Crime in Cambridge: 1/1/11 to 10/25/11

- Serious crime continues to wane in Cambridge as a **4% decline was recorded** when compared with the first forty-two weeks of 2010. Also of note, a **considerable drop of 9% was** calculated when measured against the five-year weighted average of index incidents for this time frame. The majority of this decrease can be attributed to the overall decline in larceny (-10%) where there have been 208 fewer thefts reported in 2011.
- A detailed analysis of all statistics reveals that there have been 129 fewer **property crimes recorded so far in** 2011 to record a **5% decrease** when compared with the first ten months of last year. **Property crimes** registered a **decline of 9%** when measured against the 5-year weighted average for a time span between 1/1/11 and 10/25/11. Over the first forty-two weeks of 2011, there has been one additional violent crime (356 to 355) reported in Cambridge. When measured against the 5-year weighted average, violent crimes are 4% below the projected number of 369 for the time period from January 1st to October 25th, of this year.
- The decline of **larceny from motor vehicles at 36%** below the 5-year weighted average for this crime continues to drive the entire crime index on a downward spiral. There were **156 fewer thefts** from vehicles through 10/25/11 when compared with the same time period in 2010. After generating an exceptionally low total of **street robberies** when compared with previous trends for the warm weather months in our City, **this target crime spiked 67%** when compared with the previous month and is considered an active, ongoing pattern at the present time.



Crime in Cambridge: *4 week review*

Declining Violent Crimes:
Murder
Aggravated Assault

As in previous BridgeStats, **Murder** recorded no changes when measured against the previous four-week snapshot. The index crime of **Aggravated Assault** was down 13% when compared with previous month. The number of domestic assaults have been dropping since the second quarter.

Declining Property Crimes:

Four targeted property crimes registered significant reductions in Cambridge when compared with the previous four weeks. Burglary was down 31% with housebreaks dropping by 29% with no new patterns identified. Commercial Breaks continue their impressive declines for the year with a 29% drop for the four weeks and 4 percent reduction for the year. As the weather gets colder, bike thefts continue to fall, down 25% from the previous month.

Increasing Violent Crimes:
Robbery

Robbery jumped by 67% when measured against the previous 4 – week period, an increase of six incidents. A major armed street robbery pattern has been identified in Mid-Cambridge and East Cambridge/Inman.

Larceny from MVs shot up 29% when compared with the previous four weeks, with 15 additional car breaks reported over this time period. A series of weekend thefts from vehicles at night in the Peabody section of the City has been identified. There were nine additional **larceny from the person** when compared with the previous month. Slight spikes in dipper activity has been measured in both Harvard & Central Square.



- No murders have been reported in Cambridge since the double shooting in Cambridgeport on the night of 3/12/11. In that incident, two victims were transported to area hospitals where one of the victims was pronounced dead. The other victim survived. While no arrests have been made, authorities do not believe the shooting was a random incident. This investigation remains ongoing.
- **According to the FBI, there were 14,748 persons murdered across the United States in 2010. This was a 4% decrease from the 2009 estimate. In 2010, there were 4.8 murders per 100,000 inhabitants. Compared with 2006 rate, murder decreased 17.4 % on the national level. Since 1990, Cambridge has averaged two murders per year.**
- **There have been three murders committed during the month of November in Cambridge since 1990. The latest, a 2003 murder, was when a female was stabbed to death on November 24th of that year.**



- There were 23 sexual assaults reported between 1/1/11 and 10/24/11. **The three sexual assaults reported since the last BridgeStat all have been classified as acquaintance rapes. Further analysis of these incidents reveals that one is still under investigation, one involved a juvenile/statutory scenario, and the assault on 10.15.11 will lead to the probable arrest of an acquaintance of the victim.**
- **Eight of the twenty-three incidents reported in 2011 actually occurred prior to this year.** One of the rapes is a past incident from the mid 1990s.
- **Fifteen of the incidents involved acquaintances, four were domestic situations, two involved a contact scenario with the offender being someone the victim had met in a public place, and the one stranger-to-stranger rape was recorded on the night of 6/18/11.**





Regional Sexual Assaults

Boston (Esplanade) Attacks

- Using forensic evidence, State & Boston police have determined that the suspect that attacked two women on the Esplanade in June and July is the same man who attacked a woman in Joe Moakley Park on South Boston in July 2006.
- The suspect is described as a BM, 28-32yrs, 5'10, 220lbs and muscular build.
- The assaults have all been in the early morning or late evening hours on a weekend. They have been generally in the Kenmore Square area of Boston.



Somerville Attack

- On 10/2, a 28year old woman was assaulted as she walked in the area of Orchard Street near Davis Square/Cambridge city line. Victim reported being grabbed from behind and indecently assaulted by unknown male suspect. The victim screamed, scaring off the suspect. The suspect then fled in an unknown direction.
- On 10/21 at 11:50pm, a female was walking home from the Porter Sq T-stop near Holyoke St when she was attacked from behind by an unknown SP who pushed her up against a parked car and indecently assaulted her. VI began screaming and the SP fled on foot towards Elm St.
- The victim described the suspect as a white male, possibly in his twenties, about 5'- 8" tall and was clean shaven. He was wearing a dark hoodie and possibly jeans.



- When measuring this violent index crime against the 5-year average for the first forty –two weeks of the year, there has been a small increase of 2%, with four additional incidents counted. The five year weighted average for this violent crime type for the time period between January 1st to October 10th is 218 incidents, so far in 2011, there have been 222 aggravated assaults.
- The following assault classifications make up the majority of categorizations of Aggravated Assaults in Cambridge in 2011: 31% were domestic in nature; 14% were between acquaintances; 13% were bar fights; 9% were altercations classified as juvenile/gang disputes and 8% were altercations among the homeless.
- Further analysis of the 10 aggravated assaults reported since the last BridgeStat reveals an increase in juvenile / gang related during this two week period. There were two reports involving attacks on cab drivers in Harvard Square the weekend of 10/22-10/23.




- Total Robbery fell by 20 incidents from a 5-year average of 130 incidents YTD to 110 incidents through 10/24/11 to record a 15% decrease.
- The slight 1% decrease in robberies when compared with 2010 would be even more substantial if not for a sharp incline in street robberies involving homeless preying on other homeless in and around the confines of Central Square. There have been 28 robberies in this area in 2011, 16 of which were categorized as homeless scenarios.
- Street robbery is down 6% in Cambridge in 2011. There have been 88 incidents recorded through October 24th of this year, for the same time period last year, 94 crimes were reported. When measured against the 5-year average for this target crime, a 21 % reduction is registered.
- A major street robbery pattern has emerged in Mid-Cambridge and East Cambridge/Inman over the past ten days. Five and possibly as many as eight similar robberies (five with handguns) have been committed since 10/13/11.**





Street Robberies: 2011

Street robbery is down 6% in Cambridge in 2011. There have been 88 incidents recorded through October 25th this year, for the same time period last year, 94 crimes were reported. When measured against the 5-year average for this target crime (109 robberies), a 21% reduction is registered.



Current pattern border of East & Inman near Donnelly Field. Each neighborhood has 12 robberies in 2011.

Mid - Cambridge – current pattern area – 14 street robberies in 2011 – 9 since the middle of September.

There has been a sharp incline in robberies involving homeless preying upon other homeless in and around the confines of Central Square. There have been 28 robberies in this area in 2011, 17 of which have were categorized as homeless scenarios.



Street Robbery Pattern Information

Geographic Area: Mid Cambridge, Border of East Cambridge & Inman near Donnelly Field.

Date Range: 10/13-present

Number of Incidents: 8 (five with handgun) (3 strong-arm)

Targets: cell phones, wallets, laptops and bags

M.O.: Five of the robberies (3 on 10/24 and 2 on 10/25), involved two black males with handguns, the 3 strong arms (2 BMs and one incident with single black male)

Best time frame: Two incidents in East Cambridge between 8:15 and 8:30PM. All five Mid-Cambridge and one of the East Cambridge incidents between 11:20PM and 1:00PM.

Suspect Composite: Two BMs, late teens to mid-20s, 5'8" to 6', one described as 6'3" is the outlier, one has goatee type beard, wearing dark colored hoodies. **Two Vehicles:** Silver min-van & dark colored sedan

Victimology: All but one of the victims has been walking alone, one was delivery person, two were females, majority were between 25 and 30, delivery driver was 54



Street Robberies

What can we do?

Police Response Strategy:

- Cambridge Police have shared information about the street robbery pattern with the community:
 - Citizen Alerts sent to the East Cambridge, Mid-Cambridge, Inman/Harrington, and Area 4 neighborhoods.
 - East Cambridge Neighborhood Meeting to discuss robberies held at Police Department on 11/2.
- Extra patrols have been deployed to current hot-spot areas to help prevent any increase in activity.
- Plainclothes/undercover officers have been in the area as well.
- CPD is sharing information and partnering with other agencies to address this regional pattern.

Citizen Response Strategy:

- In order to help protect residents from becoming a victim of street robberies, Cambridge Police would like to remind students and citizens to take the following precautions when walking at night:
 - **Be aware of your surroundings at all times and trust your instincts.**
 - **Always walk with a friend or in a group when possible.**
 - **Do not wear earbuds**, headphones, or listen to music while walking alone.
 - If you feel you are being followed, show you are suspicious – Turn to look at the person. This sends a clear message that you will not be taken by surprise.
 - If approached, **DO NOT RESIST**, especially if you know or believe the robber to be armed. The best course of action is to hand over money and whatever other belongings are demanded as quickly as possible and try to disengage from this confrontational and potentially dangerous situation as soon as possible. **Remember, things can always be replaced.**



- Total Burglary, the combination of residential and commercial burglary, is up 12% when compared to the 5-year average.
- Housebreaks have recorded a significant increase of 24% for the forty-two weeks of 2011 when compared with the same time period for 2010. **Further analysis reveals that part of this incline should be tempered by the fact that last year's total was unusually low (from 50 to 130 fewer breaks than the prior 3 years).**
- The 4-week housebreak comparison shows a decrease of 31%, with fourteen fewer breaks recorded from the previous month.
- A subtle pattern of daytime housebreaks in the Area 4 neighborhood has been identified. Over the past month, this series of housebreaks have been occurring on Mondays and Tuesdays in a tight cluster near Sennott Park. There were two daytime breaks in West Cambridge over the past weekend that were similar to a previous pattern in this area and deserve further monitoring.
- Commercial breaks are up 9% over 2010, with six additional incidents registered, though, no discernible patterns currently exist.
- A Somerville resident has been arrested and charged with a series of breaks at Kirkland Convenience. He was interviewed and confessed to a Medford, Quincy and both of the Kirkland breaks.






Housebreak – Focus Areas

● **West Cambridge** – Four daytime breaks in this area between 10/18 and 10/31 – similar to pattern in August – will continue to monitor.


● **Riverside/Cambridgeport** - Weekend breaks on Auburn, Magazine, River no time frame established –will monitor.

15 daytime breaks in tight cluster in Area 4 since beginning of September.

There have been breaks on seven out of the past eight weeks on Monday or Tuesday in this cluster.

Housebreaks

What can we do?

Police Response Strategy:

- Cambridge Police deployed extra patrols to the affected areas in order to combat the recent increase in housebreaks.
 - CPD is also utilizing plainclothes officers and will be saturating affected areas through directed patrols & traffic enforcement utilizing patrol units, traffic units, etc.

Citizen Response Strategy:

- Citizens are asked to take the following precautions to protect themselves, their homes, and their belongings from burglaries:
 - Try “**casing**” your own home.
 - **ALWAYS lock your doors and windows.** Many housebreaks have occurred through open windows or unlocked doors.
 - **Leave a light on** when you leave.
 - Install motion sensor lights.
 - **NEVER** prop open the door or let someone in behind you.
 - **Be vigilant.** If you suspect suspicious activity, please report it to the police immediately by calling **617-349-3300**.
 - **Document serial numbers** of all electronics and take pictures of all valuables.
 - **Request a Residential Security Survey** from the Cambridge Police Department. For more info, please call **(617) 349-3236**.



- Overall, larceny in 2011 has decreased by 10% when compared with the first 10 months of 2010 and 12% when measured against the 5-year weighted average for this time frame. There have been over 200 fewer larcenies thus far in 2011 than there were through this point in 2010.
- Larcenies from motor vehicles are down 36% versus the 5-year weighted average for this target crime year-to-date. **Late night LMVs have been on the rise in East Cambridge over the past 2 weeks.**
- Larcenies from persons have dropped 11% from the 2010 totals for this index crime. This crime is up 33% (9 additional incidents) when comparing the most recent four weeks to the previous four weeks, partially due to the influx of people in the city for weekend events such as the Regatta.
- So far this year, there have been 323 reported bike thefts in Cambridge, while there were 346 reported through this time frame in 2010, equaling a 7% decrease this year. However, bike thefts are still up 19% over the 5-year-average. Although 20 bike thefts have been reported since the last BridgeStat, there were 25% fewer bikes reported stolen over the most recent 4 weeks when compared with the previous 4 weeks.



- Larceny from MVs are down 37% when compared with the 5-year average, with **280 fewer incidents** than the norm for this time period and 156 incidents under the 2010 total for the first nine months of the year, which translates to a 24% reduction in thefts from vehicles.
- Larceny from MVs spiked 29% when compared with the previous four weeks, with 15 additional car breaks reported over this time period. This increase comes on the heels of a 54% incline for the prior month.
- After being relatively quiet for most of 2011, the **chronic problem of thefts from vehicles in Agassiz and Peabody on Friday and Saturday nights has emerged over the past five weekends.** This pattern has been a persistent 4th quarter blister on the crime rate over the past few years.
- A series of late night breaks into vehicles in East Cambridge (1AM to 3AM) has surfaced over the past two weeks. Pattern areas around Central Square have quieted since the last BridgeStat.





LARCENY: of MV – Focus Areas

Emerging Pattern – Activity since COMPSTAT: 10/13/11

- With the exception of the Peabody late night/weekend pattern – all LMV activity has shifted to the lower half of the City.



- Chronic pattern of LMV breaks in Agassiz and Peabody on Friday and Saturday late night has been a problem for past month, high possibility of being a problem throughout the 4th quarter of 2011

- **New Hot Spot emerged since last BridgeStat – East Cambridge – between Third & Sixth –Thorndike & Charles – Sunday to Wednesday – late night.**

- As reported in latest BridgeStat, area of Mass/Main triangle on border of Central Square was hot for first two weeks of October, but has since cooled.




- Three incidents in River Street lot in late afternoon – latest 10/25 at 7PM.



Twenty-five thefts from vehicles on weekend nights over the last five weekends in the hot spot clusters on the map.

Thieves have been hitting consistently between the hours of **1:30 AM to 3:00 AM on Saturday and Sunday** mornings since the beginning of September.



A high percentage of these breaks have been quick hits into unlocked MVs. GPS is target in some of the theft, loose items in others. Smashed glass heard around 1:30AM. This area could be a problem the entire 4th quarter.

What can we do?

Police Response Strategy:

- Cambridge Police are focused on prevention of these crimes by increasing officer visibility in targeted areas.
 - CPD may also be deploying plain-clothes officers for surveillance in key areas in an effort to catch and apprehend suspects in the act.
- Citizens are encouraged to take the proper precautions to protect their vehicles and their belongings by doing everything possible to not make their vehicles easy targets.

Citizen Response Strategy:

- Citizens are asked to take the following precautions to protect themselves, their vehicles, and their belongings from theft:
 - **Take extra care when out doing your shopping.**
 - **Make sure all of your car doors are locked when you leave your vehicle.**
 - **If you are approached by a suspicious person while you are in your vehicle, sound your horn to attract attention.**
 - **NEVER LEAVE VALUABLES EXPOSED IN YOUR CAR.**
 - **If you must leave packages or valuables in your car, place them in the trunk of under a blanket to conceal them.**



- After an exceptionally calm Summer/tourist season in Harvard Square, **larcenies from persons continue to rise following the return of students to Cambridge. This crime is up nine incidents when comparing the most recent four weeks to the previous four weeks.**
- Since the last BridgeStat, Central Sq and Harvard Sq saw five dining incidents. In Central Sq, they were all late night thefts from bars with four taking place on the weekends. In Harvard Sq, 3 took place at cafes from Thurs-Saturday during the late afternoon hours. The other two took place on 10/20 and 10/22 at restaurants in the square.
- It should be noted that, despite the recent increase, **larcenies from persons citywide are still down 11% when compared with the first 10 months of 2010 and are registering a 11% decline when measured against the five-year average for this target crime.**



- Over the first ten months of 2011, there have been 23 fewer bike thefts reported citywide than for the same time period in 2010, which translates to a 7% reduction for this type of theft. On the negative side, this crime still continues the trend that emerged in 2008 of increasing bike thefts and is recording a 19% uptick when compared with the 5-year weighted average.
- Almost exactly the same number of bikes were stolen during October of this year as in October of 2010 (27 in 2011 vs. 26 in 2010).
- The hotspot for much of the Summer and fall, with weekday afternoon activity has been concentrated in lower Cambridgeport and Riverside. There has also been sporadic activity near bike racks on weekend afternoons. There has been an increase in the Porter Sq area in recent weeks on weekday afternoons/early evenings.
- A Boston resident was arrested on 10/25/11 after he was observed stealing a bike from Cambridge Center.



- The 5-year weighted average for auto theft for the first forty weeks of the year is 177 incidents; there have been only 134 reported in Cambridge for this time period in 2011, which translates to a 24% decline. There have been eight fewer auto thefts in Cambridge in 2011 when compared with the same time period last year. The number of auto thefts in 2010 was at a historical low.
- Since September 1st, 2011, cars have been stolen from the following neighborhoods: Area 4 (1), Cambridgeport (3), East Cambridge (1), and North Cambridge (3)
- **Only 61 of the 134 cars stolen thus far in 2011 (or 45%) have been recovered. Our normal recovery rate at the end of each year is usually between 70 to 75 percent.**
