Esther Kisaghu

Esther Kisaghu, author, activist, educator, survivor, and founder of the domestic violence prevention agency in Kenya, *The Rose Foundation*, came and presented to the Women's Commission. Paraphrased from her website:

Esther Kisaghu, a woman born and raised in an impoverished village in Kenya, later finds success in education through sheer determination. Her life tragically changed when her husband, who had sworn to protect her, turned into her tormentor and abused her for years. She eventually found refuge in the United States where she had returned to study at Boston University... Esther engages participants in an eloquent and detailed testimony. In addition, she presents facts and statistics about gender-related violence in Kenya. Her work uses her personal experience as a ringing call to action, one that the church—and Kenya, and indeed, every nation—ignores to its everlasting sorrow.

On March 1, Esther will discuss her work addressing domestic violence in international and cross cultural context at our Women & Words.
