
Garden Street Safety Improvement Project

Outreach Overview

At Community Meeting 2, attendees requested that we look into turning a significant section of Garden Street to a one-way. Recognizing that this would impact a larger area, we expanded our outreach ahead of Community Meeting 3.

Before Community Meeting 3

- Physical signage: on Garden Street and side streets, alerting people about the three layout options, including the one-way
- Flyers: We distributed flyers at doors on streets impacted by the one-way (including Raymond Street).

Before Community Meeting 4

- Physical signage on Garden Steet and side streets.
- Postcards: We sent postcards with information on the meeting and intended one-way to over 4,700 addresses, including Raymond Street



Garden Street Safety Improvement Project

Changes Coming in 2022

This fall, the City of Cambridge will install separated bicycle lanes and make improvements to existing crosswalks on Garden Street between Huron Avenue and Mason Street.

Feedback from three community meetings identified a preferred plan: **convert Garden Street to a one-way for vehicles** between Huron Avenue and Concord Avenue, with vehicles traveling eastbound (toward Harvard Square). Bicycle lanes will travel in both directions, with a one-way separated lane on each side of the street.

Observations and Adjustments

Observations

- October 28: Garden Street switches to one-way operation between Huron Avenue and Mason Street.
- City staff, including TP+T staff and Cambridge police officers, have regularly observed the impacts on side streets.
- We are making adjustments to signal timing to help traffic flow better.

Wayfinding Apps

- There were initial issues with updating wayfinding apps like Google and Waze, which continued to direct people the wrong way down Garden Street
- Once the apps brought drivers to the area, they had to find alternative routes through the neighborhood
- When apps know that Garden Street is a one-way, they are less likely to bring drivers taking longer trips to the area
 - We found that 85% of a.m. trips and 65% of p.m. trips headed west on Garden were headed to destinations outside of the study area

Concord Avenue

- After Garden Street became a oneway, congestion worsened on Concord Avenue
- We conducted observations last week
- We adjusted signal timing on Monday, November 7
- Over the past few days, congestion has lessened
- We will continue to monitor Concord Avenue and side streets



Short-Term Plan


Short-Term Plan

- Listen to residents about areas of concern
- Continue to make observations
- Police Department has placed speed trailers on Raymond Street and Garden Street
- Adjust signal timing to address congestion
- Identify any small changes to street layout or operations
- Education and outreach efforts around correct bike-lane usage, including wrong-way biking

Medium-Term Plan

Traffic Counts

- Before we made changes on Garden Street, we conducted traffic on October 12
- We will conduct "after" counts in a few months
- Why wait for a few months? To let people get used to the new traffic flow and settle into new routines.




Reporting Back

- It takes a while for traffic patterns to settle after changes to the road.
- In March or April (depending on weather), we will conduct traffic counts and report back on the impacts of the change.
- In the meantime, we will continue to listen to concerns and respond as necessary.

Raymond Street

We have observed and heard about an increase in car volume on Raymond Street.

- Existing north-south travel pattern (Huron-Raymond-Upland/Walden) continues
- Some increase in westbound trips from Linnaean
- We want to hear what you're seeing!



Our Toolbox

- Changes to signs (such as adding all-way stops)
- Markings (such as adding parking lines, edge lines, and center lines near intersections)
- Parking regulation changes (to create better sight lines at stops and turns)
- Traffic calming, such as alternating which side parking is on (chicanes)
- Permanent speed feedback sign
- Changes to street operations (requires additional analysis of larger network impacts)

Community Meeting Agreements

We recognize that people have strong feelings about the project, and that we don't all necessarily agree. A diversity of opinions will strengthen our ability to see the issues.

But we are all working to make our streets safer. To have a productive meeting, let's:
