1. Public Comment

STEAM

In The Hive, we continued to host our virtual and in-person Hive Safety Training workshops along with introductory equipment training workshops. We partnered with City of Cambridge Community Development Department to welcome small business owners and entrepreneurs. STEAM Academy: iFp Robots That Make a Difference students wrapped up their term with an expo showcasing prototypes of assistive robots. STEAM Academy: iFp Studio students hosted a summit gathering close to 50 local leaders to discuss equitable access to education and career opportunities in Cambridge.

Adult Services

In Adult Services we continued with several of our program series. The Wellness for Seniors series had been held weekly since November through May and will be taking a break during the summer. Navigating Solo focused on the topic of Evaluating Living Options. Cambridge Room Lectures Series held a lecture on the topic of The Beauty of Book Binding and Decoration: Linked Spine Bindings. As for the Career Skills Workshop series, we held three workshops covering topics on Tips for a Successful Virtual Interview, Changing Careers, and The Art of Networking. We held four book groups at Main.

Youth Services

In youth services at the Main Library, we've been doing five outdoor programs a week (four songs and stories and one Baby Lapsit program). Beginning in June we are going to start offering our weekly preschool story time inside in the Rey Room on Tuesday afternoons. In May, we've been busy planning for summer reading and starting to spread the word as we visit our preschools and schools. One special outreach event to note: This May, for the first time since 2019, we were able to host the Donnelly Field Story Walk with our partners, the Agenda for Children Literacy Initiative and the Center for Families. We gave away books, pizza, and did story and movement activities with 242 people and everyone had the best time!

Branch Services

Boudreau:

Our reading dog Ana returned in May. Our young patrons were very happy to see her.

Central Square:

The 23rd Annual Youth Poetry Awards were held in person for the first time since 2019. We received nearly 800 entries from kids in grades K to 8. In all, the students came from 24 schools in Cambridge, public and private. We're hoping to have the winning poems, with pictures of the poets when we have permissions, to be linked to our website soon.

Collins:

The Collins Branch continues to have popular standing programming including story times for children and two adult book groups. This month, all programs took place in the outdoor courtyard instead of virtually which was a welcomed transition.

O'Connell

Continuing with our Fiber Arts Drop-In Group for adults, all levels, monthly Adult Book Group, two Outdoor Story-times for young kids.

O'Neill:

We had a big "open house" series of programs on May 3rd for our first open Tuesday and had 109 people participate in various open house activities. We hosted our first Saturday programs: Haitian Flag Day Storytime on May 14th, and 8 people came. Dinoman Presents Dinosaurs on May 21st, with 126 attendees

Valente:

The Valente Branch Community Room is open once again for booking by nonprofit agencies and City partners. We hosted 9 groups in May. The **Reading Together book group** went deep into their discussion of works by Asian American authors, covering issues of identity, authorship and lived experiences. This meets monthly and follows the themes of the Library's yearlong reading challenge.

Programming and Events

The program was in celebration of PRIDE and was attended by 40 patrons. We also hosted author Katie Kitamura on June 2. The program, which was initially scheduled to take place in May as part of our Asian American Pacific Islander Awareness Month program, was rescheduled to June because Kitamura took ill. The program was attended by 23 patrons. In June, we launched our popular Yoga on the Lawn with Cap Aguilar series which meets every Saturday in June, from 10:15-11:30 a.m. The first session, which took place on June 4, had 30 participants.

Branch Services

Boudreau:

This month we will be hosting a miniature therapy horse. We will also have a visit from storyteller Valerie Tutson in honor of Juneteenth.

Central Square:

June 9th from 6 to 9 p.m. the branch will be hosting 5 events for the Boston Lit Crawl which will be happening in and around Central Square this year. The Mayor will read a Juneteenth story for the June 16th Storytime, and the branch will host storyteller, Valerie Stevens and the Albino Mbie Band for a Juneteenth Celebration on Saturday June 18th. Beginning June 6, the Children's Room with be hosting Storytimes at the Central Square Farmer's Market and with the Audubon Society at Magazine Beach.

Collins:
