Part I Total Crime

An review of Part One crime statistics for the first 43 weeks of 2019 reveals that a minimal decline of 3% was recorded in Cambridge. Between January 1st and October 28th of 2019, there were 1,934 serious crimes reported in the City. For the same time period in 2018, the combined total for Murder, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny & Auto Theft was 1,992 incidents, 58 more than this year.

Further analysis of the crime totals for the first ten months of 2019 conveys that violent crimes registered a 10% decline with 28 fewer incidents reported, while property crimes recorded a slight decrease with 30 fewer crimes (-2%) when compared with the same time period last year. These conservative, dwindling, crime statistics come fast on the heels of the 2017 numbers, which represented the lowest crime index recorded in Cambridge since 1963.

When measuring the serious crime totals of October of 2019 versus the previous month of September, a decline of 4% was noted with seven fewer crimes counted. The majority of this decrease can be attributed to the accumulation of slight drops in housebreaks, larcenies from the person, auto thefts, street robberies, and aggravated assaults from September to October.

Part I Property Crime

A review of property crime totals for the 43 weeks of 2019 indicates a 2% decrease when measured against the 2018 total and an 8% reduction below the five-year average, with 30 additional incidents below the first ten months of last year and 146 crimes below the 1,838 crimes forecasted for this time period. Ten of the 14 property crime categories recorded declines when measured against this time period in 2018. A 45% decline in housebreaks sustains the long-standing decline in Burglary. Other property crimes registering major declines when compared with their 5-year average include: commercial burglary (-47%); larc. from buildings (-25%) and larc. from motor vehicles (-21%). The major negative trend associated with property crimes identified so far in 2019 has been the 50% upsurge in larceny of bicycles.

Part I Violent Crime

From January 1st to October 28th of 2019, there were 242 violent crimes recorded in Cambridge, 28 incidents below last year (-10%) and 12 fewer violent crimes (-5%) than the 254 incidents forecasted for the first ten months of the year.

There have been 61 robberies reported over the first ten months of 2019, with nine categorized as commercial and 52 classified as street crimes. These numbers represent a significant decline of 23 incidents (-27%) when compared with 2018. Twenty-two rapes have been counted through October of 2019, a number that is six fewer than what was reported through October 28th of 2018. The five-year average for the crime of Rape for the first ten months of the year projects to 24 rapes being recorded in Cambridge, two above the 2019 total.

There has been one additional aggravated assault (+1%) reported through the first ten months of 2019, when compared with the same time period in 2018. The 158 aggravated assaults reported over the first 43 weeks of the year represents a 3% incline above the 153 forecasted for the five-year average.

MURDER

No Patterns

- There has been one murder recorded in Cambridge through the first ten months of 2019. The Middlesex District Attorney's Office and the Cambridge Police are asking for the public's assistance regarding the ongoing investigation into the fatal incident that occurred in the New Street area of Danehy Park around 6:30PM on the night of January 2nd, 2019. This incident is being investigated as a homicide. The preliminary investigation suggests that the victim, 60-year-old Paul Wilson, died as a result of blunt force trauma and that robbery does not appear to have a motive.
- UPDATE: On July 22, 2018, 15-year-old Richelle Robinson of Cambridge died following an assault in which she was shoved to the ground on Cambridge Street. The Office of the Chief Medical Examiner later ruled the cause of death to be blunt force trauma. On July 30, 2019, following an investigation by the Cambridge Police Department, the Massachusetts State Police, and the Middlesex District Attorney's Office, Isaias Plaza (4/7/00, homeless) was arraigned on charges of manslaughter and assault and battery causing serious bodily injury in connection with Robinson's death.
- The last recorded homicide in 2017 was on the night of November 16th in the area of Tremont and Hampshire Streets, Malachi Mims, 28, of Cambridge was shot and taken to a local hospital where he was later pronounced dead.
- On December 31st, 2017, Kevin Reddick, a 17-year-old Cambridge resident, was arrested in Boston and charged in connection with the shooting death. On November 29th of 2018, the Middlesex DA's Office announced Osiris Chambers, 17, of Cambridge, was also arraigned in Middlesex Superior Court in connection with the shooting death of Malachi Mims.



Characteristics of Murder in Cambridge

For the 30-year period between 1960 and 1989, the City of Cambridge averaged slightly less than five murders per year. The annual average since 1990 has fallen to approximately two per year. Trend analysis over recent years points to two recurring murder scenarios in Cambridge: domestic murder, in which one family member is brutally killed by another in a homicidal rage, and the murder of young males by a handgun or knife in acts of retaliatory street violence.

Cambridge Murder Statistics, 1990-2018

- 61 people murdered in 56 incidents (in 4 of the incidents, 2 or more people were killed)
- 41 victims were male
- 20 victims were female
- Most common weapons: handguns (29 incidents) and knives (13 incidents)
- 18 of the 56 cases are still under investigation or remain unsolved
- 26 of the 35 cases since 2000 have been cleared by arrest or by the death of the suspect, including all three murders in both 2013 and 2015, the 2018 incident, and one of the two murders in 2014 and 2017. There have been no arrests in the two murders in 2016.



Unsolved Murders: 1999 to 2018

Colin Burton, 30, of Dorchester, was shot and killed outside of Hi - Fi Pizza on Mass Ave in Central Square on September 18th, 1999. Burton was talking with the occupants of a Ford Explorer when the subject in the passenger seat fired through the window. Two suspects fled the scene. The case remains under active investigation.

lan Gray, 19, of Mattapan, was in an argument outside of the Rhythm & Spice restaurant that spilled out onto Mass Ave. A suspect that had left the scene returned with a group of people and a fight ensued. A knife was produced during the altercation and four gunshots were fired, fatally wounding Gray. This case remains open.

On June 17th, 2002 at 7:00PM, Ricardo Williams, 27, of Malden, was found in the driver's seat of a motor vehicle suffering from a gunshot wound to his face. Williams was taken to CCH where he was pronounced dead. This case remains open.

June 16, 2009, Rindge Ave under investigation.

Jason Ellcock, 33, of Malden, formerly of Cambridge and father of three, was found with multiple gunshot wounds in front of the driveway to 364 Rindge Ave at 3:05 AM on the night of June 16th, 2009. He was pronounced dead at the scene. This incident remains under investigation.

Unsolved Murders: 1999 to 2018



March 12, 2011, Brookline St.

James Lauture, 30, of Cambridge, was sitting in a vehicle near Brookline and Watson Streets just after midnight on Saturday, March 12th, 2011, when an unknown gunman opened fire. The occupants in the car were able to drive to Central Square. Lauture died from multiple gunshot wounds. The other man in the vehicle survived. This case remains open.

On June 3rd, 2012, **Charlene Holmes**, 16, of Cambridge, was shot while sitting on a porch on Willow St. She later succumbed to her wounds at the hospital. The investigation into this incident remains active, but no arrests have been made to date.





July 3, 2014, Windsor Street.

On July 3rd, 2014, at 10:00 PM, **Kensley David**, 22, suffered a single gunshot wound to the head while on Windsor Street. Investigators believe that the incident was not random. This case remains under investigation.

The first murder of 2016 in Cambridge occurred on the night of March 22nd when Armando Hernandez Jr, 30, of Belmont was killed by gunfire on Mt. Auburn St just before 10 PM. Area residents said they heard 10 or 11 gunshots. A second victim was hospitalized with a leg wound. This case remains under investigation.

Unsolved Murders: 1999 to 2018



June 25, 2016, 140 Harvard St.

On June 25th of 2016, Cambridge Police responded to a report of a shooting outside of 140 Harvard Street. Arriving officers discovered the victim, Anthony Clay, 49, of Cambridge suffering from a gunshot wound. The victim was transported to Massachusetts General Hospital where he was pronounced dead. This case remains under investigation.

At 3:40 a.m. on October 14, 2017, **Ednilson DaCosta**, 28, of Dorchester, was shot in a motor vehicle in the area of Windsor Street & Evereteze Way. He was pronounced deceased at a local hospital. Minutes later, another male was shot and killed in Somerville. On November 3, 2017, Tony Harris, 28, of Everett, was arrested for the Somerville homicide, but the murder of Ednilson DaCosta remains under investigation.

RAPE

No Patterns

- There were 22 rapes reported during for the first ten months of 2019, six fewer (-21%) than the total through October 28th of 2018. The five-year average for the first ten months of the year projects to 24 rapes being recorded in Cambridge, two above the 2019 total.
- Two sexual assaults were registered in March, three in May, two in June, four in July, seven in August, two in September, and two in October of 2019.
- Twenty of the 22 rapes in Cambridge in 2019 have been categorized in the following manner: seven of these incidents have been chronicled as domestic situations, and 13 were classified as acquaintance assaults.
- There have been two stranger-to-stranger rapes in Cambridge in 2019, both classified as blitz scenarios.
 The first involved a pair of homeless subjects near Central Square at the end of May. The second incident was an early morning incident near Mass Ave in Central Square during the first week of September and remains under investigation.
- There were 29 rapes reported in Cambridge in 2018, up from the 19 incidents reported in 2017, which points to a 53% increase. When the 2018 total is measured against the five-year average for rapes annually in the city, a 26% uptick was recognized. Fourteen of the rapes in 2018 involved acquaintances, three were categorized as contact scenarios with the offender being someone the victim had met in a public place, ten were domestic situations, and two were classified as blitz assaults.




AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

No Patterns

- There has been one additional aggravated assault (+1%)
 registered through the first ten months of 2019, when
 compared with the same time period in 2018. The 158
 aggravated assaults reported over the first ten months of the
 year represents a 3% increase above the 153 forecasted for
 the five-year average.
- The 158 aggravated assaults reported through October 28th of 2019 were composed of the following classifications: 33 unprovoked scenarios; 32 domestic altercations; 25 assaults between acquaintances; 18 homeless assaults; 11 road rage incidents; 7 tiffs between shop owners & patrons; 7 psychotic episodes; 5 juvenile fights; 4 landlord/tenant disputes; 4 assaults on a police officer; 4 fights at a bar; 4 affray/brawls; and 4 workplace fights.
- There have been ten confirmed shots fired in Cambridge in 2019 through October 28th, five of which produced Shotspotter alerts. Three of the confirmed shootings were in the Port neighborhood. One of the most recent incidents in Cambridge took place at Hampshire St & Windsor St on 10.12.19. Multiple shell casings were recovered but no injuries were reported. This incident remains under investigation.
- Only one of the ten shots fired in Cambridge thus far in 2019
 has resulted in any injuries. This shooting, which took place
 at 3:30am on 5.12.19 in Harvard Square, resulted in one
 victim with non-fatal injuries. Three Somerville males were
 later arrested in connection with the incident. The remaining
 nine shots fired incidents did not result in any injuries.










Geographic Breakdown of Aggravated Assaults: 1.1.19 - 10.28.19




Robbery

No Patterns

- There have been 61 robberies reported over the first ten months of 2019, with nine categorized as commercial and 52 classified as street crimes. There has been a notable decline of 23 incidents (-27%) when compared with 2018. The five-year average for overall robbery in Cambridge for the first ten months of the year is 76 incidents. The 61 robberies recorded thus far in 2019 translate to a 20% decrease below the projected total.
- There have been nine commercial robberies so far this year—all but two have been shopliftings that escalated into violent confrontations. These crimes occurred at the CambridgeSide Mall on January 25th; in Harvard Sq on February 26th; at a drug store in Porter Sq on March 11th; at a Mass Ave gas station on March 30th; at the CVS in Harvard Sq on July 6th, the Target in Porter Sq on July 19th and an incident at a liquor store on Cambridge Street on August 14th.
- The first non-shoplifting commercial robbery this year involved a demand for cash at a convenience store near Porter Square on June 13th; an arrest was made. On the 11th of September, three local teens were summonsed for a confrontation with a clerk at a Mass Ave convenience store.
- Over the first ten months of 2019, there have been 52 street robberies, one incident (-2%) below the same time period last year. Eleven street robberies were reported during September of 2019. Six of these incidents were in Mid Cambridge and were designated as a distinct series forming the first street robbery pattern of 2019. Two of the muggings involved delivery drivers while four others were of males walking between Harvard St & Broadway during the PM hours. There were two arrests ending this pattern. No new patterns emerged in October.






Geographic Breakdown of Commercial Robberies: 1.1.19 - 10.28.19





Geographic Breakdown of Street Robberies: 1.1.19 – 10.28.19





- The property index crime of burglary, the combination of residential and commercial breaks, has recorded a significant decrease of 50% when compared to the five-year average, with 123 fewer incidents reported below the projected total of 247 breaks. When compared with last year's historically low total of 227 incidents for the first three quarters of the year, a lesser, but still substantial decrease of 45% has been recorded.
- Currently, there are no commercial burglary patterns, hot spots, or concentrations active in Cambridge. A historically low total of 27 incidents has been reported for the first ten months of 2019, which translates to a sizeable 47% decline below both the number through this time in 2018 and the forecasted number for the first 43 weeks of the year.
- Housebreaks dove 45% when measured against the total for the first ten months of 2018 with 79 fewer incidents. A decrease of 51% was also registered below the forecasted total of 196 housebreaks for the first 43 weeks of the year.
- During the middle of March, the Crime Analysis Unit was monitoring a series of late afternoon / early evening breaks in Cambridgeport where entry into residences was gained by forcing side windows, and laptops and jewelry were targeted. After a three-week hiatus in this activity, the CAU designated this pattern as having been eradicated.
- There were only 55 housebreaks reported in Cambridge from May through October, which represents one of the lowest five-month totals for this crime during warm weather and early fall months in decades.




Geographic Breakdown of Housebreaks: 9.1.19 - 10.28.19

LARCENY

No Patterns

- Overall larceny for the first 43 weeks of 2019 registered at 72 incidents (5%) above the same time frame in 2018. The total of 1,472 larcenies reported year-to-date in 2019 is also
- After coming off a 7% drop at the end of 2018, larcenies from MVs have evened out and are in line with the number **reported** during the same time frame in 2018. This property crime is also down 21% below the 5-year average, with 57 fewer incidents than the projected total of 270.

- · Through the first ten months of 2019, larcenies from the person have dropped slightly below the number reported in 2018, down 2 incidents for a total of 140. Central Sq has seen the most activity with 56, followed by Harvard Sq with 31.
- There have been 182 larcenies from buildings reported during the first ten months of 2019. This is 43 incidents (-19%) below the same time frame in 2018 and 61 (-25%) below the 5-year average. Thefts from lockers at a gym near Porter Sq during the First Quarter of 2019 cooled off once a suspect was identified but then picked back up again in the spring and have been reported sporadically since May, leading to a total of 18 reported at this location so far.
- Larcenies from residences in 2018 were up 37% over the previous year, and that trend has continued at a lower level through 2019 with a 6% rise (+11 incidents) over the first ten months of last year. Package thefts continue to dominate this crime category with 106 (54%) of the incidents reported yearto-date.
- Bicycle thefts are up 134 incidents (+50%) when compared with this time in 2018, and up 112 incidents (+38%) when compared with the 5-year average. North Cambridge has seen the most thefts year-to-date with 71, followed by East Cambridge with 56.




LARCENY From MV

No Patterns

- The larceny from motor vehicle total for the first ten months of 2019 is 213 incidents, which is exactly the same number that was reported for the same time period in 2018. These 213 thefts from cars indicate a decrease of 57 incidents (-21%) below the number forecasted through the first 43 weeks of 2019.
- There was an increase of 69% (9 incidents) in larceny from motor vehicles from September to October of 2019. No spatial or temporal trend was identified this month, and no neighborhood stood out for having a spike in thefts from vehicles.
- There have been only four larcenies from motor vehicles reported in the Agassiz neighborhood, four in the Highlands, and seven in Strawberry Hill so far in 2019. The remaining neighborhoods range anywhere from 12 – 34 incidents year-to-date, with West Cambridge coming in on top.
- The majority of thefts in The Port neighborhood, fifteen in 2019, have been along the 500 block of Mass Ave and in the immediate periphery of Central Square in parking lots.
- There have been 48 LMVs reported in 2019 in the Cambridgeport / Riverside section of the City, with the concentration of thefts from unlocked vehicles on the periphery of Central Square. While it was a problem at the beginning of the year, incidents have tapered off with only 13 occurring in the last five months.



Geographic Breakdown of Larceny from Motor Vehicles: 9.1.19 – 10.28.19







LARCENY from Person

- The larceny from person total for the first ten months of 2019 has decreased by two incidents in comparison to the same time period in 2018. The 140 thefts from persons reported over the first 43 weeks of the year also translates to a decrease of 13 incidents (-8%) below the number forecasted for the first ten months of 2019.
- When comparing October 2019 to the previous month of September, the number of incidents has decreased from 20 to 13 incidents (-35%). Central Square and East Cambridge were the most active business districts in October with 4 incidents each, followed by five other business districts with one incident each.
- So far in 2019, Central Sq. has seen the most activity with 56 incidents, followed by Harvard Square with 31 incidents, and the CambridgeSide / East Cambridge area with 20. Fourteen thefts have been reported yearto-date at the CambridgeSide shopping center, four each have been reported in Carl Barron Plaza in Central Sq and at Starbucks in Harvard Sq, and two to three incidents have been reported at numerous other locations in both Central and Harvard Squares.
- A majority of the incidents thus far in 2019 have been comprised of thefts of otherwise unattended property, such as at local parks, sidewalks, or in shelters (34 incidents), thefts from patrons at restaurants/ cafes/bars (31 incidents), grab & run incidents (29 incidents), and thefts from shoppers (26 incidents). The remaining incidents were categorized as pocketpickings (20 incidents).



LARCENY of Bicycle



- Overall, bike thefts are up 50% (+134 incidents) this year when compared with the first ten months of 2018, and up 38% (+112 incidents) above the 5-year average. There were 10 reported in January, 6 in February, 19 in March, 33 in April, 34 in May, 68 in June, 66 in July, 83 in August, 45 in September, and 39 in October.
- Of the 403 bike thefts reported so far this year, 296 (73%) were reportedly locked at the time of the theft.
- In North Cambridge, there was one apartment building storage area that was hit hard during October. There were nine reports with multiple high end bikes listed as being stolen. Two parties were arrested during one of the incidents and another was identified through surveillance.
- Although the majority of bicycles tend to be stolen from streets, sidewalks, and yards, we continue to see an increase in thefts from parking garages and building storage areas this year. There have been 80 thefts from these more protected areas thus far in 2019 compared to only 17 during the same period in 2018.



Larcenies from residences in 2018 were up 34% over the previous year, and that trend has continued (although at a lower level) through the first ten months of 2019 with a 6% rise (+11 incidents) over last year's first ten months. The 197 incidents reported year-todate in 2019 are also 7% above the five-year average of 184 thefts.

Package thefts continue to dominate this crime category with 106 (54%) of the larcenies from residences reported year-to-date. However, they have fluctuated from month to month this year with 18 in January, 3 in February, 13 in March, 7 in April, 7 in May, 17 in June, 10 in July, 10 in August, 9 in September, and 12 in October.

The current leading neighborhoods for package thefts in 2019 are Mid-Cambridge with 20 (with a hotspot in the 200-300 blocks of Harvard St), Riverside with 15 (with a hotspot in the 300-500 blocks of Franklin St), Inman with 13, and The Port with 12.

Temporally, Tuesday through Friday afternoons into early evenings have been the most reported times and days of the week for this crime to occur.


AUTO THEFT

No Patterns

- The projected 5-year weighted average for auto thefts for the first ten months of the year is 93 incidents. With 96 thefts reported in 2019 through October 28th, we are 3% above the average and 1% above the 95 reported during this time frame in 2018.
- There were 5 auto thefts reported in October, 9 in September, 16 in August, 12 in July, and 17 reported in June. From June through September, only 15 thefts involved mopeds, scooters, or motorcycles, with four taking place in September. Usually these are more frequent in the summer months, but this trend did not materialize in 2019 compared to other years.
- One trend that did emerge in June was the thefts of older model Toyotas from the Cambridgeport / Riverside area of the city. Many of these vehicles were also recovered in the same neighborhoods, leading to the speculation that some of these incidents may have involved thefts for joyriding purposes by suspects who live in the area. A juvenile from Cambridge was arrested after he was caught driving one of the stolen Toyotas in Somerville in July. He is believed to be one of several juveniles involved in this series of thefts.
- Only 25 vehicles so far in 2019 have been stolen from north
 of the Harvard Square area; the 71 other thefts took place in
 the lower half of the city. The Neighborhood breakdown is as
 follows: Riverside with 18, the Port with 12, East Cambridge
 with 12, Cambridgeport with 10, MIT with 9, North
 Cambridge with 8, West Cambridge with 7, Inman with 6,
 Agassiz with 5, Mid-Cambridge with 4, the Highlands with 3,
 and Peabody with 2.
- At least 42 (or 44%) of the vehicles stolen this year have been recovered.
