





Reconstructed plan of Cambridge and environs in the 17th century





William G. Stearns's subdivision of the Fayerweather estate, 1852











Joseph Lee estate, 1803. The 49-acre estate included a 3-acre field north of Vassal Lane and 17 acres with river frontage south of Brattle Street.


















Proposed Goals

- to preserve, conserve and protect the character and heritage of the architecture and streetscape,
- to improve the quality of its environment,
- to establish a process for accommodating changes
- to ensure that additions and alterations are compatible with the existing character
- to provide a forum for neighborhood dialogue
- to offer technical assistance
- to foster wider public appreciation of the neighborhood
- to promote the public welfare by making the District a more attractive and desirable place in which to live.

Proposed Exemptions

- 1. Interior work and exterior color
- 2. Repairs or replacements in-kind
- 3. Terraces, walks, driveways, sidewalks,
- 4. Walls and fences four feet (forward of house) Walls and fences six feet or less in height (elsewhere on a property)
- 5. Solar panels that meet guidelines
- 6. Flat profile skylights (less than 30% roof area)
- 7. Temporary signs, temporary structures, lawn statuary, or recreational equipment
- 8. Storm doors and windows, half-screens, and window air conditioners
- 9. Pad mounted HVAC equipment (not at front, screened)
- 10.Utility meters (screened)
- 11. One-story accessory building of less than 100 square feet
- 12.Repair or reconstruction of a foundation wall
