# Part I Total Crime

- Serious crime in Cambridge in 2013 has experienced a significant decrease of 11% from the first eight months of 2012, and when measured against the five-year weighted average for this same time frame, an identical 11% decline (258 fewer serious crimes than the average) has been recorded. The majority of the decrease from 2012 to 2013 can be attributed to the overall drop in Burglary (-31%), with 108 fewer breaks reported when compared with the same time period in 2012 and the 6% decline in the index crime of Larceny.
- A detailed analysis of all statistics indicates that there were 222 fewer property crimes recorded through the first eight months of 2013, which translates to a 11% decrease when measured against the 2012 statistics. Violent crime has fallen 15% between January 1<sup>st</sup> and September 2<sup>nd</sup> of 2013 when compared with 2012.
- When measuring the serious crime totals versus the previous month of July, there was a 22% decline in the number of index crimes with 82 fewer incidents recorded during August of 2013. The majority of this decrease can be attributed to the drop in bike thefts, shoplifting, and burglaries.

# Part I Property Crime

- Property crime is registering an 11% decrease below the number reported during the first eight months of 2012, and a 10% slip below the five-year average. The only larceny category to register an increase over the past four weeks was thefts from motor vehicles. Burglary is down a remarkable 31% from 2012 and 26% from the five-year weighted average. Over the Summer of 2013, very few property crime patterns were identified.**

# Part I Violent Crime

- The projected five-year weighted average for violent crime in Cambridge for the first eight months of the year is 282 incidents. For the period between January 1<sup>st</sup> and September 2<sup>nd</sup> of 2013, there were 231 violent crimes recorded in the City, 40 incidents (-15%) below last year's total of 271, and 51 (18%) under the five-year average for this period.
- There have been two murders in 2013, both recorded in April. A complete synopsis of these incidents can be found on the next slide. All of the other violent crimes: Rape (-6%), Robbery (-4%), and Aggravated Assault (-22%) registered notable declines when compared with the totals for the first eight months of 2012.

# MURDER


## No Patterns

- There have been two murders reported in Cambridge over the first eight months of 2013. Both were recorded during the month of April:
- On April 10<sup>th</sup>, Aisling Brady McCarthy was charged with murder in the death of a Cambridge child who died in January. McCarthy was the child's nanny and was arrested after the death of Rehma Sabir of Cambridge, who was hospitalized with severe head injuries on her first birthday and died two days later. Aisling is awaiting trial.
- On April 18<sup>th</sup>, Cambridge Police received reports of shots fired on the MIT campus. At 10:30 p.m., an MIT police officer was found shot in his vehicle in the area of Vassar and Main Streets. Officer Sean Collier, 27, was found with multiple gunshot wounds. He was transported to Massachusetts General Hospital and pronounced deceased. Authorities launched an immediate investigation into the circumstances of the shooting and determined that two males were involved. The case is being investigated by local, state, and federal authorities working in cooperation. The investigation remains active and ongoing.
- Preliminary statistics released on 6/1/13 by the FBI reveal that Murder **increased by 1.5%** in the United States in 2012.
- The following two slides contain a chronological listing of all unsolved murders in Cambridge since 1999.



# Unsolved Murders: 1999 to 2012

**Colin Burton**, 30, of Dorchester, was shot and killed outside of Hi - Fi Pizza on Mass Ave in Central Square on September 18<sup>th</sup>, 1999. Burton was talking with the occupants of a Ford Explorer when the subject in the passenger seat fired through the window. Two suspects fled the scene. The case remains under active investigation.

**Ian Gray**, 19, of Mattapan, was in an argument outside of the Rhythm & Spice restaurant that spilled out onto Mass Ave. A suspect that had left the scene returned with a group of people and a fight ensued. A knife was produced during the altercation and four gunshots were fired, fatally wounding Gray. This case remains open

On June 17<sup>th</sup>, 2002 at 7:00PM, **Ricardo Williams**, 27, of Malden, was found in the driver's seat of a motor vehicle suffering from a gunshot wound to his face. Williams was taken to CCH where he was pronounced dead. This case remains open.

## Unsolved Murders: 1999 to 2012

**Jason Ellcock**, 33, of Malden, formerly of Cambridge and father of three, was found with multiple gunshot wounds in front of the driveway to 364 Rindle Ave at 3:05 AM on the night of June 16<sup>th</sup>, 2009. He was pronounced dead at the scene. This incident remains under investigation.

**James Lauture**, 30, of Cambridge, was sitting in a vehicle near Brookline and Watson Streets just after midnight on Saturday, March 12<sup>th</sup>, 2011, when an unknown gunman opened fire. The occupants in the car were able to drive to Central Square. Lauture died from multiple gunshot wounds. The other man in the vehicle survived. This case remains open.

On June 3<sup>rd</sup>, 2012, **Charlene Holmes**, 16, of Cambridge was shot while sitting on a porch on Willow Street. She later succumbed to her wounds at the hospital. The investigation into this incident remains active, but no arrests have been made to date.

# RAPE

*No Patterns*

- Over the first eight months of 2013, 17 rapes were reported, one less than for the same period in 2012, which translates to a **6% reduction** when compared to last year and a **15% decrease** when compared to the five-year average of twenty sexual assaults for this similar time period.
- During the first eight months of the year, there were two reports of rapes classified as domestic and eight involving acquaintances known to the victim and three incidents categorized as contact scenarios. Three of the sexual assaults have yet to be classified.
- The first and only stranger-to-stranger rape of the year was recorded in March. This incident involved a blitz type scenario late at night in Central Square. This case remains under investigation.
- Preliminary statistics released on 6/1/13 by the FBI reveal that Rape **decreased by 0.3%** in the United States in 2012.

# Citizen Alert: Gypsy Cab Rape

- Mass State Police are investigating an aggravated assault/rape that occurred in Newton on 8/6/13. A female victim attempted to hail a taxi while on Seaport Boulevard at approximately 1:30 AM and **a black Lincoln livery style sedan** (Gypsy Cab) stopped and picked her up. Victim was driven to a secluded area in Newton where she was raped and beaten, and then released.
- **Composite on right is of suspect,** described as possibly Hispanic or Indian/Middle Eastern with a notable accent late, 20's to early 30's, 6ft tall, 230-240lbs, muscular build, dark complexion, buzz cut black hair, with neatly cropped facial hair.



*\*A similar incident reported on August 18<sup>th</sup> that was alleged to have occurred on the Boston/Cambridge border was determined to be invalid by the Boston Police.*



# Rape/Sexual Assault

## *What can we do?*

### **Police Response Strategy:**

- Cambridge Police are focused on the prevention of these crimes by increasing officer visibility and vigilance toward unmarked/unlicensed taxi and livery vehicles in the city.
- The Cambridge Police Department takes reports of rapes and sexual assaults very seriously. CPD encourages all victims to report these crimes to police by calling 9-1-1 or speaking with investigators at 617-349-3370.

### **Citizen Response Strategy:**

Residents and visitors are asked to take the following precautions to protect themselves:

- Do not get into unmarked taxi or livery cars.
- Use only licensed cabs or clearly identifiable livery service vehicles that are called to your location.
- Carry a cell phone and call ahead to your destination to alert them that you're on the way. Make sure you're expected at a certain time, so in the event you fail to show up, those expecting you will know enough to begin looking for you.


# AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

## No Patterns

- When compared to the first eight months of 2012, aggravated assaults recorded a considerable **decrease of 22%**, with 37 fewer crimes recorded in 2013. When measuring this violent index crime against the five-year average for the time period between January 1<sup>st</sup> and September 2<sup>nd</sup>, there has been a **decline of 23%**, with 39 crimes below the projected average of 170 aggravated assaults.
- Preliminary statistics released on 6/1/13 by the FBI reveal that Aggravated Assault **increased by 2%** in the United States in 2012.

# ROBBERY

## No Patterns


- The five-year average for overall robbery in Cambridge for the first eight months of the year is 91 incidents. From January 1<sup>st</sup> to September 2<sup>nd</sup> of 2013, 81 robberies were reported, translating to an **11% decline** below the projected total.
- There was a **33% drop** in robberies from July to August with five fewer crimes reported .
- Street robberies have **fallen 18%** when measured against the five-year average, down 14 crimes from the projected total of 76 incidents. When compared with the first eight months of 2012, there has been a **11% decrease** from 70 to 62 street robberies. There has not been a street robbery pattern identified in Cambridge over the first eight months of this year. Street robberies of cell phones and laptops remain a major regional problem.
- There have been 19 commercial robberies (at five convenience stores, six banks, two drug stores, two retail establishments, two liquor store, a fast food chain and a gas station) so far in 2013.



# Street Robbery Activity: Summer of 2013 – 6/1/13 to 9/2/13

When compared with the first eight months of 2012, there has been an 11% drop from 70 to 62 robberies targeting individuals on the streets of the City. Overall, it was a very quiet Summer for this target crime with no patterns identified and street robberies were down 20% when measured against the same three-month period in 2012.





# BURGLARY

## *Emerging Patterns*


- During the first eight months of 2013, there were 241 total burglaries (the combination of residential and commercial burglaries) reported in Cambridge. This number is **down 31%** when compared to last year during this time period and is **26% lower than the five-year average** of 327.
- Commercial burglary has **dropped 24%** when compared with 2012, with twelve fewer incidents reported, and has **dropped 32%** when measured against the five-year average.
- Residential burglaries ("housebreaks") are **down 31%** from the first eight months of 2012 with 96 fewer incidents reported and have **declined 25%** when measured against the five-year average.
- Sporadic daytime activity in the neighborhoods of Central Square, specifically Cambridgeport and Area 4, are being monitored for potential pattern evolution.




# Housebreak Activity: Summer of 2013 – 6/1/13 – 9/2/13

When compared with the first eight months of 2012, there has been a sizable decline of 32% in housebreaks in Cambridge. The warm weather months usually produce the greatest amount of housebreak patterns in our City. That did not happen this summer; no patterns were identified and this property crime declined 35% with 44 fewer breaks reported.

This series of housebreaks in Agassiz and Peabody may have been related to the professional housebreak crew that has been active along the Somerville border in 2013. Five breaks over the first two weekends of July in Neighborhood #8 and #9 on side streets off of Mass Ave. 19 breaks over the Summer. Sporadic incidents in Richdale /Walden area during first two weeks of August – quiet since.

23 housebreaks in Cambridgeport and Riverside over the Summer. Majority of activity during two-week period in mid-July in the upper Port was a series of night time breaks. Three recent incidents in close proximity to Central Square at the end of August are being closely monitored.





# LARCENY

## Possible Emerging Patterns

- Overall, larceny year-to-date has decreased by 6% when compared with the first eight months of 2012 and is down 5% when measured against the five-year weighted average for this time frame. Only larcenies from motor vehicles experienced an increase from July to August.
- Although larcenies from motor vehicles are still down 14% compared to 2012, this difference is slowly shrinking (was -28% in May, -23% in June, and -17% in July). LMVs rose 27% from 55 in July to 70 in August. Cambridgeport saw the brunt of the activity this month, with multiple incidents reported overnight on weekends.
- Larcenies from persons citywide are down 2% compared to last year, but the 2013 year-to-date total registers at 10% above the five-year average. Citywide, thefts dropped 40% from 40 in July to 24 in August.
- There have been 258 larcenies from buildings reported during the first eight months of 2013. This total is two crimes below the number reported during this time period in 2012 and two above the five-year average. Over the past month, this crime type dropped 33% from 39 incidents down to 26.
- In 2013, there have been 264 bike thefts to date, which for the second month in a row is exactly equal to the number reported through the same time frame in 2012. Bike thefts dropped by 27% in August when compared with July. West Cambridge saw the most bike thefts in August with 16, followed by Mid-Cambridge and Riverside with 11 each.







- For the first eight months of 2013, larcenies from MVs **are down 14%** when compared with the same time frame in 2012, with **61 fewer thefts recorded**. Larcenies from MVs have **fallen 20%** when compared with the five-year average, with **97 fewer incidents than** the projected total of 485 thefts. The large drop in larcenies from MVs citywide can likely be attributed to the arrest of two people committing these crimes in January and the multiple snow storms that buried the area in February and March.
- Larceny from motor vehicles **jumped 27%** from 55 incidents in July to 70 in August.
- Summer Hot Spot clusters that were identified include:
  - Riverside: a series of weekday afternoon breaks east of Harvard Square.
  - Area 4: weekend night breaks on the periphery of Central Square
  - Cambridgeport: weekend night breaks into unlocked vehicles
  - A one-night spree of incidents along Huron and Grove Streets in July.

# Larceny from Motor Vehicles

## *What can we do?*

### Police Response Strategy:

- Cambridge Police are focused on prevention of these crimes by increasing officer visibility in targeted areas.
- Citizens are encouraged to take the proper precautions to protect their vehicles and their belongings by doing everything possible to not make their vehicles easy targets.



### Citizen Response Strategy:

- Citizens are asked to take the following precautions to protect themselves, their vehicles, and their belongings from theft:
  - Make sure all of your car doors are locked when you leave your vehicle.
  - **Take extra care when out doing your shopping.**
  - If you are **approached by a suspicious person** while you are in your vehicle, **sound your horn to attract attention.**
  - **NEVER LEAVE VALUABLES EXPOSED IN YOUR CAR.**
    - If you must leave packages or valuables in your car, **place them in the trunk of under a blanket to conceal them**




- Larcenies from the person are **down 2%** (five incidents) in 2013 when compared to the first eight months of 2012. However, the total of 243 incidents reported thus far in 2013 is **10% above** the five-year average of 221.
- In the past four weeks, larcenies from the person have **dropped 40%** from 40 incidents in July to 24 in August. Harvard Square usually accounts for a large portion of these incidents at the many bars and restaurants in the Square (known as "dipper" activity). In August, eight dipper thefts were reported in Harvard Sq (up from 4 in June and 5 in July). Three of the thefts occurred at the same business throughout the month, but no temporal patterns emerged. Only three were reported in Central Sq.

# Larceny from Person Activity - Trends for 2013

There have been 243 larcenies from the person year-to-date citywide in 2013. This is 2% (5 incidents) below the 2012 total at this time and 10% (22 incidents) above the five-year average.





# LARCENY: of Bicycle

## No Patterns


- In 2013, there have been 264 bike thefts to-date, the same number that was reported during the first eight months of 2012. This number is **5% above** the five-year average of 251 thefts.
- Bike thefts **dropped by 27%** (20 incidents) from July to August. West Cambridge, particularly the Harvard Sq section of the neighborhood, saw the most bike thefts in August with 16, followed by Mid-Cambridge and Riverside, each with 11.
- The majority of thefts this year (**59%**) have involved bikes that were locked but left out in the open (locked to public bike racks or sign poles, for example).
- The highest % of thefts from yards and porches this year have occurred in Mid-Cambridge, North Cambridge, and Area 4.



## Bike Theft Activity: Summer of 2013 – 6/1/13 to 9/2/13

There have been 264 bike thefts in the first eight months of 2013, the same number reported during this time frame in 2012 and thirteen incidents above the 5-year average of 251 incidents.




### Central Square

Larceny of bicycles nearly doubled in Central Square over the summer of 2013, jumping from 25 thefts last year to 49 over the past three months. The 500–700 blocks of Mass Ave saw the brunt of the activity. Most of the bikes in this area had been locked to bike racks when they were stolen. Five Cambridge juveniles and a homeless male were arrested for bike thefts in Central Sq in July.

### Harvard Square

Bike thefts increased in Harvard Square from 19 during the summer of 2012 to 40 incidents for June, July and August of 2013. Spatial trends indicate that the majority of these incidents were on Sundays, Mondays, and Thursdays during the midday and early evening hours. Half were secured to bike racks or poles in the Square.





# Larceny of Bicycles:

## *What Can We Do?*

### **Police Response Strategy:**

- Bicyclists stopped for infractions will be reminded to use lights when biking at night, wear helmets under the age of 16, and other safety tips to promote safer biking in the city.



### **Citizen Response Strategy:**

- Bicyclist are encouraged to record their bike's serial number as well as take a picture of their bike to provide to police in the event that it is lost or stolen.

- Stores should be vigilant in recording serial numbers and customer information on sales.

# AUTO THEFT

*No Patterns*

- The projected five-year weighted average for auto thefts for the first eight months of the year is 111 incidents. In 2013, auto thefts continue to register well below this level with only 77 reported year-to-date, translating to a **31% decline**. This number is also 13 thefts below the total reported through the first eight months of 2012, equaling a **14% drop**.
- Only ten vehicles have been reported stolen in the past four weeks, **down 33%** (five incidents) from the previous four-week total. Five of the ten were stolen from Cambridgeport, and four of those five were scooters or mopeds. In fact, six of the ten auto thefts in the past four weeks involved scooters/mopeds.
- Since the beginning of the year, Mid-Cambridge has experienced the most auto thefts citywide with 15 incidents, followed by Cambridgeport with 14 and East Cambridge with 10.
- Year-to-date, **43%** (or 33) of the stolen motor vehicles have been recovered.



# Suspicious Fires: Cambridge / Somerville

- Over the past several weeks, there have been three trash container fires in East Cambridge. The trash containers were left on the curb, and each incident involved a single container among several that were put out for collection. These fires occurred between **9:00 p.m. and the early morning.**
- **There have also been two house fires in the Peabody neighborhood on Bellevue Ave on 8/23/13 and on Wyman St on 9/4/13. Both of these early morning fires have been categorized as suspicious in nature.**
  - *Cambridge Police and Cambridge Fire are actively investigating these incidents and ask anyone with information to call 617-349-3300 or visit [www.CambridgePolice.org/Tips](http://www.CambridgePolice.org/Tips) to submit information anonymously via phone, email, or text message.*
- Somerville has also experienced several suspicious fires over the past several weeks that were similar in nature. The majority of these incidents all occurred during the **early morning hours on Thursdays and Fridays.**
