow instructions included with the bike
- *E-bikes are too big and heavy to carry up stairs, except for foldable models.

Where are E-Bikes Allowed?



- Roads and bike lanes
- Most bike paths and paved trails (check local rules)



- Not on sidewalks
- Not on unpaved trails unless a sign says you can
