ATTORNEY TRISH FARNSWORTH: Mr. Chairman, what we had done on October 9th, we talked about that this is an existing restaurant and has been for years. My client is going to go in and hopes to operate a restaurant. The closing hours we had proposed were midnight.

There were two e-mails received by the executive director from neighbors, the exact same e-mail language from each individual, saying that they just wanted to know a little bit more about the operation. They were concerned with the hours.

So I have spoken with my clients, and what they are going to do first is decrease these hours. So what they would like to do is Monday to Wednesday, 11:00 p.m.; Thursday, 11:30 p.m.; Friday and Saturday, midnight; and Sunday, 11:30. So that is changed from the midnight seven days a week that we had presented.

We did contact those neighbors, tried to set up a meeting before today, and that didn't

1 I mean, we were available, but the neighbors -- I mean, it is harder for them to 2 3 kind of coordinate and come together. But we do have a meeting scheduled for November 7th at 4 5 7:30 p.m. They have asked for some documents, you know, application and some information on the 6 7 restaurant, which we will give to them before the 8 meeting, meet with them, and, you know, work with these folks. 9 Also, I wanted to let you know we did 10 file an application for an entertainment license, 11 12 just so it is on record. That is below 13 conversation level. The intent is not to 14 have -- I mean, this is not a sports bar. 15 just not that -- that should be a concern to the 16 neighbors, with, you know, noise and such, at 17 those establishment. 18 And then the other thing I just wanted to 19 point out is that a very close restaurant is 20 Puritan. I think that is going to open fairly

soon. And the hours there are 11:00 p.m. during

- 5 Obviously, the Harvard Square Business Association, I will let Ms. Jillson speak as 6 7 But that is really the point of me being well. 8 here: To insure you that the folks who initially supported the Tasty Burger application with 9 10 respect to their alcohol application and the hours are also in support of this new category. 11

I would just say from a policy standpoint, I appreciate Ms. Lint's recommendation. I think the additional fees, although they may be pro rata, are helpful to alleviate any concerns about creating a new category that would create a lot of new interest without an analysis of the economics, whether it makes sense to go ahead and try to increase hours.

I also recognize that the Commission

would, obviously, have the same discretion they

currently have now, to look at geographic area

appropriateness of a 2:00 a.m. license, and also

the responsibility of the particular licensee

when applying for that license.

So I think it is a thoughtful 6 7 recommendation. I think the fee goes from, if 8 you had an existing license that predates a certain date, it is \$2,000. The license to 10 one o'clock would be \$4,000. And if one were to get -- my client is probably not as happy about 11 12 this as I am -- would go to about \$5,000 a year. 13 And I think that is appropriate, and it also helps offset the costs of monitoring a later 14 15 license.

For me, as a licensing attorney, I think it makes sense. I like to have conversations with my clients, initially, about what their minimum needs are. I certainly don't encourage folks to apply for alcohol at all. If they do -- if they are interested in alcohol as in

relation to their food service, I always say, "Do
1
     you really need alcohol, or do you just need beer
2
3
     and wine?" And if they say, "I just need beer
     and wine," I say, "Then apply for such."
4

             So I think this will create -- or take
     away any incentive for applications to apply for
6
7
     all alcohol just to get to 2:00 a.m. So I think
8
     it is an appropriate category, and it certainly
     would be helpful in my practice of encouraging
9
10
     licensees to not apply for an alcohol license
     that they don't need, but not preclude them from
11
12
     going until 2:00 a.m. if it is critical to the

     nature of their business, which, in this case, it
     certainly is. And it is a conversation we had

     during the initial talks, prior to even signing a

Pleasure of the Commission? 3 4 GERALD REARDON: Mr. Chair, I think I 5 have gone on record already with my thoughts on I believe being on the Commission since 6 7 2000, this is an administrative oversight. 8 don't ever recall any kind of conversation or anything, regardless, of the 2:00 a.m. licenses 10 come up. Simply, as Ms. Lint has stated, it just hasn't been asked for. I don't believe that this 11 12 type of license lends itself to many 13 establishments. It has to be in the right area, 14 the right zone, the right type of venue with some sort of entertainment. And I, myself, would 15 16 rather see someone come and ask for a beer and 17 wine license, as opposed to having no category 18 for it and asking for all alcohol when they certainly don't need it. 19 20 So I believe it is consistent with the 21 City Council's recommendations and the area's.
