

Rain Gardens: Reuse Stormwater in Your Yard

There are several ways that you can reduce runoff and better use stormwater in your yard while ensuring proper drainage. One relatively easy and attractive method is a rain garden.

Stormwater refers to rain and snow melt. Stormwater runoff from your roof, driveway and other hard surfaces in your yard is typically directed towards the street and into the municipal storm drain system. This stormwater runoff, can pick up harmful substances such as road salt, pet waste, heavy metals, pesticides, fertilizers and oils. The water then flows into local water bodies, where it can harm water quality and aquatic habitat. Meanwhile, water used for lawns and gardens is drawn from the local drinking water supply.
