Srin suggested including a "land acknowledgement" statement as well. A land acknowledgment is a formal statement that recognizes Indigenous peoples as the long-standing occupants and caretakers of a particular land or region. It offers respect for the enduring relationships that exist between them and their traditional territories

Anti-AAPI Racism Panel

The Cambridge Women's Commission in planning an event for the larger Cambridge community and is teaming up with the YWCA-Cambridge to host some sort of panel discission or series of discussions on anti-Asian racism/hate/violence

and its relation to gender based violence and misogyny for Cambridge residents and the local community. The first meeting is Thursday, May 13, 2021

The goal is to center the experiences and opinions of AAPI communities, activists, and organizations – representing all the myriad of groups that fall under this very large label. It will continue conversations about the history of anti-Asian racism and misogyny, the rise of violence and discrimination, the mold minority myth, and what problems Asian women are facing.
