Sidewalk Reconstruction Project Broadway from Ames Street to Third Street

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The project consists of the reconstruction of Broadway from Ames Street to Third Street. The work will include cold planning and hot mix asphalt overlay of Broadway, reconstruction of sidewalks on both sides of the street, geometric improvements to improve lane configurations, increased green space, minor drainage improvements, new pavement markings and traffic signs, installation of new pedestrian signals, planting areas, bicycle parking areas, pedestrian amenities and other minor improvements.
