Meeting was called to order at 5:30 pm.

Presentations:

- Kathy Watkins presented the Public Works Five-Year Sidewalk and Street Reconstruction Plan
 - She highlighted the updates, and reviewed the overall plan including priorities, scope of work, plan specifics, programs, design, construction and next steps.
 - The Five-Year Sidewalk and Street Reconstruction Plan can be viewed online.
- Andrew Wolfe and Brooke McKenna presented an update on the Porter Square Safety Improvement Project
 - The project includes the accessible parking on Mass Ave.
 - See attached presentation, Porter Square Safety Improvement Project, for details.

Minutes Approved:

A motion to approve the minutes for the February meeting was seconded and approved.

Nominations for Board Chair and Secretary:

- Rachel thanked Phil for his work as the Chair of the Board, and reminded the committee members that Gary's term was up so he could no longer serve as Secretary.
- She opened the nominations and noted that members could nominate themselves.
- No names were submitted.
- Rachel suggested members contact her if they want to nominate a candidate for Board Chair or Secretary.

• Elections will take place at the May meeting.

Chair's Report:

Phil shared with the committee that his company eMotionRX had presented in the Arc Tank 4.0, the Northeast Arc's philanthropic program which provides funding for organizations to "create positive disruption to services for those with intellectual/developmental disabilities or autism."

Minutes for Thursday, May 12, 2022

Online via Zoom

Meeting was called to order at 5:30 pm

Present:

Nominations & Elections:

- Dan & Loring each nominated Avril for Chair, and Mary for Secretary
- No other nominations were made
- Elections were held. All members present voted unanimously to elect Avril as Chair and Mary as Secretary

Public Works Update:

- Jerry reported that three projects have gone out to bid:
 - River Street reconstruction from Memorial Drive to Central Square, and the Carl Barron Plaza. This
 project includes new sidewalks, roadway, bus lanes, separated bike lanes, and the addition of 45 new
 trees. The City is hoping to award this contract in July. Construction will take 30-36 months.
 - Huron Ave along the Fresh Pond Reservation from the field complex to Fresh Pond Parkway. This project will add sidewalks.
 - Belmont Street, near the Star Market on Mt. Auburn. This project includes new sidewalks, improved bus stops, and a dedicated section of bus lanes.
- Loring asked about the status of the funded Participatory Budgeting projects. Rachel will provide an update at the next meeting on what those projects are.
- Jerry reported that there is some infrastructure that's being planned for the Port neighborhood. A public walk
 will be held on Monday, May 16, meeting at Clement Morgan Park at 6:00 PM. Members of the public can join
 the 90-minute walk to learn about the history of the Port.
- Additionally, DPW and local neighborhood advocates are holding an event on June 25 that will be focused on
 art. The goal is to get youth interested in art, and there will be food from local chefs, as well as artists creating
 art.

Executive Director's Report:

- Rachel said that the Advisory Board typically votes to take the month of either July or August off; this vote will be held at the June meeting.
- She and Kate are attending the online National ADA Symposium this week. Federal agencies give updates on their perspectives of the ADA; there are workshops on case law that's happened in the past year, as well as on other issues that are relevant. This year, there have been many sessions on COVID and the ADA, reasonable accommodations, and the impact on programs and services for people with disabilities.
- Rachel reported speaking with graduate students at New York University who are writing a musical on the Section 504 sit-in in which people with disabilities took over a federal office in San Francisco for a month. They interviewed Rachel about it and are writing a musical about the sit-in.

- Rachel went with a Community Development Department (CDD) intern to look at the new MBTA Green Line stations in Union Square and Lechmere. CDD wants to write a guide for folks on how to navigate those areas.
 Rachel said that they got lost and couldn't find the buses at the Lechmere Station, indicating that the wayfinding in that area needs some work.
- She reported that the City has applied for a few variances from the Massachusetts Architectural Access Board (MAAB) for the Tobin Montessori and Vassal Lane Upper Schools. After reviewing the variances, she wrote a letter of support.
- Rachel said that CCPD staff is working with the Election Commission and the Voting Rights Advocate at the
 Disability Law Center on accessible elections. The Commonwealth uses very old accessible voting machines, and
 barriers to access happen when the machines break. Unfortunately, the Secretary of State has not approved an
 alternative, so there is some advocacy to push the state to adopt newer technologies. The Cambridge Election
 Commission would like to speak at an upcoming CCPD meeting.
- The City is planning to construct a connector between Danehy Park and New Street and a re-design of Linear Park. Rachel participated in a site walk to both sites. There is a public event on June 4th if anyone would like to learn more.
- The universally designed playground was dedicated a few weeks ago, named after Louis DePasquale
- Avril mentioned that the DOJ put out new guidelines on web accessibility and that CCPD's web page seems outdated. Kate mentioned that staff are working with the department's Communications Manager and Webmaster on website improvements.

Chair's Report:

- Loring asked Avril as the newly elected Chair to speak about her context within the disability community.
- Avril reported that she is originally from Buffalo, NY and was in the Deaf Studies Program at Boston University with a focus on sign language and the Deaf community. She then became a paraprofessional for a student with autism and apraxia, and then a teacher in a substantially separate special education class in Brookline. She is very interested in law and civil rights and education. Avril currently works in the Boston Public Schools as an Inclusive Practices Support Specialist. In this role, she supports teachers at about 15 schools. Additionally, Avril teaches an Introduction to Special Education course at Boston University. She has a PhD in Urban Education, Leadership, and Education Policy. Her research focused on substantially separate classrooms and the people who teach in them, studying the environmental and academic impacts of those spaces on public schools. She said that people with severe disabilities are defined in relation to false ideas due to ableism.


New Business:

- Loring said it would be nice to discuss at the June meeting ideas for things the Advisory Board can do within the community framework that they're not currently doing. He suggested agenda time for an open forum on brainstorming of priorities that members can share with one another.
- Loring mentioned the idea of bringing the film series back.
- Mary noted that Vinfen holds an annual film festival and mentioned the possibility of partnering with them on a film screening.
- Deputy Superintendent John Boyle said that he could speak with the Central Square Business Improvement District about holding an event there, as it's an outdoor space.
- John informed members that Memorial Day weekend is going to be very busy in the City. Harvard and MIT have
 graduations on May 26 and there will be a number of dignitaries in town. There will be some street closures and
 additional traffic. Boston Calling starts on May 27. While not in Cambridge, it does overwhelm the transit system
 and increases foot traffic in Cambridge. Additionally, CRLS graduation is being held on June 9 at Russell Field.

Additional accessible/disability parking

- We are seeking opportunities to increase the number of accessible/disability parking spaces in this section of Mass Ave
- We can increase the total number of accessible/disability spaces north of Porter Square from 2 to 5
- The existing accessible/disability space in front of the Post Office may need to be relocated to a new location nearby
 - This allows for installation of a loading zone between Allen St and Davenport St




Davenport St

2-hour metered parking

- We are seeking opportunities to change parking regulations on side-streets
- We can add two 2-hour metered spaces on Davenport St
- This has no impact to residential parking
- We converted Davenport St to one-way last year. This lets us add parking

Additional accessible/disability parking

- We can increase the total number of accessible/disability spaces south of Porter Square from 0 to 2
- Both spaces will be located close to the crosswalk at Roseland St

Upland Rd

Loading and Valet

- We are seeking opportunities to change parking regulations on side-streets
- We can add two 2-hour metered spaces on Davenport Street
- This has no impact to residential parking
- We converted Davenport St to one-way last year. This lets us add parking

Mount Vernon St

Loading and Valet

- We are seeking opportunities to change parking regulations on side-streets
- We can add eight 2-hour metered spaces on Mount Vernon St
- This replaces residential parking
- No parking changes in front of residential homes

Transit – Routes 77 and 96

Lengthened bus stop at Porter Square Station

- Porter Square serves multiple bus routes
- We are making improvements to bus boarding to increase accessibility and rider experience
- The lengthened bus stop at Porter Square Station allows two buses to reach the curb at once
