Part I Total Crime

An analysis of the serious crime statistics for the first eight months of 2026 points to a notable decrease of 11% in the Part One index total for Cambridge when compared with 2025. During the first eight months of the year, there were 2,116 serious crimes reported in the City. For the same time period in 2025, the combined total for Murder, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny & Auto Theft was 2,366 incidents. When measured against the five-year average, the crime index has decreased slightly with a -1% change (29 fewer incidents in 2026).

Further analysis of the crime totals for the first eight months of 2026 indicates that violent crimes recorded a 9% decrease when compared with last year. There were two homicides, 23 rapes, 57 robberies, and 214 aggravated assaults recorded from the beginning of the year through August 31, 2026.

Likewise, the numbers indicate that property crimes have dropped 11% so far in 2026 with crime totals registering significantly under the 2025 amount. The 27% decrease in shoplifting, the 29% drop in commercial breaks, and the 17% reduction in larcenies from motor vehicles during the first eight months of the year are the key trend indicators in 2026 that have driven the downward curve in the property crime index. This winter was colder and snowier than recent years, which has also undoubtedly contributed to the reduction in reported crimes during 2026.

When analyzing the serious crime totals of August 2026 versus the previous month of July 2026, there was a 12% decrease in the number of index incidents, with 38 fewer crimes reported in August.

Part I Property Crime

Analysis of property crime totals through August 2026 reveals an 11% decrease when measured against the same time in 2025 and a 1% drop (down 23 incidents) from the five-year average of 1,843.

Overall, the majority of the property crime categories have recorded decreases when measured against the first eight months of 2025. However, an 18% decrease in larceny from the person, a 29% drop in commercial breaks, a 17% decline in larceny from motor vehicles, and a substantial reduction of 27% in shopliftings (down 219 incidents) led to the overall decrease in property crimes so far this year.

Meanwhile, the most notable increase at this time is an 18% rise in bicycle thefts (up 48 incidents), a crime that has heated up substantially in the past few months with the warmer weather.

Part I Violent Crime

From January 1st to August 31st, 2026, there were 296 violent crimes recorded in Cambridge, 31 incidents (-9%) below last year's total of 327 incidents through this time frame and six incidents (-2%) below the 302 crimes forecasted for the first eight months of the year.

There were 23 rapes reported in Cambridge through August 31st, which is 4% (one incident) below the 24 reported during the first eight months of 2025.

The trend observed during the past few years of a high percentage of aggravated assaults and street robberies occurring in Central Square may slowly be starting to re-emerge after a delayed start in 2026. Seventy-four of the 214 aggravated assaults year-to-date (or 35%) have been reported in Central Square, as well as 15 of the 42 street robberies (or 36%).

The second homicide of 2026 occurred during the early morning hours of July 4th. Preliminary investigation suggests that the victim, Xavier Bautista, 32, from Cambridge, was shot shortly before 4:30am in the area of Broadway & Norfolk St. His body was located by a pedestrian at around 5:30am and he was pronounced deceased on scene by Paramedics. One person has been arrested in connection with this homicide and the investigation is ongoing.

MURDER

No Patterns

- The second homicide of 2026 occurred during the early morning hours of July 4th. Preliminary investigation suggests that the victim, Xavier Bautista, 32, from Cambridge, was shot shortly before 4:30am in the area of Broadway & Norfolk St. His body was located by a pedestrian at around 5:30am and he was pronounced deceased on scene by Paramedics. One person has been arrested in connection with this homicide. The investigation is being conducted by the Cambridge Police, Mass. State Police, and Middlesex District Attorney's Office.
- The first homicide of 2026 in Cambridge was reported on January 6. At approximately 7:52pm, officers responded to a Norfolk Street apartment complex for a report of a stabbing. One victim, 37-year-old Antoine Johnson, of Freetown, MA, was located with serious injuries and was transported to a local hospital, where he later died. Victor Rivas, 51, of South Boston was arrested and charged with assault and battery with a dangerous weapon in connection with this incident. After further investigation by the Massachusetts State Police, Cambridge Police Department and the Middlesex County District Attorney's Office, based on a full review of the facts, circumstances, evidence and applicable law, the Commonwealth has determined that it is not able to meet its burden of proving beyond a reasonable doubt that Mr. Rivas did not act in lawful self-defense during this incident. As a result, the Commonwealth is entering this nolle prosequi.

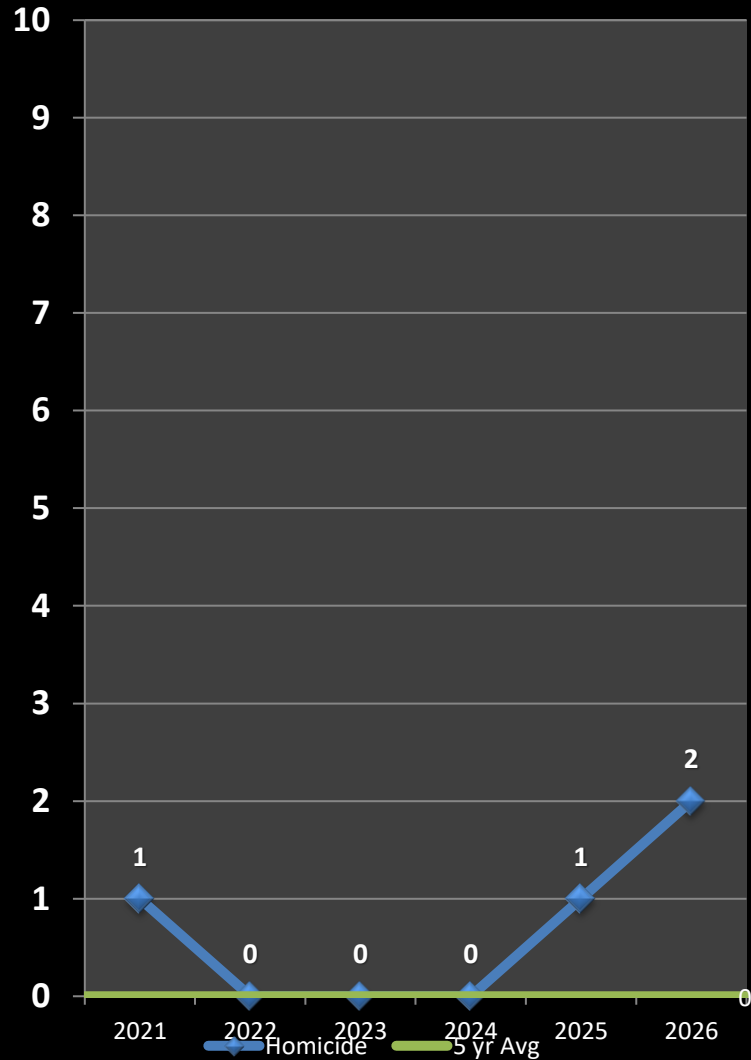

RAPE

No Patterns

- There have been 23 rapes reported in Cambridge so far in 2026, which is one less than the 24 reported during the first eight months of 2025. There have also been four fewer rapes reported through August 31st, 2026, when compared to the five-year weighted average of 27.
- The rapes reported so far in 2026 have been categorized as ten domestic assaults, five each of blitz and acquaintance rapes, and three contact incidents.
- The total number of reported rapes tends to fluctuate from year to year, but the number of stranger-to-stranger rapes reported each year in Cambridge—typically between 5 and 15—remains extremely low.

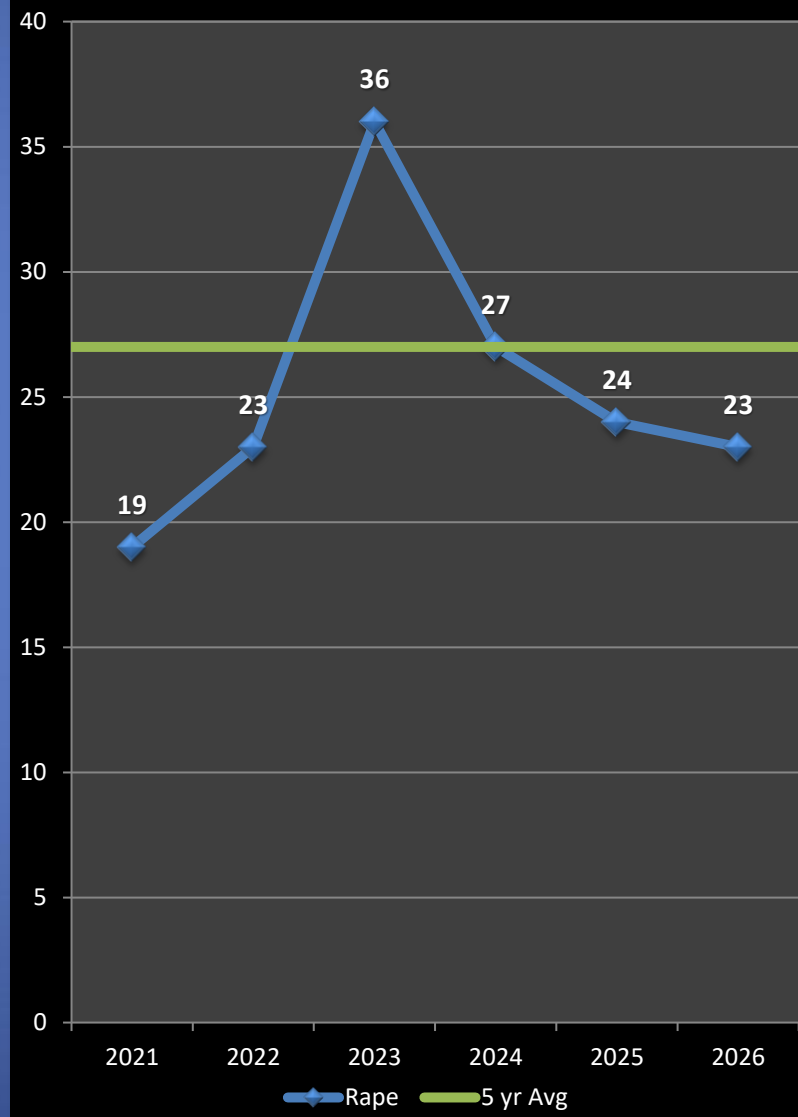

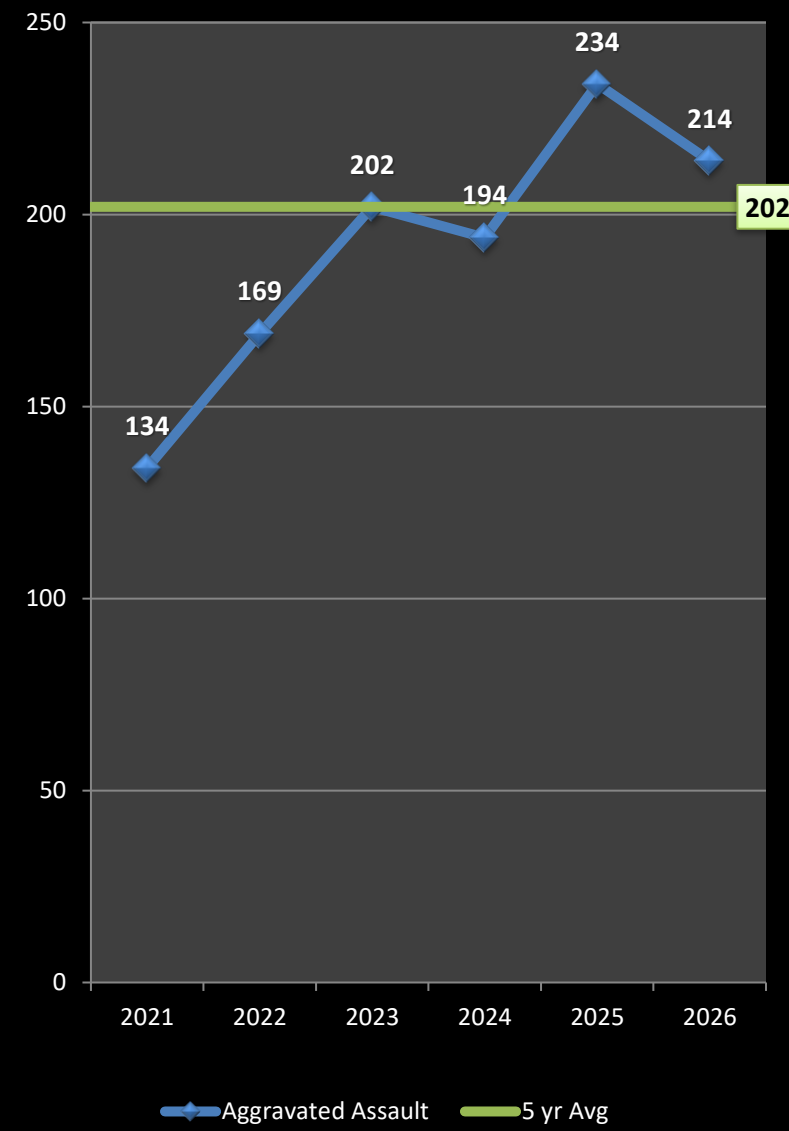

- The total of 214 aggravated assaults reported through August 31, 2026, is 9% less than that reported during the first eight months of 2025. Conversely, the total reported through 8/31 is 6% above the five-year average of 202.
- The 214 aggravated assaults reported so far in 2026 are comprised of the following classifications: 58 unprovoked scenarios; 51 domestic altercations; 18 between acquaintances; 16 traffic & parking assaults; 15 affray/brawls; 13 assaults on police officers; 12 shop owner/patron assaults; 10 psychotic episodes; six each of assaults between unhoused parties and landlord/neighbor assaults; four juvenile assaults; three workplace assaults; and one each of bar assaults and third lover situations.
- After a few slow months, the trend observed during the past few years of a high percentage of aggravated assaults taking place in Central Square appears to gradually be emerging again in 2026. Seventy-four of the 214 assaults year-to-date (or 35%) have taken place in that business district thus far. In August, 13 assaults took place in Central Square, followed by six in Harvard Square.
- There have been two confirmed shots fired incidents and one fatal shooting in Cambridge through 8/31 of 2026*. Through the same time period in 2025, there were five shots fired incidents, with three resulting in gunshot wounds (two non-fatal and one homicide) and two resulting in no injuries.
NOTE: The shooting on 5/11/26 resulted in two non-fatal injuries on the roadway of Memorial Dr (which is under State Police jurisdiction) and one shot fired into a residence on Memorial Dr with no injuries (which is under Cambridge Police jurisdiction). The suspect in this incident was taken into custody by State Police.

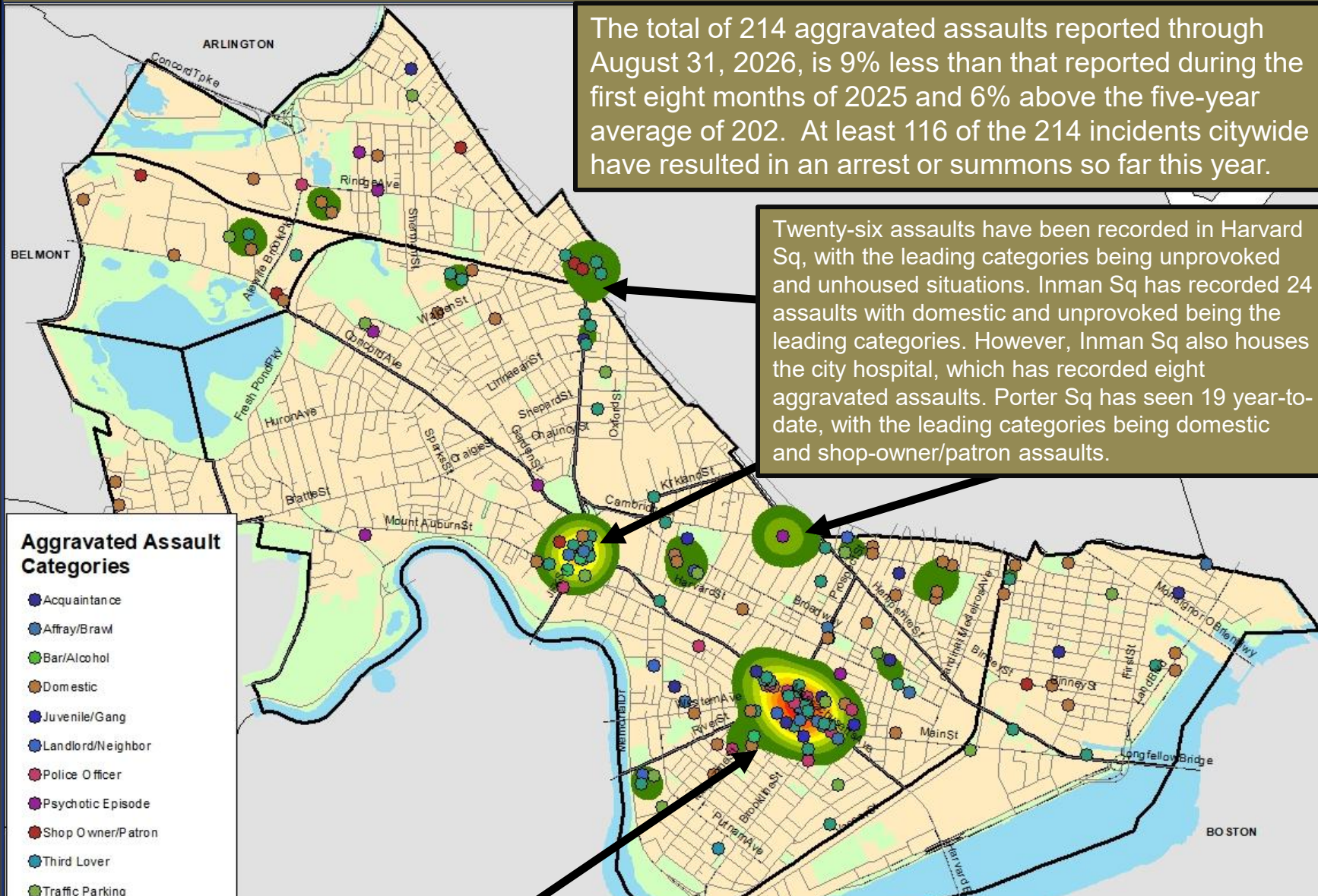




Geographic Breakdown of Aggravated Assaults: 1.1.26 – 8.31.26

Central Square has recorded 74 assaults year-to-date, with unprovoked assaults being the top category, accounting for 24 of the incidents, followed by affrays with 10 and acquaintance assaults, domestic assaults and assaults on police officers, all with nine each.



Shootings & Shots Fired in Cambridge: 1.1.26 – 8.31.26

There have been two confirmed shots fired incidents and one fatal shooting in Cambridge through 8/31 of 2026*. Through the same time period in 2025, there were five shots fired incidents, with three resulting in gunshot wounds (two non-fatal and one homicide) and two resulting in no injuries.

NOTE: The shooting on 5/11/26 resulted in two non-fatal injuries on the roadway of Memorial Dr (which is under State Police jurisdiction) and one shot fired into a residence on Memorial Dr w/ no injuries (Cambridge Police jurisdiction).

Robbery

No Patterns

- The five-year average for overall robbery in Cambridge through the first eight months of the year is 74 incidents. In 2026, 57 total robberies have been recorded to date, which translates to a 23% drop below the projected total and a 16% decrease below the 68 robberies reported through 8/31 in 2025.
- Fifteen commercial robberies have been reported year-to-date in 2026, down two incidents (-12%) from both the first eight months of 2025 and the five-year average of 17. All 15 robberies so far have been unrelated, but 10 of the 15 have involved shoplifting incidents at stores that escalated into robberies. This was a frequent scenario throughout much of 2025 as well.
- Street robberies year-to-date in 2026 are down 15 incidents (-26%) below the five-year average of 57 and are down nine incidents (-18%) below the 51 street robberies reported during the same time frame in 2025. The months of July & August saw an increase in incidents involving groups of young suspects stealing everything from bikes and mopeds to backpacks and wallets, although it is unknown if any are related at this time.
- The trend observed during the past few years of a high percentage of street robberies occurring in Central Square may very slowly be starting to re-emerge after a delayed start in 2026. However, this activity is still far below the level seen in recent years. Only 15 of the 42 street robberies (or 36%) year-to-date have been reported in this area, compared to 62% at the end of 2025.

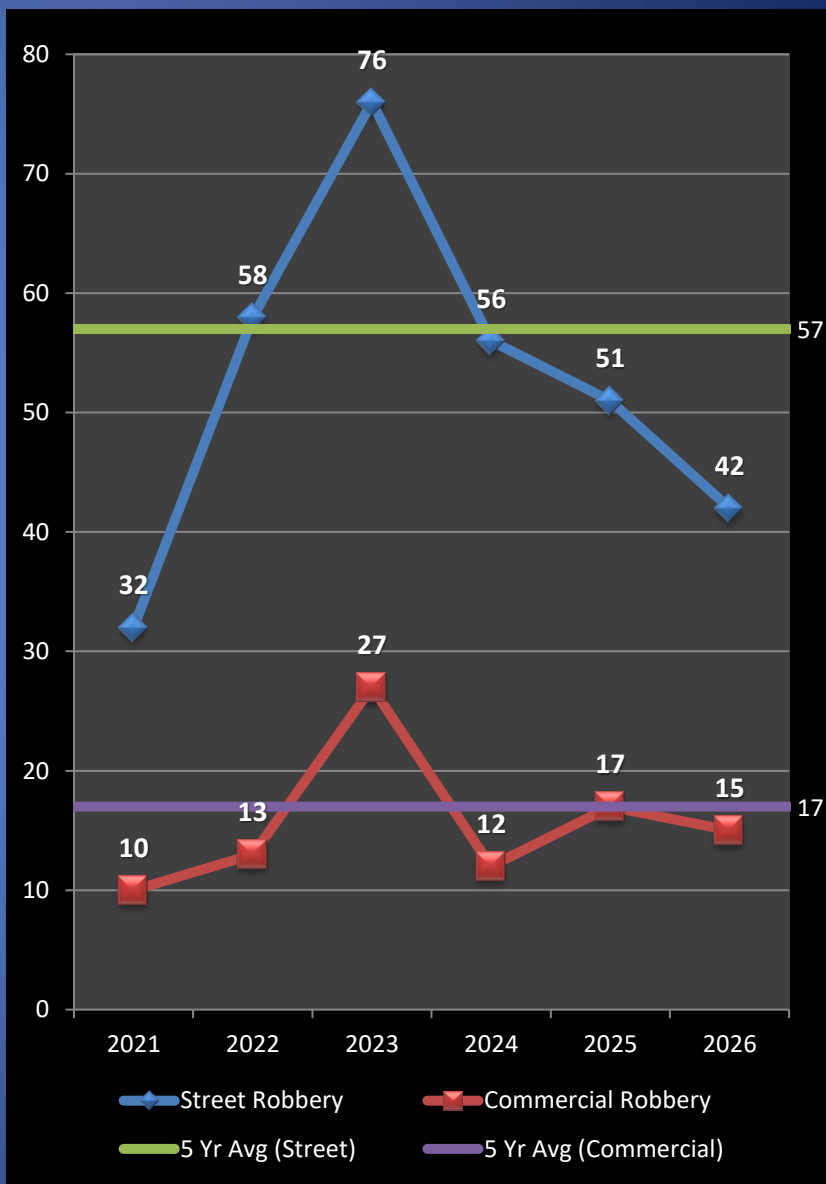

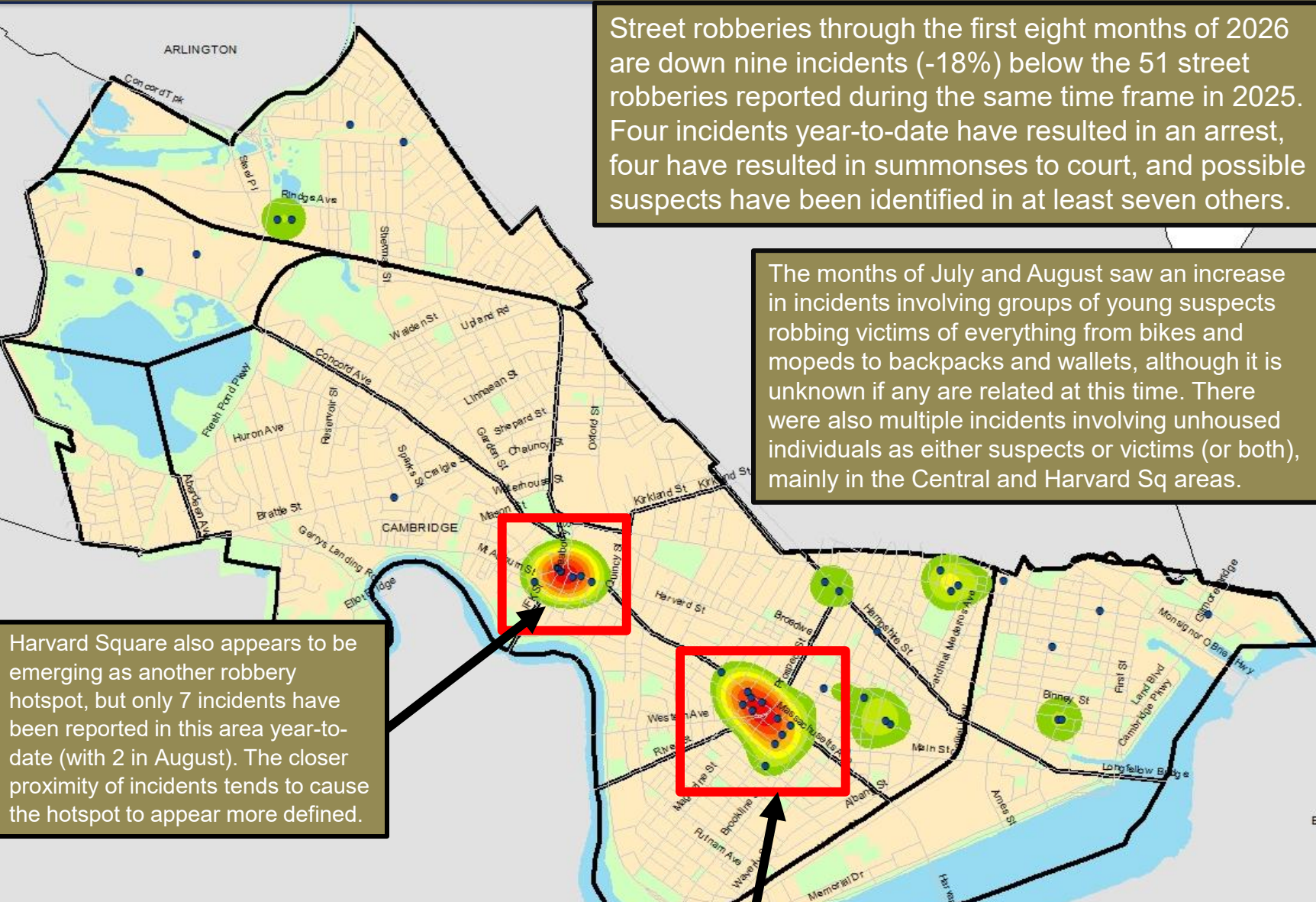




Geographic Breakdown of Street Robberies: 1.1.26 – 8.31.26

Street robberies through the first eight months of 2026 are down nine incidents (-18%) below the 51 street robberies reported during the same time frame in 2025. Four incidents year-to-date have resulted in an arrest, four have resulted in summonses to court, and possible suspects have been identified in at least seven others.

The months of July and August saw an increase in incidents involving groups of young suspects robbing victims of everything from bikes and mopeds to backpacks and wallets, although it is unknown if any are related at this time. There were also multiple incidents involving unhoused individuals as either suspects or victims (or both), mainly in the Central and Harvard Sq areas.



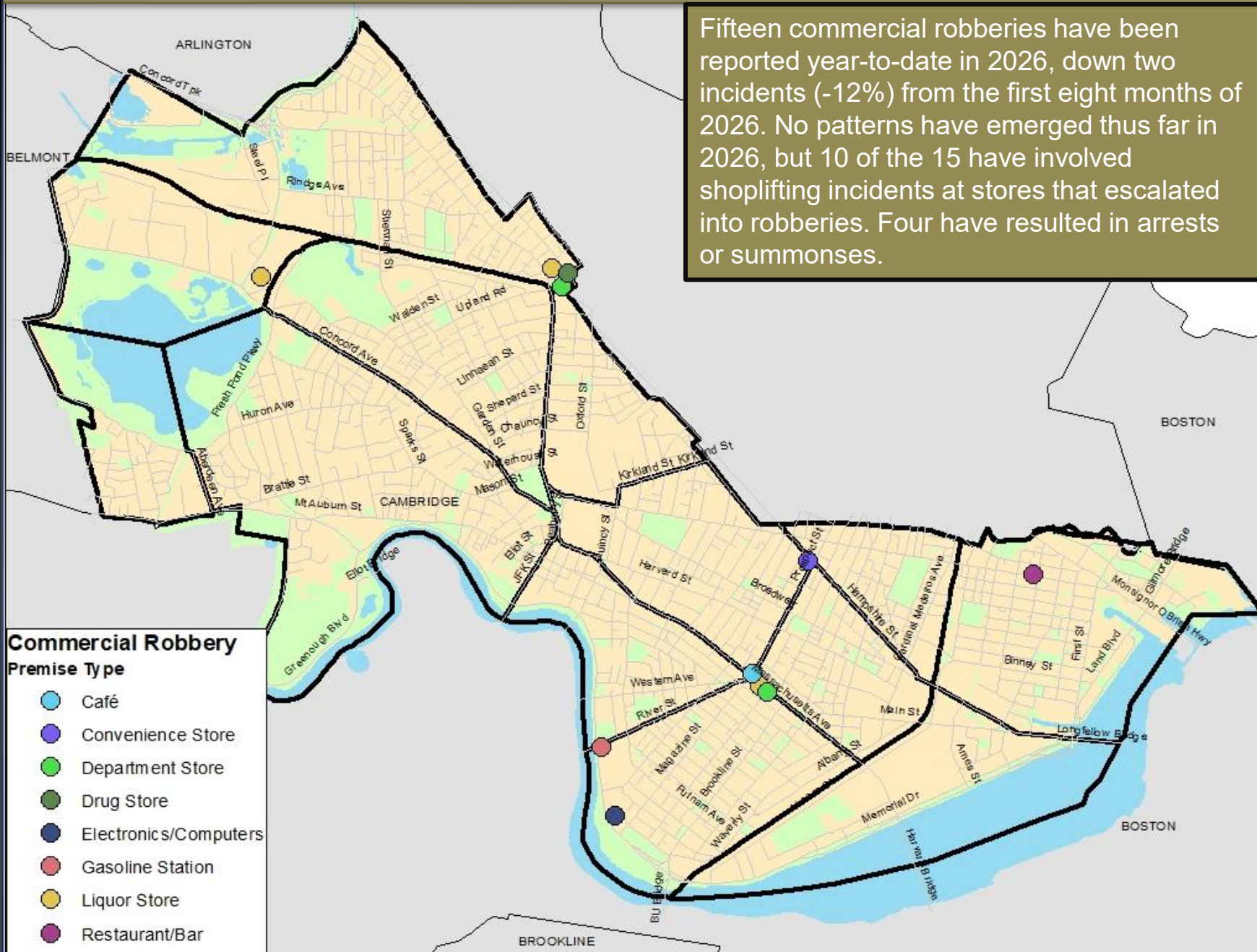
Harvard Square also appears to be emerging as another robbery hotspot, but only 7 incidents have been reported in this area year-to-date (with 2 in August). The closer proximity of incidents tends to cause the hotspot to appear more defined.

Although the Central Square area is still the main hotspot for street robberies citywide through the first eight months of 2026, this is not nearly the problem area that it has been in recent years. Fifteen of the 42 street robberies (or 36%) year-to-date have been reported in this area, which is down from 62% at the end of 2025. Four new incidents were reported in this area in August.



Geographic Breakdown of Commercial Robberies: 1.1.26 – 8.31.26

Fifteen commercial robberies have been reported year-to-date in 2026, down two incidents (-12%) from the first eight months of 2026. No patterns have emerged thus far in 2026, but 10 of the 15 have involved shoplifting incidents at stores that escalated into robberies. Four have resulted in arrests or summonses.





Burglary

No Patterns

- The property index crime of burglary, the combination of residential and commercial breaks, recorded a decrease of 1% (one incident) through August 31st of 2026 when compared to the 140 incidents reported during the first eight months of 2025. The total of 139 burglary incidents reported thus far in 2026 is also 13% (20 incidents) below the five-year average of 159.
- Housebreaks through August 31st increased by 17 incidents (+22%) when comparing 2025 to 2026. Of the 95 housebreaks that have occurred so far in 2026, the North Cambridge and Cambridgeport neighborhoods reported 19 and 18 incidents, respectively, making them the top neighborhoods for housebreaks, followed by Peabody with 15 incidents.
- Commercial breaks are down by 18 incidents (-29%), dropping from 62 incidents in the first eight months of 2025 to 44 in 2026. Twenty-one of these incidents have been elevated shopliftings, where the suspect was already trespassed from the store at the time of the theft.
- There are no defined patterns of residential or commercial burglaries anywhere in the city at the present time.

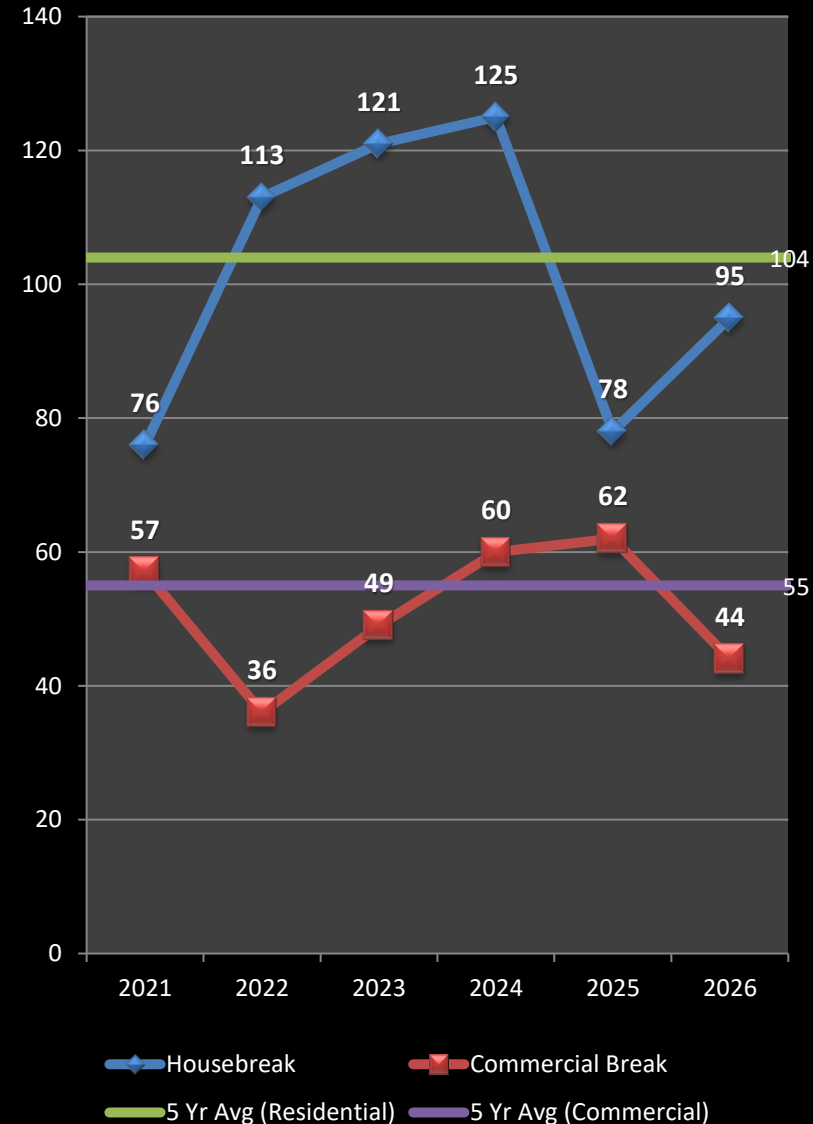

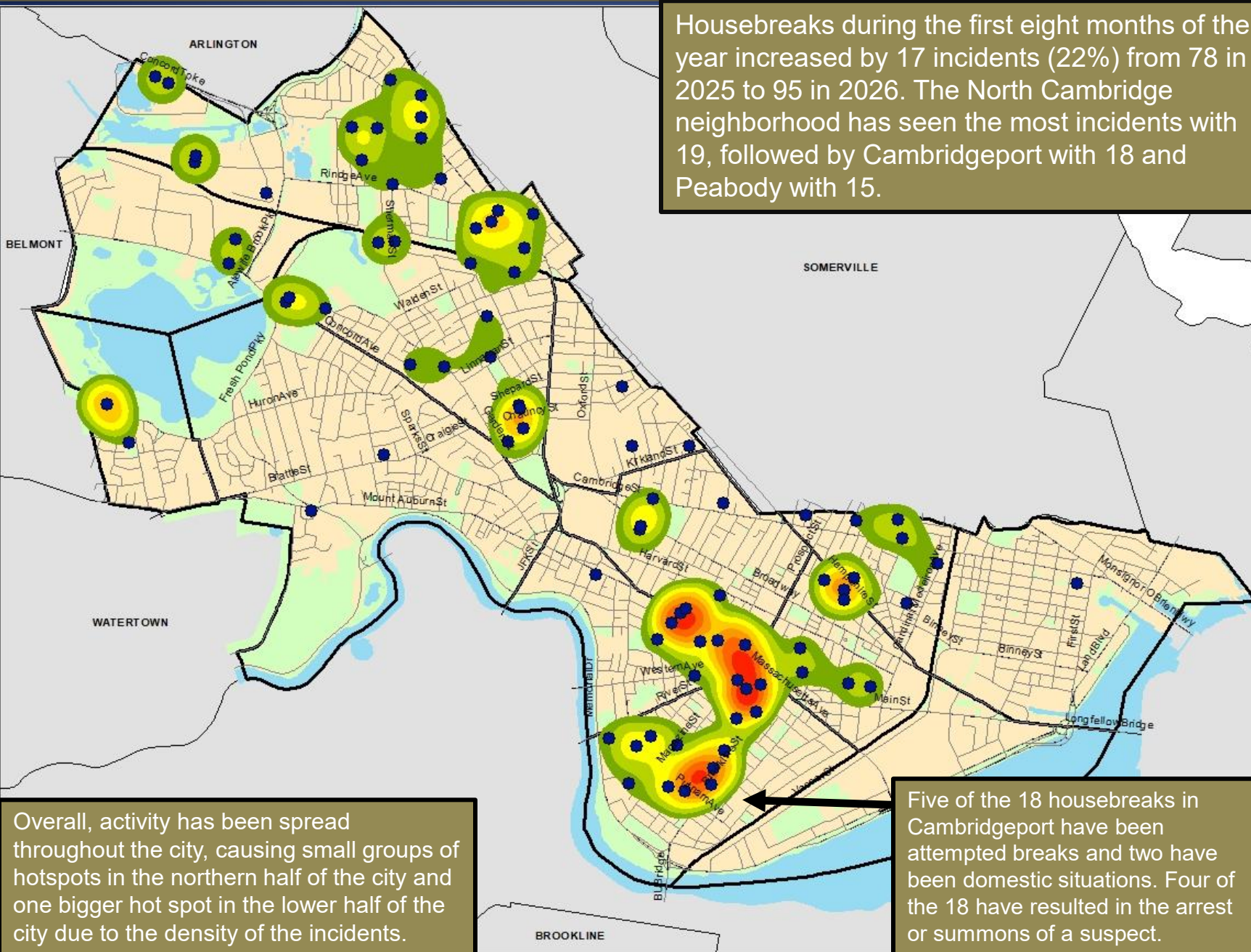

Geographic Breakdown of Housebreaks: 1.1.26 – 8.31.26

Housebreaks during the first eight months of the year increased by 17 incidents (22%) from 78 in 2025 to 95 in 2026. The North Cambridge neighborhood has seen the most incidents with 19, followed by Cambridgeport with 18 and Peabody with 15.

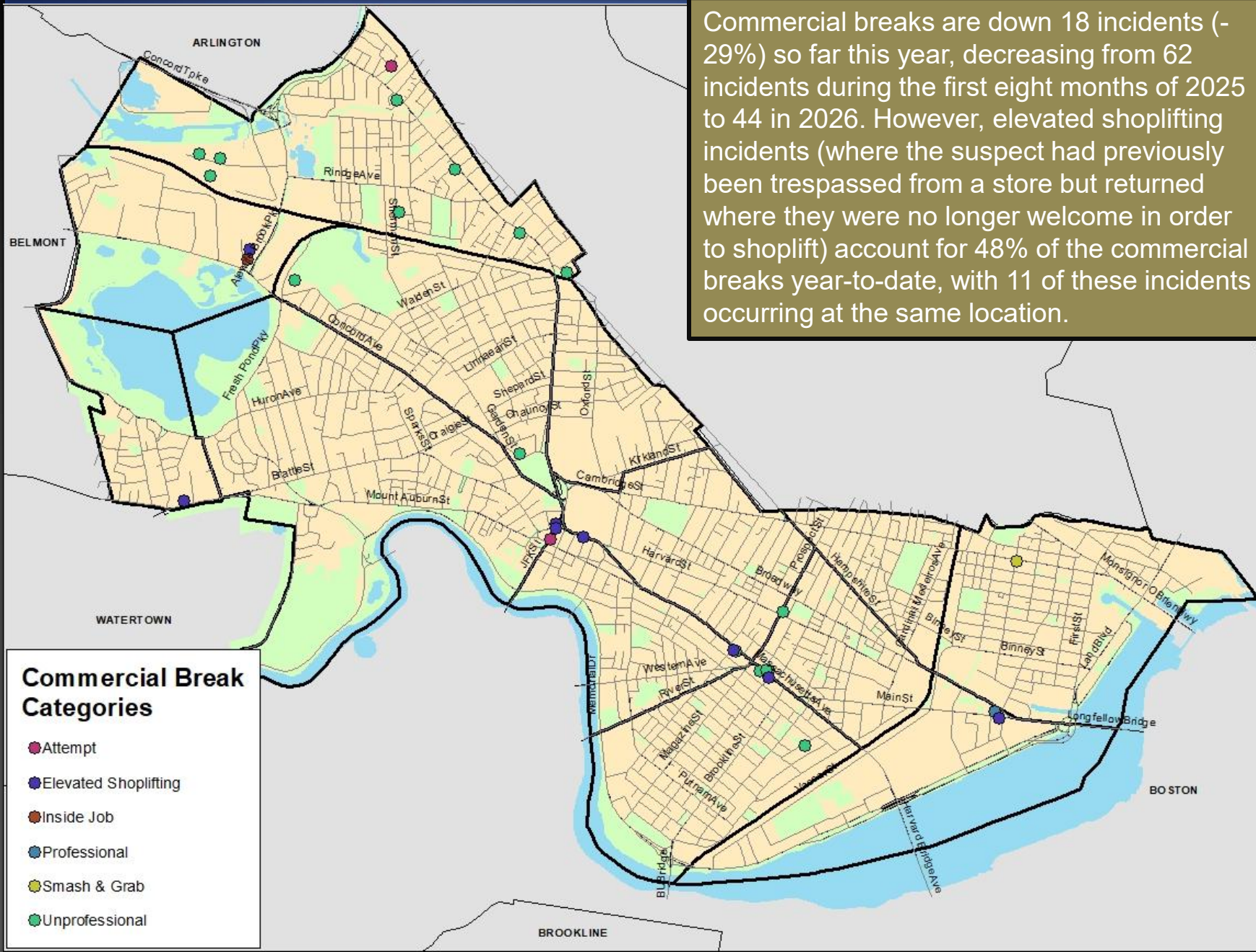


Overall, activity has been spread throughout the city, causing small groups of hotspots in the northern half of the city and one bigger hot spot in the lower half of the city due to the density of the incidents.

Five of the 18 housebreaks in Cambridgeport have been attempted breaks and two have been domestic situations. Four of the 18 have resulted in the arrest or summons of a suspect.

LARCENY

No Patterns

- **Overall larceny through August 31st of 2026 has registered 1,607 incidents, 12% below the same time in 2025.** The total of 1,607 larcenies reported thus far in 2026 is equal to the five-year average.
- **The larceny from motor vehicle total through August 31st, 2026, is 165 incidents, 17% below the same time frame in 2025.** This is also 25% (56 incidents) below the five-year average of 221 incidents.
- **Through August 31st, 2026, there were 45 larcenies from the person reported in Cambridge, down 18% (10 incidents) when compared to 2025.** Central and Harvard Squares have recorded 16 and 12 larcenies from the person, respectively.
- **There were 122 larcenies from buildings reported in the first eight months of 2026.** This total is four incidents (+3%) above the same time in 2025 and nine incidents (-7%) below the five-year average. There was a rise in thefts from lockers at health clubs in the Central & Porter Sq areas in the month of March, which dropped off in April and has fluctuated each month since, with only two incidents in August.
- **Larcenies from residences are down 39 incidents (-13%) in 2026 when compared with 2025.** Package thefts have accounted for 195 (or 72%) of the 272 larcenies from residences reported so far this year. North Cambridge and Mid-Cambridge have both recorded 33 incidents.
- **There have been 309 larcenies of bicycles reported so far in 2026.** This total is 48 incidents (18%) above the first eight months of 2025 and 7 incidents (2%) above the five-year average of 302. The top neighborhood for bike thefts so far in 2026 is North Cambridge with 68 incidents.

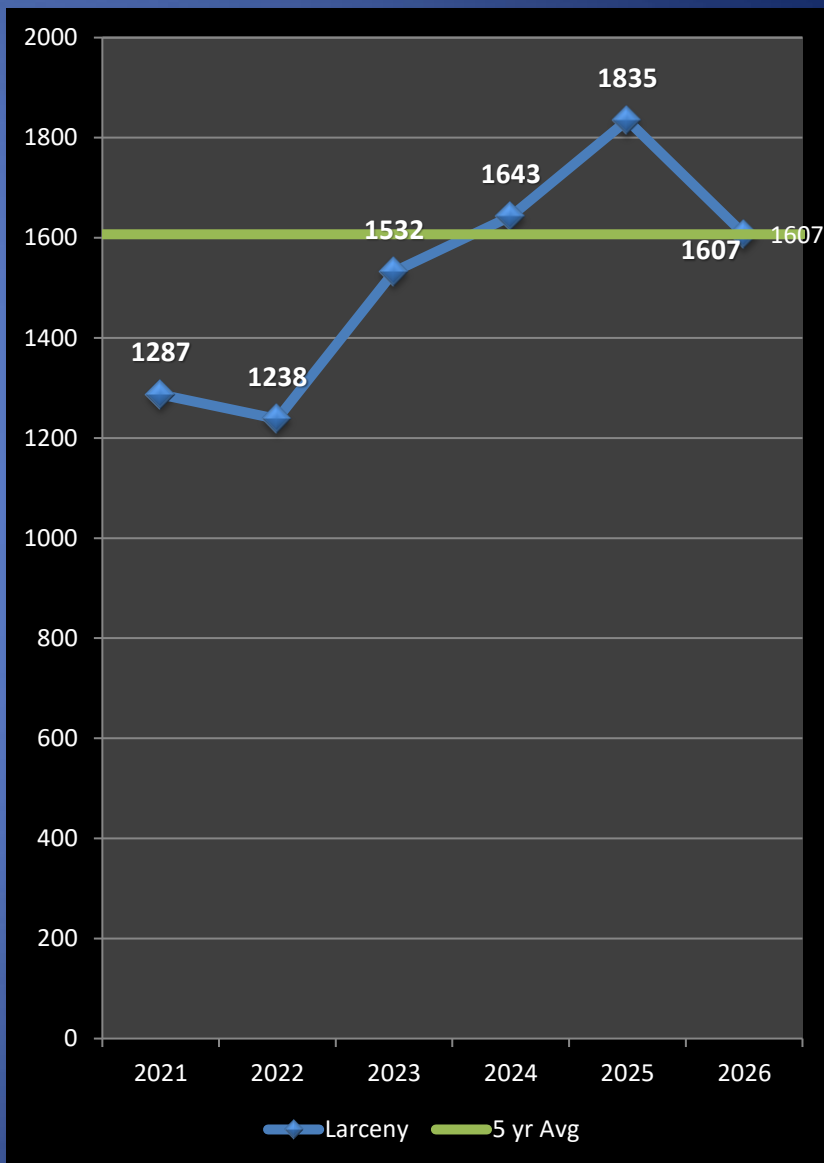

LARCENY From MV

No Patterns

- The larceny from motor vehicle (LMV) total through the first eight months of 2026 is 165 incidents, which is 17% (34 incidents) below the same time period in 2025. The 165 thefts from vehicles reported so far this year also indicate a decrease of 56 incidents (-25%) below the 221 car breaks forecasted for this time period.
- The neighborhoods reporting the most larcenies from motor vehicles in the first eight months of 2026 were North Cambridge and Mid-Cambridge with 45 and 30 incidents, respectively.
- Comparing the last four weeks (August) to the previous four (July), there was a significant decrease in the number of incidents reported, with 15 fewer incidents reported during August. The year started out with fewer LMVs than expected, due to the cold weather and winter storms, and they remain low as we continue to progress through the year, despite a slight increase in July.
- Of the 165 incidents reported so far in 2026, 70 vehicles (42%) were entered through an unlocked door, and 81 vehicles (49%) were entered via unknown means.

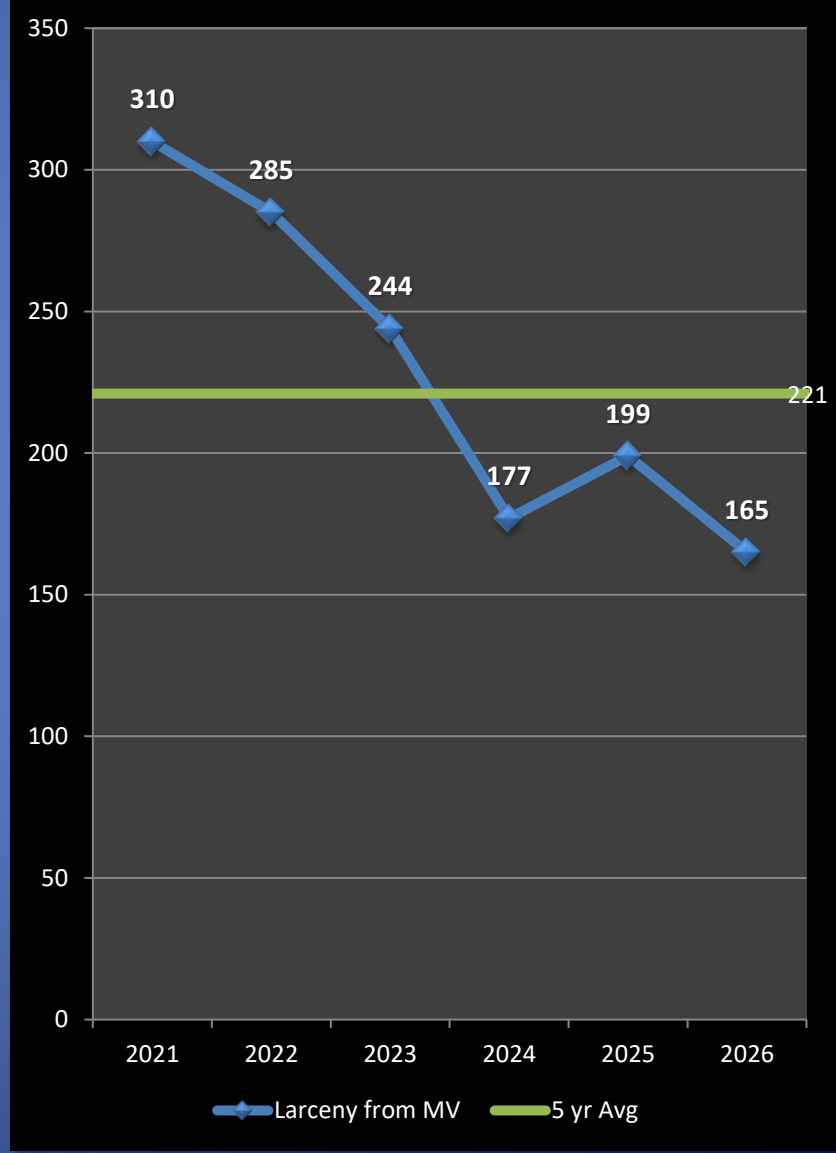

Geographic Breakdown of Larceny from Motor Vehicles: 1.1.26 – 8.31.26

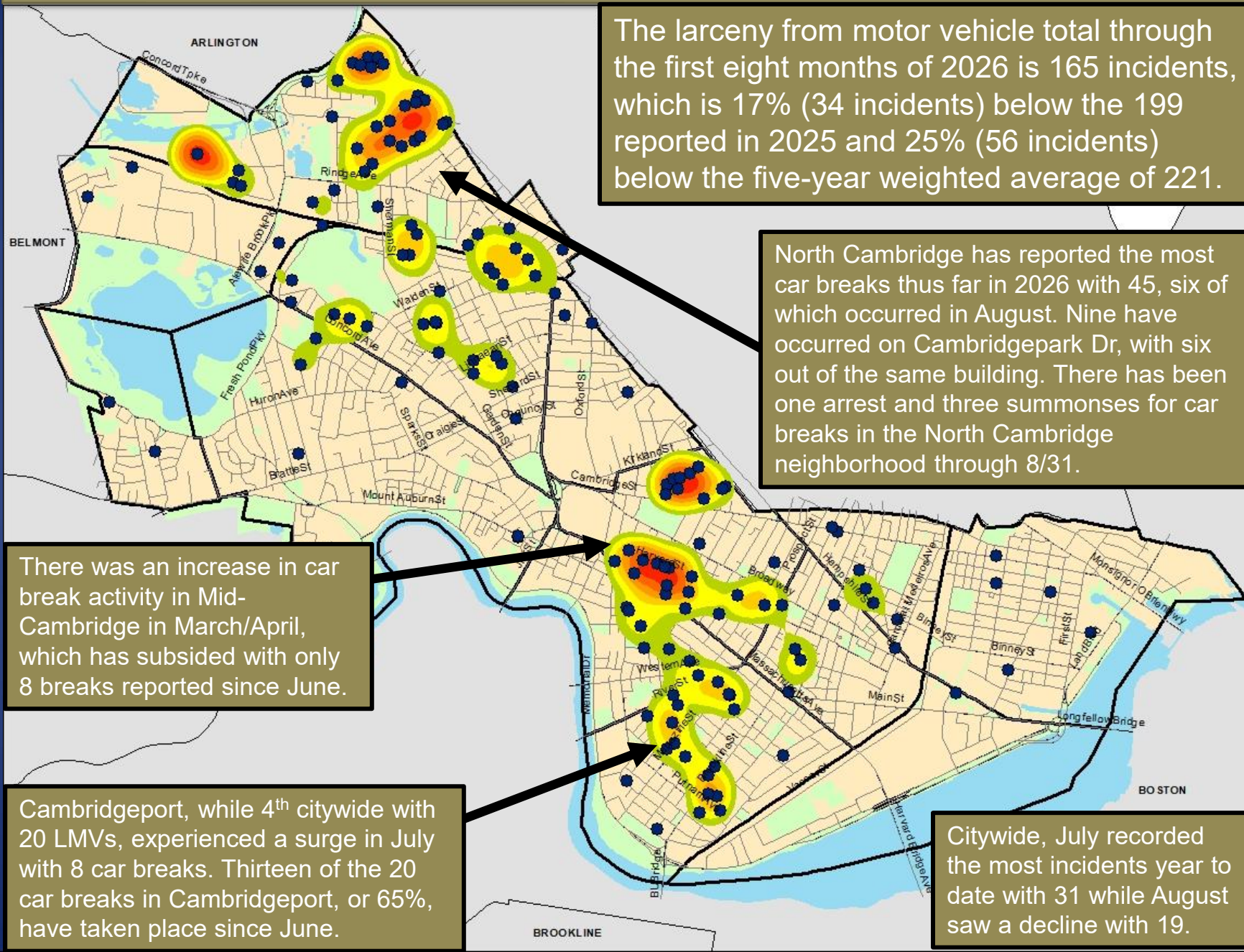
The larceny from motor vehicle total through the first eight months of 2026 is 165 incidents, which is 17% (34 incidents) below the 199 reported in 2025 and 25% (56 incidents) below the five-year weighted average of 221.

North Cambridge has reported the most car breaks thus far in 2026 with 45, six of which occurred in August. Nine have occurred on Cambridgepark Dr, with six out of the same building. There has been one arrest and three summonses for car breaks in the North Cambridge neighborhood through 8/31.

There was an increase in car break activity in Mid-Cambridge in March/April, which has subsided with only 8 breaks reported since June.

Cambridgeport, while 4th citywide with 20 LMVs, experienced a surge in July with 8 car breaks. Thirteen of the 20 car breaks in Cambridgeport, or 65%, have taken place since June.

Citywide, July recorded the most incidents year to date with 31 while August saw a decline with 19.





LARCENY of Bicycle

No Patterns

- Likely due at least in part to the colder weather and snow at the beginning of this year, 2026 started off with a sharp decline in bike thefts. However, this trend has reversed with the warmer weather. There have now been 309 bicycle thefts reported citywide so far in 2026, up 18% from the 261 reported during the same time frame in 2025. This increase in incidents also brought bike thefts up seven incidents (+2%) above the five-year weighted average of 302.
- The most recent four weeks (August) saw a 4% decrease in bike thefts when compared with the previous four weeks (July), with 2 fewer thefts reported.
- 137 bike thefts (or 44% of all citywide thefts year-to-date) have occurred north of Harvard Square.
- Of the 309 bike thefts reported so far in 2026, 212 (69%) were reportedly locked at the time of the theft.

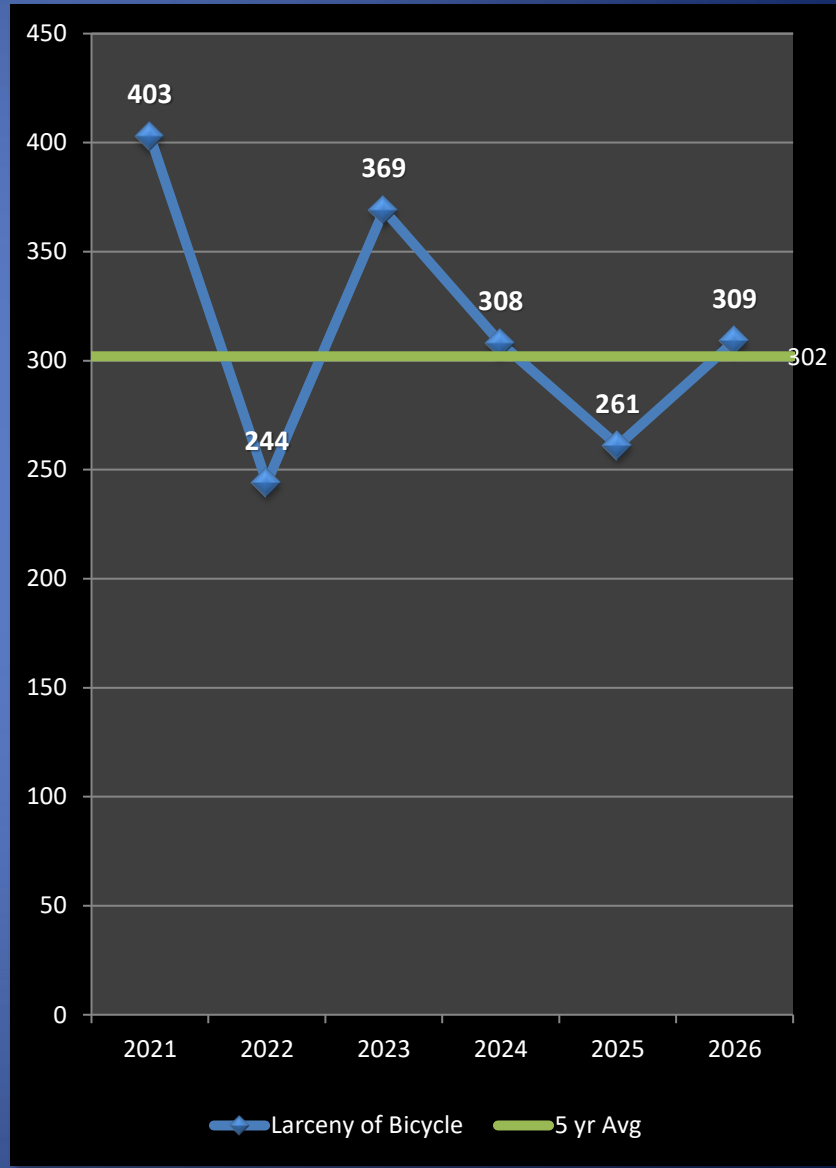

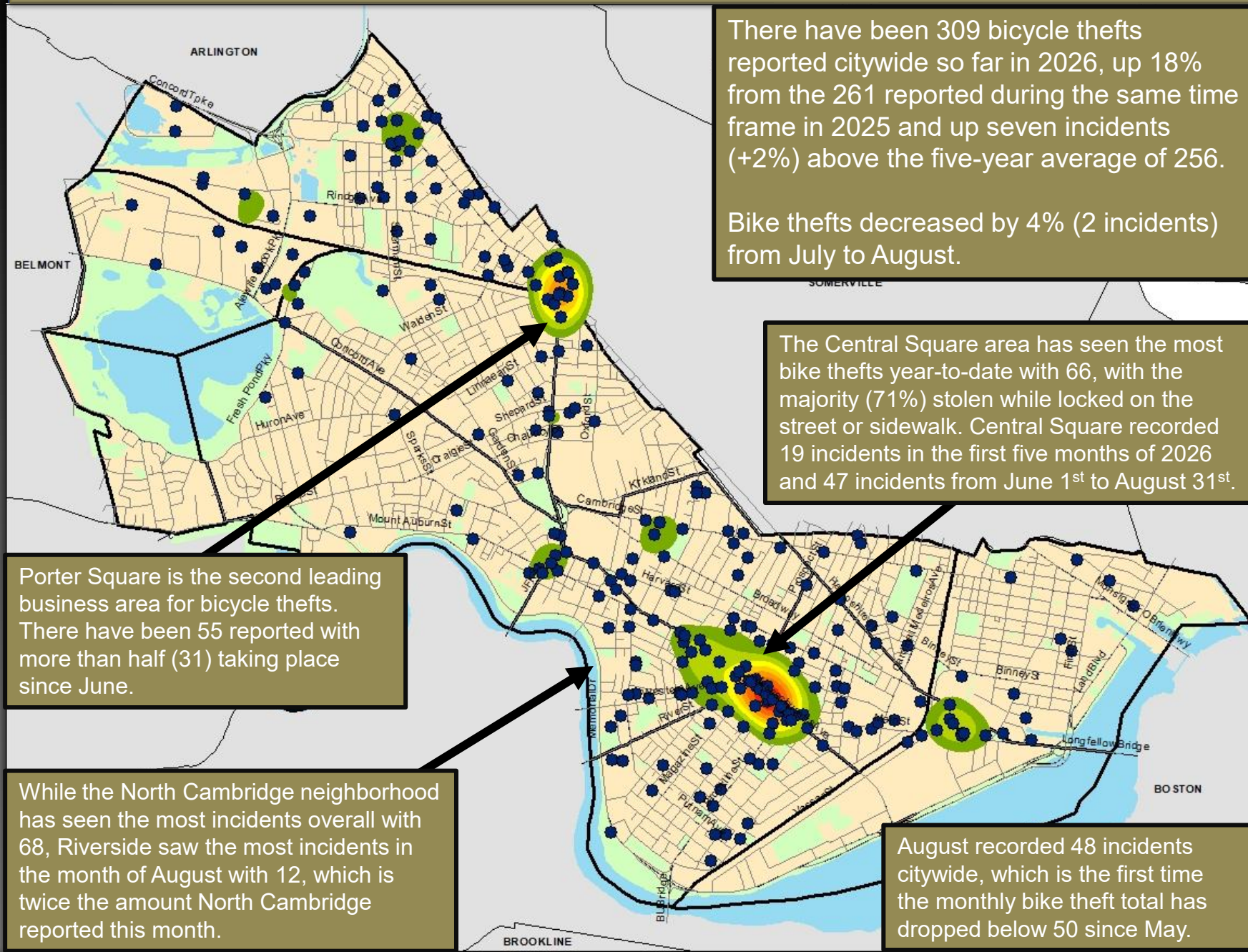

Geographic Breakdown of Bicycle Thefts: 1.1.26 – 8.31.26



There have been 309 bicycle thefts reported citywide so far in 2026, up 18% from the 261 reported during the same time frame in 2025 and up seven incidents (+2%) above the five-year average of 256.

Bike thefts decreased by 4% (2 incidents) from July to August.

The Central Square area has seen the most bike thefts year-to-date with 66, with the majority (71%) stolen while locked on the street or sidewalk. Central Square recorded 19 incidents in the first five months of 2026 and 47 incidents from June 1st to August 31st.

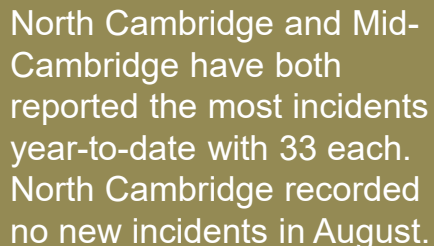
Porter Square is the second leading business area for bicycle thefts. There have been 55 reported with more than half (31) taking place since June.

While the North Cambridge neighborhood has seen the most incidents overall with 68, Riverside saw the most incidents in the month of August with 12, which is twice the amount North Cambridge reported this month.

August recorded 48 incidents citywide, which is the first time the monthly bike theft total has dropped below 50 since May.

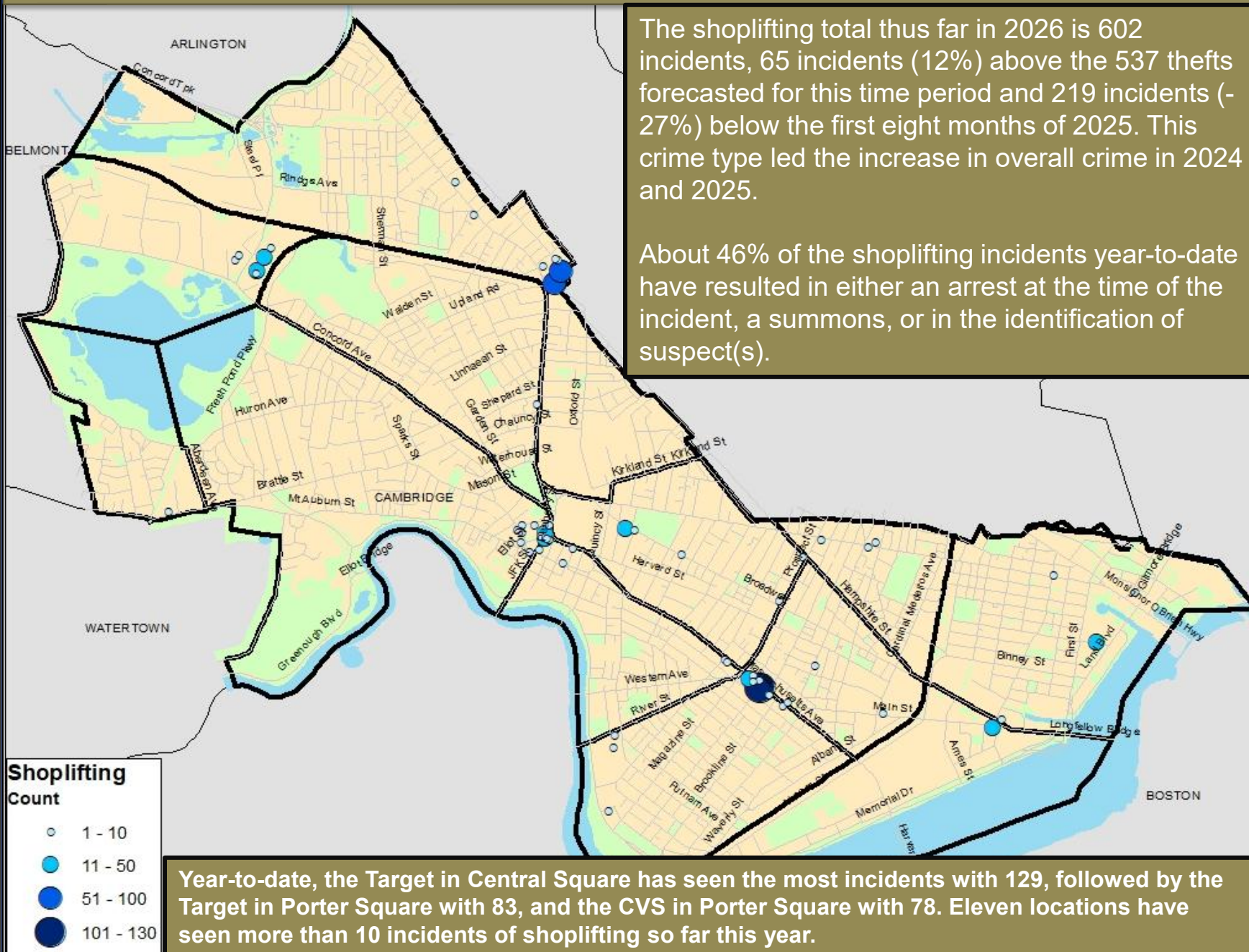
The large jump in package thefts over the past five years can be attributed to the explosion in online shopping and deliveries that began during the pandemic.

It should be noted that the number of package thefts reported to police is likely much lower than the actual number of thefts occurring, as package thefts are notoriously underreported.

18 of the 21 incidents that occurred in the month of August took place below Harvard Square.

AUTO THEFT

No Patterns

- The five-year weighted average for auto thefts for the first eight months of the year is 77 incidents, and with 74 reported so far in 2026, Cambridge has experienced a decrease of 4% below the expected total. Auto thefts conversely increased 16% (up 10 incidents) when compared with the first eight months of 2025.
- The neighborhood breakdown for auto thefts so far in 2026 is as follows: Cambridgeport and The Port – 15; North Cambridge – 10; Mid-Cambridge – 8; Peabody and Riverside – 6; West Cambridge and Inman/Harrington – 4; MIT and East Cambridge – 2; and Strawberry Hill and Baldwin – 1.
- Four of the 74 auto thefts reported so far this year involved a situation where the operator left the vehicle running in order to deliver a package or grab food. When the victim returned, the vehicle was gone. This type of auto theft was very common last year and has decreased substantially in 2026.
- Thirty-six of the 74 auto thefts reported so far this year have involved two-wheeled vehicles. There has been a notable increase in moped/motorcycle thefts this summer with 14 incidents reported in July and 8 incidents in August, particularly across lower Cambridge. Many of the incidents that were witnessed have involved multiple young suspects who arrived on mopeds and proceeded to steal either attended or unattended mopeds before fleeing back over the river into Boston.
- 29 of the 58 motor vehicles stolen in 2026 have been recovered to date.

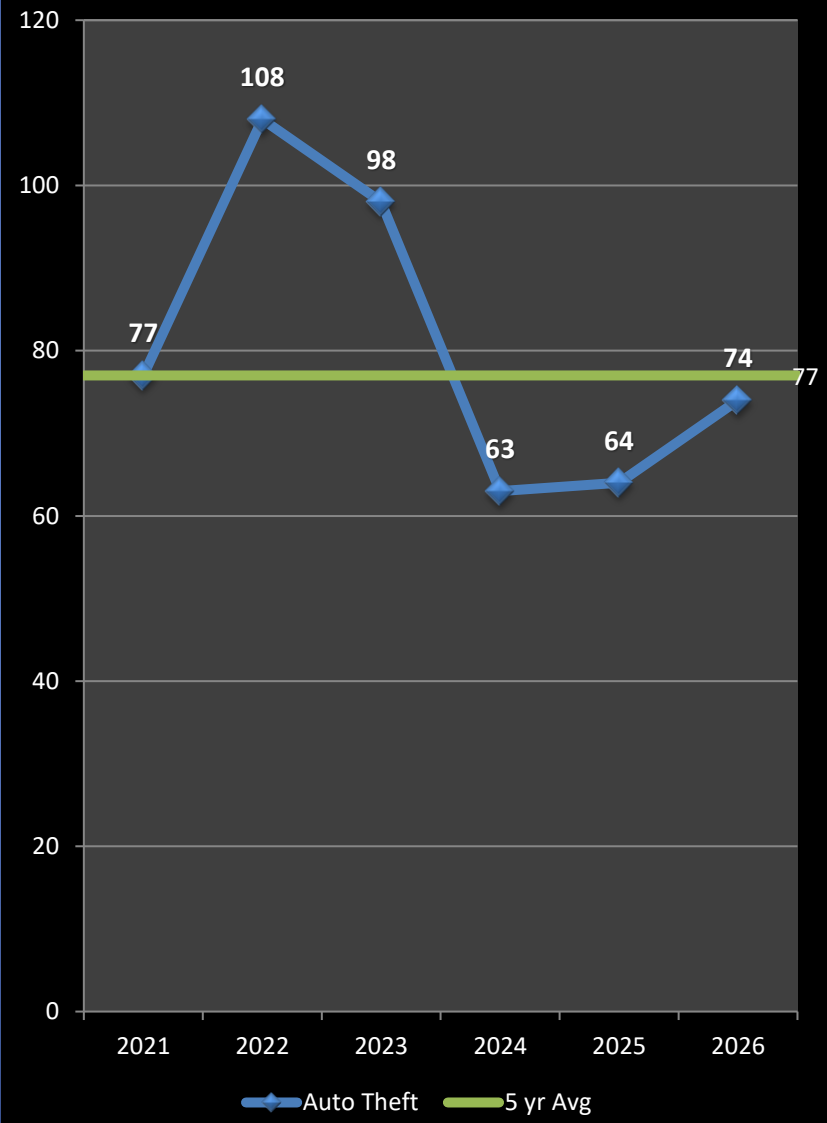

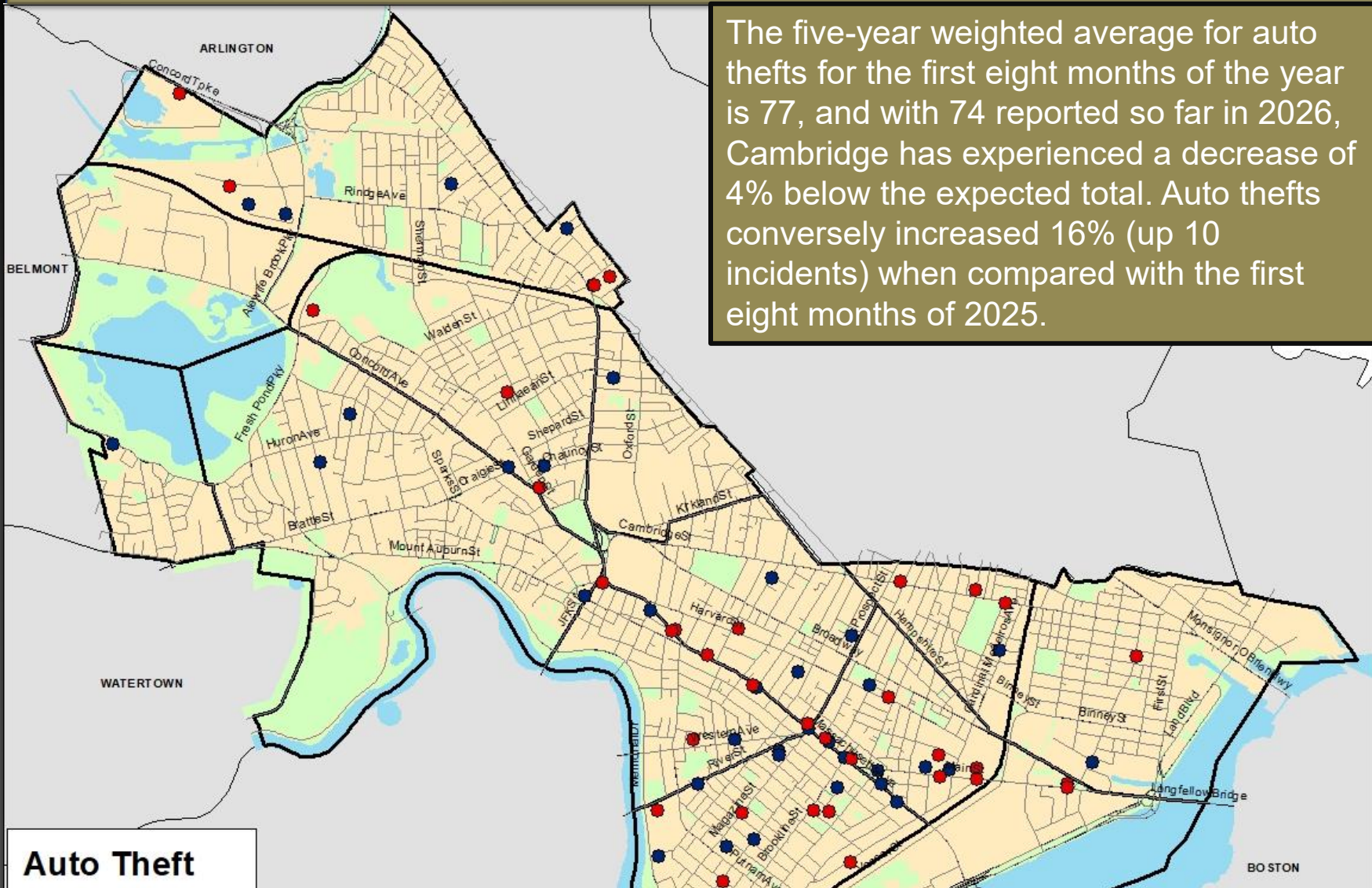

Geographic Breakdown of Auto Theft: 1.1.26 – 8.31.26



The five-year weighted average for auto thefts for the first eight months of the year is 77, and with 74 reported so far in 2026, Cambridge has experienced a decrease of 4% below the expected total. Auto thefts conversely increased 16% (up 10 incidents) when compared with the first eight months of 2025.

Thefts of two-wheeled vehicles saw a significant increase in the month of July with 14 total incidents. While there was a drop to 8 incidents in the month of August, 49% of all auto thefts year-to-date have been two wheeled, with 29 of the 36 two-wheeled incidents occurring below Harvard Square.
