What is BridgeStat?

BridgeStat is a multi-layered, dynamic, intelligence-based approach to crime reduction, quality of life improvement, and personnel and resource management based on four distinct principles – accurate and timely intelligence, effective tactics, rapid deployment, and relentless follow-up and assessment. At the core of our approach is a philosophy that fosters teamwork and creative problem solving. Police personnel hold bi-weekly meetings to devise strategies and tactics to solve problems, reduce crime, and ultimately improve quality of life in our community.

Through BridgeStat, the Cambridge Police Department produces a monthly public report to the community on current police priorities in terms of crime, traffic, community concerns, and disorder issues in the city. This is made available on the Cambridge Police Department's website at www.CambridgePolice.org/BridgeStat on the first Friday of each month.

Beginning iterations of BridgeStat included information relating to historical trends, a breakdown of crimes by type, strategies CPD is deploying to deal with crime patterns that have been identified, and tips for how citizens can protect themselves and help reduce crime in Cambridge. Recent versions have included more advanced predictive analysis, with detailed information about future patterns police expect to see, as well as steps police and citizens can take to prevent these possible scenarios from emerging.

Crime in Cambridge: 1/1/11 to 6/20/11

- Serious crime has registered a slight decline, 5.5%, when compared with the first 24 weeks of 2010, and posted a distinguishable 14% drop when measured against the 5-year weighted average for this same time period. The majority of the decrease can be attributed to the overall decline in the index crime of Larceny, with 146 fewer thefts reported so far in 2011.
- A thorough analysis of all statistics indicates that there were 96 fewer property crimes recorded so far in 2011 to register a 7% decrease when compared with the first 5.5 months of last year. There have been 13 additional violent crimes registered in 2011 when compared with 2010. Both violent and property crime registered substantial declines (-4% and -14%, respectively) when measured against the 5-year weighted average for a time span between 1/1/11 and 6/20/11.
- The decline of larceny from motor vehicles, at 46% below the 5-year weighted average for this target crime for the first 24 weeks of 2011, continues to be the most positive indicator to report so far this year. There were 129 fewer thefts from vehicles through 6.20.11 than last year. There was a dramatic surge in aggravated assaults, 92%, when compared with the previous four weeks. Many of these are bar/alcohol related incidents.

Cambridge Police BridgeStar

- on the night of 3.12.11, Cambridge Police responded to a double shooting that occurred in Cambridgeport. 2 victims were transported to area hospitals where 1 of the victims was pronounced dead. The other victim survived. While no arrests have been made, authorities do not believe the shooting was a random incident. This investigation remains ongoing.
- Preliminary statistics released by the Federal Bureau of Investigation reveals that Murder decreased by 4.4% in the United States in 2010.
- In the last 5 years, 6 people have been shot to death in Cambridge. Victims in 2/3 of these homicides had prior arrests for marijuana distribution.
- 5 of the 14 murders in Cambridge since
 2002 have occurred during the month of June.








- There have been 14 sexual assaults reported between 1.1.11 and 6.20.11. 7 of these incidents (including 4 of the 5 reported in the past 6 weeks) occurred prior to this year. 1 of the rapes is a past incident from the mid 1990s.
- 9 of the incidents involved acquaintances, 3 were domestic situations, and the other involved a contact scenario with the offender being someone the victim had met in a public place. An attempted rape was recorded on the night of 6.18.11 which resulted in the immediate arrest of a Boston resident.





Cambridge Police BridgeStar

- Total Robbery dropped from a 5-year average of 67 incidents YTD to 64 incidents through 6.20.11, a 4% decrease. The 25% increase in robberies when compared with 2010 can be attributed to sharp increase in street robberies involving homeless preying on other homeless individuals in and around the confines of Central Sq.
 - There have been 17 robberies in 2011, 11 of which were categorized as homeless scenarios.
- reported in the first 3 months of 2011.
 There have been eleven random incidents since 4.1.11. There were recently 2 gas station robberies with similar suspects.
 - When compared with the 5-year average, this violent crime type is down 8%.
- Street Robbery has recorded a 4% decline from the 5-year average, despite the fact that in the past 2 months, 35 of the 52 robberies YTD have taken place.
 - There are no identifiable patterns at the present time.





5 street robberies since the last BridgeStat – A series of juvenile strong arm robberies were identified in and around Donnelly Field. 2 incidents reported on the night of the Bruins victory in Central Square; an arrest was made in 1 of the crimes. No identifiable patterns or trends at the present time.

Street Robbery Arrests Since May BridgeStat

As predicted in the April release of BridgeStat, and sent to residents via a community alert, communities often experience an uptick in the amount of street robberies that occur as people venture outside to enjoy the warm weather. While not part of an increase in street robberies over comparable timeframes from past years, Cambridge Police made arrests in several street robberies in mid June.

On 6/16/11, officers arrested **Nkosi Newton**, **Alexander Reynolds**, **and Robert Bonds** at 12:53 AM on Green & Magazine after they witnessed the suspects holding the victim against the side of a bus stop. Suspects assaulted him while going through his pockets stealing his wallet that had over \$600. A few minutes prior there was a purse snatching at Auburn & Pearl at 12:46 AM. Victim was walking on Auburn St. **Incidents were probably related**.

On 06/17/11, detectives arrested **Nathan Pellegrini** in Norwood on a warrant issued for Masked Armed Robbery. Earlier that morning at 2:50 AM, a victim reported he was robbed at gunpoint by Pellegrini.



AGGRAVATED ASSAULT



- When measuring this violent index crime against the 5-year average for the first 20 weeks, a 2% decrease has been registered. There have been 2 fewer aggravated assaults than in 2010.
- After being monitored as a potential disturbing trend, the rate of domestic assaults has flattened out over the past 6 weeks and is now 33% of the aggravated assault total, an average comparable to previous years.
- There have been 3 stabbings and a total of 17 aggravated assaults in Harvard Square in 2011, with only 3 occurring since college commencements. The majority of these incidents have occurred on weekend nights after the bars close.
- A breakdown of the 25 assaults over the past 4 weeks:
 - 4 bar fights (Harvard, Central, E.Cambridge)
 - 3 homeless (all in Central Square)
 - 5 domestic
 - 4 shop owners assaulted by patrons





BURGLARY



- Total Burglary, the combination of residential and commercial burglary, is up 6% when compared to the 5-year average.
- Housebreaks have recorded an increase of 25% for the first 24weeks of 2011 when compared with the same time period for 2010.
 - Further analysis reveals that last year's total was unusually low (from 50 to 100 fewer breaks than the prior 3 years).
- Between 1.1.11 and 6.20.11, 58% of the 172 reported housebreaks citywide have been in neighborhoods south of Harvard Square.
 - Further analysis indicates that these breaks are clustered in 4 distinct areas in close proximity to Central Square and are predominantly committed on weekday afternoons.
- Analysis indicates that saturation patrols and undercover operations in this area are having an effect. There were only 5 incidents in these neighborhoods since the last BridgeStat, with only 2 fitting into the designated time frame.








Review of Housebreak Hotpots Since May BridgeStat


Housebreaks are down 22% from the previous 4 weeks – An exceptionally low total for late Spring with only 28 incidents over past 5 weeks.





Map of All Housebreaks Citywide, from 1/1/11 to 5/23/11


This map shows the the main problem area that existed prior to the development of response strategies in BridgeStat.






Map of All housebreaks Citywide Since 5/23/11

Housebreaks

What can we do?

Police Response Strategy:

- Cambridge Police deployed extra patrols to the affected areas in order to combat the recent increase in housebreaks.
 - CPD is also utilizing plainclothes
 officers and will be saturating affected
 areas through directed patrols & traffic
 enforcement utilizing patrol units,
 traffic units, and bicycle officers.
- Community Advisories have been sent via Citizen Observer to those subscribed to receive information from the Cambridge CITYWIDE group with important housebreak prevention information.

Citizen Response Strategy:

- Citizens are asked to take the following precautions to protect themselves, their homes, and their belongings from burglaries:
 - •Try "casing" your own home,
 - ALWAYS lock your doors and windows.

Many housebreaks have occurred through open windows or unlocked doors.

- •Leave a light on when you leave.
- •Install motion sensor lights.
- •NEVER prop open the door or let someone in behind you
- **Be vigilant**. If you suspect suspicious activity, please report it to the police immediately by calling 617-349-3300.
- •Document serial numbers of all electronics and take pictures of all valuables.
- •Request a Residential Security Survey from the Cambridge Police Department. For more info, please call (617) 349-3236.





- Overall, larceny has decreased by 13%
 when compared with the first 5 ½ months of
 2010 and 17% compared to the 5-year
 weighted average of this time frame.
- The decline in larcenies from MVs remains consistent with a 46% decrease in comparison to the 5-year weighted average for this target crime year-to-date.
 - No established patterns exist at the present time.
- Larcenies from persons are also down, registering a 28% drop when compared with 2010 totals for this index crime.
 - However, when comparing the most recent 4weeks to the previous 4, larcenies from the person recorded an increase of 88%. Only 5 of the 16 recent incidents took place in dining locations, though.
- So far this year, there have been 95
 reported bike thefts in Cambridge, while
 there were 114 reported through this time
 frame in 2010.
 - Despite the overall drop this year, bike thefts have increased 104% during the most recent 4 weeks, compared with the previous 4 weeks. 21 have taken place in the past 2 weeks.









Larceny of Bicycles:

What Can We Do?

Police Response Strategy:

- Cambridge Police are working on a comprehensive response project to deal with the issue of bike thefts.
- Educate the public about the use of effective locks & locking practices

- Stop bicyclists to promote bike safety
 - Remind riders to use lights when biking at night, wear helmets under the age of 16, etc.

Citizen Response Strategy:

- Register bicycles online at the CPD website

- Stores should be vigilant in recording serial numbers and customer information on sales.
- Universities should encourage students to register their bikes and distribute information on the correct locking procedures.



Larceny from MVs are **down 46%** when compared with the 5-year average, with **188 fewer incidents** than the norm for this time period and 129 incidents under the 2010 total for the first 5 ½ months of the year.

- Only 23 incidents were reported citywide over the past 2 weeks.
- Majority of LMV activity over recent weeks has been during the overnight hours.
 - No definite patterns emerging at this time.
 - Riverside area experienced increase in activity in late May, but this has since dissipated.
- Although LMVs are at a low in comparison to previous years, the chronic pattern area between Peabody & Agassiz should be monitored for overnight activity on side streets.
 - 4 were reported over last 2 weeks, 3 targeting GPS units.





LMV activity continues to be low in upper half of City, although a few overnight GPS thefts were recently reported in chronic pattern area in Peabody and Agassiz. Area will be monitored.

LMV Hotspots Citywide May 12 - June 20, 2011

Cambridge St

East Cambridge: Only 2 incidents reported over past 2 weeks, including a tire theft during the overnight hours on Sixth St.

Aestern Ave

12 incidents were reported in Riverside between mid-May and early June, but only 1 LMV has been reported over the past 2 weeks. Will continue to monitor Harvard Sq periphery during the overnight as summer progresses.

Memorial Drive pattern in parking lots was hot during May, but has cooled off in June.

Parking Lots on Bishop Allen & side streets off of Central Square – Only 1 LMV in 2 weeks.



LARCENY: from Person Change from 5 yr Average



 Citywide, larcenies from persons are down 28% from the first 5 ½ months of 2010 and 20% beneath the 5-year average.

- However, larcenies from persons are up 88% over the previous 4-week total.
- Since the last BridgeStat, 16 larcenies from persons have been reported citywide.
 - Only 5 involved thefts while dining (2 in Central Sq, 2 in Harvard Sq, 1 in Kendall Sq – no repeat locations).
 - Most of remaining incidents were either thefts from homeless persons outside or thefts while victims were shopping.
- No current patterns at this time.





AUTO THEFT





- The 5-year weighted average for auto theft for the first 22 weeks of the year is 91 incidents.
 - There were only 62 reported in Cambridge for this time period in 2011, which translates to a 32% decline.
- Although there have been consistent, sporadic auto thefts (10 in past 2 weeks), there have been minimal recoveries recorded.
 - YTD only 27, or 44% of stolen autos have been recovered.
