Part I Total Crime

For the first ten months of 2014, a substantial reduction of 14% has been recorded for serious crime in Cambridge. There have been 398 fewer Part One crimes reported in the city from January to the end of October when compared with the same time frame in 2013. When measured against the five-year average, a pronounced 18% decline in Part One crime has been registered.

Further analysis of crime totals so far in 2014 reveals that the property crimes of burglary & larceny continue to be the key indicators and the main reasons behind the overall descending decline of serious crime. The index crime of Burglary has fallen 30% and a 13% cut in the total of Larcenies has been reported. Larceny from the person (-35%), larceny from motor vehicles (-25%), and housebreaks (-32%) are the categories of incident types fueling the declining crime numbers.

The 65% increase in violent crime from August to September of 2014 was quickly followed with a 31% decrease in October with robbery falling from 11 incidents the previous month to 3 incidents for the first month of the fourth quarter.

Part I Property Crime

Analysis of property crime totals for the first ten months of 2014 shows a 14% decline when measured against the 2013 totals and a 17% reduction below the five-year average. The only property crime categories to register increases so far this year are small rises in auto theft, larcenies from residences, and larcenies of license plates. Eight of the twelve indexes associated with property crimes are in the green (on the decline) so far in 2014.

Part I Violent Crime

The five-year weighted average for violent crime in Cambridge for the first ten months of the year is 345 incidents. From January 1st to November 3rd of 2014, there were 254 violent crimes recorded in the City, 44 incidents below last year (-15%) and 91 violent crimes under the total forecast for the first ten months of 2014 (-26%).

Street robbery has dropped an unanticipated 49% when compared with 2013 and an extraordinary 56% when measured against the five-year weighted average, with no spatial or temporal patterns identified so far in 2014. Not one street robbery was reported on a weekend night the entire summer of 2014 in Cambridge. Aggravated assaults have declined 8%, with 13 fewer incidents tallied for the first ten months of the year.

MURDER

No Patterns

- Kensley David, 22, suffered a single gunshot wound to the head after a shooting on Windsor Street in Cambridge around 10 p.m. on July 3rd. It was the second homicide of 2014 in Cambridge. Investigators believe that the incident was not random. Cambridge police, State Police, and the District Attorney's office urge anyone with information about the shooting to contact authorities.
- The first murder of 2014 involved Malia Gomez, 40, of 396 Putnam Ave, who has been charged in the death of Dana Robinson. Gomez admitted to stabbing Robinson following an argument on February 2nd. Robinson died at Beth Israel Hospital and Gomez was charged with armed assault with the intent to murder, assault and battery with a dangerous weapon, and assault and battery with a dangerous weapon causing serious bodily injury. On April 1st, 2014, Malia Gomez was indicted on First Degree Murder.
- The date for the murder trial of Irish nanny Aisling Brady McCarthy has been postponed until January of 2015 due to delays involving evidence. McCarthy is on trial for the January 15th of 2013 murder of Rehma Sabir in Cambridge.



Unsolved Murders: 1999 to 2013

Colin Burton, 30, of Dorchester, was shot and killed outside of Hi - Fi Pizza on Mass Ave in Central Square on September 18th, 1999. Burton was talking with the occupants of a Ford Explorer when the subject in the passenger seat fired through the window. Two suspects fled the scene. The case remains under active investigation.

lan Gray, 19, of Mattapan, was in an argument outside of the Rhythm & Spice restaurant that spilled out onto Mass Ave. A suspect that had left the scene retuned with a group of people and a fight ensued. A knife was produced during the altercation and four gunshots were fired, fatally wounding Gray. This case remains open.

On June 17th, 2002 at 7:00PM, Ricardo Williams, 27, of Malden, was found in the driver's seat of a motor vehicle suffering from a gunshot wound to his face. Williams was taken to CCH where he was pronounced dead. This case remains open.





Unsolved Murders: 1999 to 2013

Jason Ellcock, 33, of Malden, formerly of Cambridge and father of three, was found with multiple gunshot wounds in front of the driveway to 364 Rindge Ave at 3:05 AM on the night of June 16th, 2009. He was pronounced dead at the scene. This incident remains under investigation.

James Lauture, 30, of Cambridge, was sitting in a vehicle near Brookline and Watson Streets just after midnight on Saturday, March 12th, 2011, when an unknown gunman opened fire. The occupants in the car were able to drive to Central Square. Lauture died from multiple gunshot wounds. The other man in the vehicle survived. This case remains open.

On June 3rd, 2012, **Charlene Holmes**, 16, of Cambridge was shot while sitting on a porch on Willow Street. She later succumbed to her wounds at the hospital. The investigation into this incident remains active, but no arrests have been made to date.





RAPE

No Patterns

- The violent index crime of Rape has increased from 21 incidents in the first ten months of 2013 to 28 reported sexual assaults over the same time frame for 2014.
- There has been one stranger rape in Cambridge so far in 2014 and it involved an attempted sexual assault near Richdale Ave on April 16th.
- The four rapes that were reported in Cambridge during October of 2014 were two acquaintance scenarios, and two contact sexual assaults.
- The following is the breakdown of Rape classifications in Cambridge so far in 2014: one stranger-to-stranger, thirteen involving acquaintances, six contact situations, four domestic sexual assaults, two blitz scenarios, and two incidents that are still under investigation and have yet to be classified.

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




ROBBERY

- No Patterns
- The five-year average for overall robbery in Cambridge for the first ten months of the year is 115 incidents. Between January and November 3rd of 2014, 66 robberies were recorded, which indicates a 37% decline below the projected total.
- There were six commercial robberies in the first five weeks of 2014. That spree stopped on February 8th, with only 19 incidents recorded over the next nine months. There was one commercial robbery during October which resulted in an arrest. This incident was part of an emerging trend of incidents involving shopliftings that escalated into violent confrontations. Arrests have been made in 13 of the 25 commercial robberies so far in 2014.
- Street robberies declined 21% in Cambridge in 2013 to the lowest total in 40 years and that unfaltering slide has continued over the first ten months of 2014, with an remarkable decrease of 49% recorded when compared with last year's total for the same time period. The total of 41 street robberies through October of this year is an exceptionally low number for Cambridge. Reference the chart on the right and compare this year with 2009 when there were 131 street robberies in Cambridge between January and the end of October.




Street Robberies: 1.1.14 to 11.3.14






Commercial Robberies: 1.1.14 to 11.3.14

There were six commercial robberies in the first five weeks of 2014. That spree stopped on February 8th, with only 19 incidents recorded over the next 8 months. Arrests have been made in 13 of the 25 commercial robberies.

AGGRAVATED ASSAULT


No Patterns

- When compared with the first ten months of 2013, aggravated assaults reported an 8% drop with 13 fewer crimes counted for the same time period in 2014. When measuring this violent index crime against the five-year average for the time period between January and the 3rd of November, there has been a reduction of 23%, with 47 fewer crimes below the projected average of 205 aggravated assaults.
- Each year, domestic account for a high percentage, between 40 to 45 percent of all aggravated assaults.
 That trend continues so far in 2014 with domestic incidents counting for 40% of the total. A series of fights at the time of bar closings on weekend nights in Central Square surfaced as a problem in October.










Aggravated Assault in Cambridge by Category: 1.1.14 to 11.3.14





Burglary

Identified Patterns

 The property index crime of burglary, the combination of residential and commercial breaks, has fallen 40% when compared to the five-year average, with 154 fewer incidents than the projected total of 389 breaks, and is down 30% when compared with last year's total for the first ten months of the year, with 100 fewer burglaries reported.

- There has been a 16% reduction in commercial burglary over the first ten months of 2014. When measured against the five-year average, a 32% decline is revealed with 20 fewer incidents than the 63 projected for the period between January and the end of October. There has not been a commercial burglary pattern identified yet in 2014.
- Analysis of housebreak activity in Cambridge for the first ten months of 2014 points to a 32% decline(92 fewer breaks) below 2013 and a 41% decline below the five-year projected average of 326 housebreaks.







A series of nighttime housebreaks in West Cambridge in early October appears to have been eradicated with the identification of a suspect for an incident in the Larches. Nothing new reported in West Cambridge in three weeks.

Cambridge will be recording a 50-year low in Housebreaks in 2014. Despite that fact, sporadic patterns, series and trends are constantly emerging in the City. Housebreaks rose from 14 incidents in September to 19 the following month. Alerts were issued for three potential problems involving housebreaks in October.



- Overall larceny through the first ten months of 2014 has been reduced by 13% when compared with the same time frame in 2013 and is 14% below the five-year weighted average.
- Larcenies from motor vehicles in 2014 have decreased by 138 crimes, or 25%, from the number reported during the first ten months of last year. LMVs increased 22% (12 incidents) from September to October of this year. An overnight spree in a parking garage on Museum Way accounted for 16 of these incidents.
- We continue to see a substantial decline in larcenies from persons. This crime through the first ten months of 2014 is 35% (102 incidents) below the level reported during this time frame in 2013. Over the past four weeks, incidents increased by five incidents from the previous four weeks. Central Sq and Harvard Sq both saw 8 incidents each accounting for 70% of reports in October.
- There have been 304 larcenies from buildings reported through October of 2014. This is 7% below the number reported in 2013 and 6% below the five-year average. The top categories in October of this crime type are: Unattended at a bar/social event, school thefts, and from a store counter.
- Larcenies from residences are one of the few crimes to see an increase this year. This crime type has risen 19% when compared to last year, due largely to an increase in package thefts from residences as this is accounting for 43% of all larcenies from residences. It is expected to increase with the holiday season quickly approaching. In late September, a homeless male was arrested for stealing a package from a porch on Green St.
- Thus far in 2014, there have been 305 bike thefts reported citywide, which is 13% below the total reported during this time frame in 2013 and 9% below the five-year average. Bike thefts typically more active warm summer months, have registered as follows: 61 in June, 50 in July, 48 in August, down slightly to 41 in September and dropping significantly in October to 25.





LARCENY: From MVs

Emerging Pattern

- Larcenies from MVs have declined 25% through the first ten months of 2014 when compared with the same time frame in 2013. There have been 138 fewer thefts reported so far this year. This crime has also dropped 29% when measured against the five-year average, with 170 fewer incidents than the projected total of 589 thefts.
- When comparing the last four weeks to the previous four weeks, this property index crime jumped up by 22% with twelve additional thefts reported.
- The major larceny from motor vehicle pattern for the summer of 2014 was identified during the third week of August. Over a 10-day period, there had been 16 reported motor vehicle breaks in and around the Peabody neighborhood. This pattern was interdicted in mid September when two arrests were made of a homeless subject and a Somerville resident.
- An Everett resident was arrested on September 16th for breaking into a vehicle on Brattle Street. With links to property in his possession and other incidents in area, he was connected to a series of breaks on the periphery of Harvard Square and into the West Cambridge neighborhood.












Larceny from MVs: 9.1.14 to 11.3.14

What can we do?

Police Response Strategy:

- Cambridge Police are focused on prevention of these crimes by increasing officer visibility in targeted areas.
- Citizens are encouraged to take the proper precautions to protect their vehicles and their belongings by doing everything possible to not make their vehicles easy targets.



Citizen Response Strategy:

- Citizens are asked to take the following precautions to protect themselves, their vehicles, and their belongings from theft:
 - Make sure all of your car doors are locked when you leave your vehicle.
 - Take extra care when out doing your shopping.
 - •If you are approached by a suspicious person while you are in your vehicle, sound your horn to attract attention.





- Larcenies from the person have declined an astonishing 102 incidents (35%) for the first ten months of 1014 when compared with the same time frame for last year. The total of 190 incidents reported thus far in 2014 is 93 incidents below the five-year average of 283. There are no patterns of this crime type anywhere in the city at the present time. As expected the event –driven month of October (Octoberfest, Regatta) produced a 28% increase from the previous month.
- There was a series of grab-and-runs from patrons in Harvard Sq in mid-August, with incidents occurring from 6pm to 8pm. Teens on bikes or walking by were grabbing phones from tables or victims' hands. An arrest of one Cambridge juvenile in connection with these thefts was made during a street robbery (similar to the grab-and-run except that a knife was used to steal the item). This group of kids is believed to be responsible for at least four similar incidents in the area.
- Often, much of the larceny from person activity is reported at bars and restaurants in the Squares (known as "dipper" activity). In October, there was four incident of this nature reported in Central Sq, and three incidents in Harvard Sq.
- Part of the explanation for the large reduction may be that a number of the more prolific thieves, particularly ones that that tend to target the Harvard Square area, are currently incarcerated.






Larceny from Persons: 1.1.14 to 11.3.14






Larceny from Residences: Package Thefts





Shoplifting: 1.1.14 to 11.3.14









- Through the first ten months of 2014, there have been 305 bikes reported stolen citywide in Cambridge. This is 13% (44 incidents) below the number reported during this time frame in 2013 and 9% (31 incidents) below the average.
- As would be expected, the summer months tend to see the largest number of bike thefts due to increased ridership during warmer weather. Thefts this summer have registered as follows: 61 in June, 50 in July, 48 in August, down slightly to 41 in September and dropping significantly in October to 25.
- East Cambridge, Peabody, and West Cambridge had the most bike thefts in October, each with four incidents.
- 60% of the thefts reported this year have involved bikes that were locked but left out in the open (locked to public bike racks, for example).
- No defined bike theft patterns have emerged, but two arrests were made in September: a Boston male was arrested in Harvard Sq on 9/12 and a Cambridge juvenile was arrested in Area 4 on 9/22.

AUTO THEFT

No Patterns

- The projected five—year weighted average for auto thefts for the first ten months of 2014 is 117; thus far, we are 1 incidents below the average (-1%). However, with 116 thefts yearto-date, we are seeing an increase over 2013 of 27%, or 22 incidents.
- There were 13 auto thefts reported in the past four weeks, which resulted in an 18% increase over September (two more incidents). Over the course of the summer (June to August), there were 25 thefts of mopeds, scooters, or motorcycles. There were two incidents in August that resulted in the arrests of three males in connection with moped/scooter thefts. Since August this activity has tapered off which is typical for the changing of the seasons.
- Since the beginning of the year, the neighborhoods that have reported the largest number of auto thefts have been: Area 4 (21), Cambridgeport (18), East Cambridge (16), and West Cambridge (12). All other neighborhoods except Strawberry Hill have reported at least one auto theft.
- Year-to-date, 49 (or 42%) of the stolen motor vehicles have been recovered



Current Trends in Phone Scams

The following information was provided in a Citizen Alert to Cambridge residents on 10.1.14.

Phone scams are a multi-million dollar business for scammers, who mostly reside outside of the United States. With new scams popping up every day, trying to keep up with the current ones and the technology is difficult. Caller IDs may or may not show a real number, as scammers are taking to technology and using Caller ID spoofing to make their phone number appear as a legitimate number, like 911 or a police department.

The following is a list of some of the current phone scams that have recently been reported to local police departments:

- TAX MONEY OWED TO THE IRS
- FAMILY MEMBER IN AN ACCIDENT
- MICROSOFT COMPUTER ISSUE
- UTILITY COMPANY FEES (typically targets businesses)
- IMMIGRATION WARRANT OR ARREST WARRANT
- THE MYSTERIOUS TEXT MESSAGE FROM A BANK

These are just a few examples of the many phone scams being seen across the US. Once you provide a scammer with a pre-paid money card number, the chance of you recovering the money is very slim. If you have doubts about a phone call you received, contact the company or organization who "allegedly" called. If you receive any calls mentioned in this article (or anything suspicious), please hang up and contact the Cambridge Police (617-349-3300).
