Cambridge Historical Commission 831 Massachusetts Avenue Cambridge, Massachusetts 02139 **Biography** Timothy J. Mahoney was born June 21st, 1896. He was the son of Irish immigrants. As a young man, he worked as a delivery boy for a local grocery store. He was known to have a wonderful – and wicked – sense of humor.

In April, 1918, Mahoney enlisted in the United States Infantry. He went to France, serving as a messenger for the 77th Division, which earned the nickname, the Lost Battalion, after they were cut off and surrounded by German troops for six days in October, 1918. During this time, the unit endured heavy fire from both sides and suffered heavy casualties. He would not speak of these events to anyone in his family. Mahoney continued to serve in the military before being wounded on Armistice Day and was honorably discharge in May, 1919.

After returning from the war, Mahoney married Eva Casey (1903-1976). In 1922, Eva gave birth to the couple's only child, daughter Eva Mae Mahoney. At this time, they lived on Pleasant Street, in Pilgrim Hill. Soon after Eva's birth, the family moved, first to Somerville, when Mahoney got a job at a Ford plant. From there, they moved to Belmont, MA briefly, and then to Watertown. In 1930, the family moved into an apartment on Wendell Street in Cambridge and Mahoney would live there for the rest of his life.

Following his work at the Ford plant, Mahoney would go on to work as the meat manager at Hawk's Market. Eventually, Mahoney would open his own grocery store on Walden Street. Over the years, he cultivated a reputation of being a well-liked man and a purveyor of excellent cuts of meat, providing high quality customer service to his customers. Around the holidays, people would come from around to buy their food from him.

The American Legion also played a major role of Mahoney's later life. He was initially involved with Post 27 in Cambridge, MA. During this time, he sat on numerous committees and took leaderships roles within the Post. Eventually, Mahoney rose through the ranks and became the Post Commander of his local post. However, he did not stop there. Later on, Mahoney was elected to the Middlesex County Council of the American Legion.

Mahoney also worked with Selective Service System, serving as a Reemployment Committeeman on the local Massachusetts board. He was in this position from 1943 to 1947. This position garnered him continued respect amongst the community, as well as citations from Presidents Franklin D. Roosevelt and Harry S. Truman, as well as the Director of the Selective Services System.

Mahoney died in December of 1948.

Following his death, Eva Mae Mahoney and her mother would go on to own and operate a boarding house for Harvard students. Eva never married and never had children. She currently resides in senior apartments in Cambridge.

The primary focus of this collection is Timothy J. Mahoney (1896-1948), a Cambridge businessman and a member of the American Legion. He is also Eva Mahoney's father. This collection is made up of government-issued documents, photographs, newspaper clippings, memorabilia, and books. While the main focus of the collection is Timothy Mahoney, Eva Mahoney is also represented through the items in the collection.

Series

Series I – Personal Life

Timothy Mahoney's life and Eva Mahoney's childhood are reflected in this series through assorted photographs and memorabilia.

Photographs of Timothy represent him in various aspects of his life. He is seen as a young man, both in a more candid photograph and in a posed photograph. Additionally, his work as a grocer is represented in this collection. Timothy had worked at Hawks' Market as the meat manager, before opening up his own grocery store on Walden Street.

Eva is also represented in this collection, as a student and as a dancer. During her youth, she studied dance intensively and had been a student of Caroline Brine, a dance instructor who was well-known through the area and had several dance studios in the greater Boston area. Eva had been a student of hers for several years.

Series II – Military Service

This collection contains a variety of items, including photographs, books, and documents. Two items in particular, a gold-fronted New Testament bible and Mahoney's service record, are especially fragile and should be handled with care.

World War I played a major role in Timothy Mahoney's life. Not only did he live through the end of this war on the front line, Mahoney was a member of the "Lost Battalion." The horrors that he faced would stay with him, though he would never speak of his experiences with the "Lost Battalion" to anyone in his family.

<u>Series III – Selective Service System</u>

This series is made up of several documents, all of which represent the high points of Timothy Mahoney's tenure with the Selective Service System.

After the United States joined the Allies in World War II, Timothy Mahoney gave his time and energy to aid the Selective Service System, a governmental organization that maintained the information on men potentially subject to military conscription. His major role with this organization was a reemployment committeeman to the local Massachusetts board, helping

returning veterans with transitioning back into civilian life. This work would earn him several citations and the Selective Service Medal.

<u>Series IV – American Legion</u>

In this series, there are a number of photographs and memorabilia, particularly from the later part of Timothy Mahoney's career with the American Legion. These items represent his presence and activity with the Cambridge Post No. 27, as well as his campaigns for elected positions within the organizations, events he attended, and the committees he participated in.

Timothy's role within the Cambridge community was aided by his continued involvement with the American Legion. Over the course of his career with the Legion, Mahoney served on a number of committees, was elected as commander of Cambridge Post 27, and went on to serve as a delegate to the Middlesex County Council, representing the American Legion. He was also heavily involved with the Sons of the Legion group.

After his death, the Middlesex County Council would pass a resolution to honor his involvement with the Legion. This resolution is a part of the collection.

Series V – Newspaper Clippings

This series contains photocopies of a number of scrapbooked newspaper clippings. The original clippings are extremely fragile and degraded. The clippings in this series represent all aspects of Timothy Mahoney's life – his personal life, his grocery store, his work with the American Legion, and World War I and the Lost Battalion.
