


Cambridge, Charlestown and Boston about 1640



Cambridge and Charlestown at their greatest extent 1655




Public Ways and Land Distribution to 1639












Plan of an Estate in Cambridge (1845)






Cambridge's first railroad station, built by the Fitchburg Railroad in 1844; second story added later. Photo ca. 1865




















