Discussion

- Data
 - The importance of family members, friends and community members in the process
 - Where students are meeting adults might be hard to measure
 - One or two percentage points means a lot of youth are affected.
 - Adults throwing solutions at the wall often doesn't result in success.
 - Academic achievement is quantitative and often looked at as success, but how should success really be defined? The absence of depression and anxiety is good, but is there something the exists that we can measure to define success rather than the absence of the negative.
- Guiding Principles
 - Youth centered approaches were emphasized. Youth need to be an active part of the solution.
 - Guiding principles may be a bit long, and should be more concentrated/consolidated to tell what falls within the bounds of your principles and what's on the outside.
- Theory of Change:
 - Having a vision that helps bring others along. Make sure that the youth are not always
 the same youth and the same voices. More teachers in the classroom, some students
 are bored, don't feel challenged enough/engaged.
 - Youth engagement, how to create more opportunities, like Falcon block usage, students who are already so involved, how do you create space for this? What order do we start

- with for change?
- How do we measure success and find solutions for a very complex and diverse problem that looks different for everyone. Academic achievement vs. stress and stigma are difficult to talk about.
- What it looks like, not everyone wants to go to meetings, there must be actions. Stigma
 in families and how to get buy-in from everyone. As a study is happening, getting
 feedback in real time and adjusting as we go along and staying flexible, assessing what
 already exists in the community and what's already working is crucial.
- o Interconnectedness as key. What does connection look like? Between peers, young people to adults, young people to organizations. How do we define youth voice? How does society limit or lift up youth voice? Where does youth power currently lie and how are we enabling them to push the line.
- Lots of people were talking about "Coordinating" as crucial.
