Dear Participant:

In 1994, the Motor Voter Law took effect in Massachusetts. Before that time the process of registering a person to vote was more complicated. The goal of the Motor Voter law is to encourage community outreach by making voter registration forms readily available to people wherever they work, visit or otherwise conduct business. To achieve this goal we have set up distribution sites for voter registration forms throughout the City. We also hold voter registration sessions at many Cambridge events, such as the Harvard Square Mayfair, Hoops N' Health, and Cambridge River Festival and conduct voter registration training for community organizations and Cambridge residents.

In an attempt to bring more visibility to our community Voter Registration sessions, we now provide all Voter Registrars with Cambridge Election Commission "Register and Vote" t-shirts and distribute "Register and Vote" pens to the public at our registration tables.

It has been a long tradition at the Election Commission of doing more than the law requires to effectively increase voter participation. With this spirit in mind the Cambridge Election Commission welcomes you to our community Voter Registration Training.

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Conducting a Voter Registration Drive

Know Your Responsibilities

- You **MUST** return all Voter Registration Forms to the Election Commission as soon as possible and before the deadline to register to vote.
- Use the proper forms: Forms provided by our office or the Secretary of State's office can only be used by Massachusetts residents. For residents of other states, use the National Voter Registration Form, which can be found at http://www.eac.gov/voter_resources/register_to_vote.aspx.
- Quickly review the forms you collect before the person registering has walked away – make sure that all the boxes are checked and that the form is signed!

Know Your Facts

- Bring this manual with you so that you can answer questions that potential voters might have about the election schedule, the requirements for voter registration, etc. If you don't know the answer, refer the voter to our office or our website at <http://www.cambridgema.gov/election/>.
- Be aware of all deadlines – voters must register 20 days in advance of the election in order to vote in that election – and if you are collecting Mail-In Voter Registration Forms, you **MUST** send them in by that deadline!
- Make sure you know how to fill out the Voter Registration Form – lines 1, 2, 4, 6, 7, 13, and 14 are MANDATORY. Line 4 (residential address) cannot be a P.O. Box. Line 7 (ID #) requires a Massachusetts drivers license number or the last four digits of the voter's social security number.
- Harvard Students living on campus: dorm name should be written on Line 4 and mailing address should be written on Line 5. Students at Lesley University and MIT should use the street address of their dorm for Line 4.
- If a voter does not select a political party, they will be registered as unenrolled. If they register in a party, they can only vote in that party's primary. If they register as unenrolled, they can vote in any party's primary. If they register in a political designation, they cannot vote in any primary.
- The voter will receive a confirmation letter by mail, which will inform them where to vote. Let the voter know that they may need to show identification at the polls the first time they vote.

Plan Your Event

- If you plan to set up a table in public, make sure you have met any permit requirements.
- If you plan to register voters on private property (malls, shopping centers), make sure you have the permission of the owners.
- Bring supplies! You will need a table, a sign, plenty of pens, clipboards, and voter registration forms.

After the Event

- Mail the forms to the city or town in which the person registering resides. Cambridge forms can be sent to the Cambridge Election Commission at 51 Inman Street, Cambridge, MA 02139. A list of other city and town addresses can be found at <http://www.sec.state.ma.us/ele/eleclk/clkidx.htm>.

2014 Election Dates

State Primary – Tuesday, September 9, 2014

Last day to register – August 20, 2014

State Election – Tuesday, November 4, 2014

Last day to register – October 15, 2014



If you will be 18 years old on or before Election Day . . .

If you turn 18 after the registration deadline but before Election Day, don't wait until your birthday—you still must register by the deadline. If you turn 18 between the primary and the general election, you must wait until after the primary to register (you can register between September 10 and October 15).

What are the Cambridge Election Commission's office hours?

- Mon. 8:30 – 8:00pm; Tues. – Thur. 8:30am – 5:00pm; Fri. 8:30am – 12:00pm
- To accommodate voter registration deadlines, the office is open on certain special days and special hours.
 - **August 20 and October 15 —open until 8pm**



Frequently Asked Questions

When can I change my voter information?

- Voters may change their Name, Address, or Political Party at any time.
- Send a signed letter to the Election Commission with the requested change: Include your previous name and address and your new name, address, or political affiliation.
- Voters may also fill out a Mail-In Registration Form with their new information and send it to the Election Commission.

Is ID required to register to vote?

- No. However, it is advisable to submit ID when registering to vote by mail.
- Voters may be required to show ID at the polls, so be prepared just in case.
- Valid ID can include a government-issued ID, current utility bill, bank statement, paycheck or other government document showing your name and address.

What and where is my polling location?

- Your ward and precinct determine which elective district you vote in, the officials you elect and your polling location.
- To find your polling location either call the Election Commission or check online: www.wheredoivotema.com

When are you registered to vote?

- If you register in person at an officially designated office, then on that day.
- If you fill out a Mail-In Registration Form, you are officially registered on the postmark date.
- You must register 20 days before an election to vote in that election.
- To verify that you are registered, please call the Election Commission.

Can I register to vote if I am homeless?

- Homeless persons may use a shelter address to register.
- Homeless persons may also register from a location, such as a park bench, by using the map on the Mail-In Registration Form.

Can I register for a friend, family member, or another individual?

- No, this is prohibited under state law.

How do I stay on the Voting List?

- Keep the Election Commission updated with all of your current information.
- Answering the city census each year ensures that your name will remain on the Voting List.
- Those who don't answer the census are NOT precluded from voting. They will be made inactive and will need to bring ID and sign an affidavit of continuous residency in order to vote.

How can I get a letter verifying that I am a registered voter?

- Voter registration letters or cards are NOT necessary for voting purposes.
- The Election Commission office will issue a voter registration letter for \$2.00.
- If you would like a letter mailed to you, please send a signed request and a check for \$2.49 (fee and postage) made payable to the City of Cambridge.

1. Check all the boxes that apply to you.
2. Print your name: last name, first name, middle name or initial.
3. Print your former name, if applicable.
4. Print the address where you live now: number and street name or rural route number and box number (do not provide a post office box number), apartment number, city or town and full zip code. Use the map[†] at right if you cannot otherwise identify your address.
5. Print the address where you receive all your mail, if it is different from the address entered on #4.
6. Print your date of birth: month, day and year.
7. Federal law requires that you provide your driver's license number to register to vote. If you do not have a current and valid Massachusetts driver's license, you must provide the last four digits of your social security number. If you have neither, you must write "none" in the box.
8. It is optional to provide your telephone number. If you include your telephone number and do not check "unlisted" it will be a public record.
9. Check a party, 'no party' or print a political designation (not a party).
10. Print the address where you were last registered to vote.
11. If a person is helping you because you are physically unable to sign this form, that assisting person must print his or her name and address and has the option to print his or her telephone number.
12. Read the oath.
13. Print today's date.
14. Sign your name.

This form may be mailed or hand-delivered to your city or town ball. If mailed, fold the form, tape it closed, place a first class stamp on it, print your city or town name and zip code for that city or town ball and drop into any mailbox.

You can use this form to:

- register to vote in Massachusetts; and/or
- change your name or address for voter registration only; and/or
- join a party, change from one party to another or leave a party.

To register to vote in Massachusetts you must:

- **BE A U.S. CITIZEN;** and
- be a Massachusetts resident; and
- be at least 18 years old on or before the next election.

Penalty for Illegal Registration: Fine of not more than \$10,000 or imprisonment for not more than five years or both.
 -Massachusetts General Laws, chapter 56 section 8.

Identification To Be Provided

Section 7 requires you to include your driver's license number or the last 4 digits of your social security number on this application. This information will be verified through the Registry of Motor Vehicles and the Commissioner of Social Security. If the information cannot be verified or you do not provide this information, you must provide identification either with this application or at your polling location when you go to vote. Sufficient identification includes a copy of a current and valid photo identification, current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or other government document showing your name and address.

IMPORTANT REMINDER

- Congress passed the “Help America Vote Act” (HAVA) in 2002 which created a new voter registration form and identification requirements. Section 7 on the new voter registration form requires that a person provide a driver’s license number or the last four digits of a social security number. If a person has neither, “NONE” must be recorded in the box.
- This information will be verified through the Registry of Motor Vehicles and the Commissioner of Social Security. If the information cannot be verified or you do not provide this information, you must provide identification along with the Mail-In Registration Form or at your polling location when you go to vote. Sufficient identification includes a copy of a current and valid photo ID, current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or other government document showing your name and address.

Massachusetts Official Absentee Ballot Application

How to use this form

Box 1. Check all the boxes that apply to you. If the absentee ballot is to be used for a primary, circle the applicable party. **Remember**, in order to participate in a primary, you must be registered as a member of that party or as an unenrolled (independent) voter. Contact your town clerk, city clerk or election commission if you are unsure of your party designation.

Box 2. Print your name: last name, first name, middle name or initial.

Box 3. Print the address where you are registered to vote: number and street name or rural route number and box number (do not provide a post office box number), apartment number, city or town and full zip code.

Box 4. Check the appropriate box indicating your preference for obtaining your absentee ballot. Instead of having the ballot mailed to you, you have the option of voting at your city or town hall at a time arranged with the clerk or election commission. However, you must still submit a timely application. If you have entered a health care facility anytime after twelve o'clock noon of the 5th day before the relevant primary or election, contact the city or town clerk about the proper procedure to be followed. If the voter is applying for absentee ballots for all elections this year, be sure to notify the town clerk, city clerk or election commission of a change of mailing address.

Box 5. Print your date of birth: month, day and year.

Box 6. It is optional to provide your telephone number. If included and you do not check "unlisted" it will be a public record. Your telephone number may be used to contact you should a question arise concerning your application.

Box 7. It is optional to provide your e-mail address. If included, it will be a public record. Your e-mail may be used to contact you should a question arise concerning your application.

Box 8. Print today's date.

Box 9. Sign your name. Signed under penalty of perjury.

Box 10. If the applicant is unable to complete and sign this application because of blindness, physical disability, the inability to read or the inability to read English, any person designated by the voter may do so.

This application is for use by:

- A registered voter who will be unable to vote at the polls on election day due to:
 - absence from your city or town during normal polling hours; or
 - physical disability preventing you from going to the polling place; or
 - religious belief;

OR

- A non-registered voter who is:
 - a Massachusetts citizen absent from the state; or
 - an active member of the armed forces or merchant marines, their spouse or dependent; or
 - a person confined in a correctional facility or a jail, except if by reason of felony conviction.

Mailing instructions:

This application must be received by noon on the day before the election. This form may be mailed or hand-delivered to your city or town hall. If mailed, fold the form, tape it closed, place a first class stamp on it, print your city or town name and zip code for that city or town hall and drop into any mailbox.

Warning: Illegal absentee voting, including making a false application, is punishable by a fine of up to \$10,000 and up to five years in prison.
